## REPORT.

Terms of Reference. 1. The "Battles Nomenclature Committee" was appointed in August, 1919, the Terms of Reference being :—

- "(a.) To tabulate the actions fought in this war.  
 "(b.) To classify these actions with a definite system of nomenclature which will denote their relative importance (*e.g.*, the more important actions might be classed as battles, and the lesser ones as combats, &c.).  
 "(c.) To define the geographical and chronological limits of each action."

Constitution of Committee. 2. The following list shows all officers who have served on the Committee. It will be seen that circumstances unfortunately necessitated several changes, but the consequent inconvenience was minimized as much as possible by arranging for overlaps.

The temporary members mentioned above were appointed to assist the Committee in the consideration of particular campaigns, being specially selected for their local knowledge. For the other theatres of war temporary members were not appointed, but assistance was obtained as required from officers who had served in the campaign under consideration.

3. The Committee met on Monday, 18th August, 1919, and the first session was devoted to a general consideration of the scope of the work, an examination of the correspondence on the subject, and a discussion of the principles to be followed. The various campaigns were then studied in detail with the aid of both documentary and personal evidence.

*Documentary evidence.*—The Committee have carefully examined all the Despatches and Reports, whether published or unpublished, which have been placed at their disposal by the War, Colonial, and India Offices, and also the "Diary of the War" compiled by the Historical Section of the Committee of Imperial Defence, so far as it has been completed. They have received valuable assistance from the Headquarters of the different Dominion Forces and from the Admiralty, and many accounts published unofficially have also been read and considered in Committee. In all matters of doubt the War Diaries have been freely consulted, and the Committee are under great

obligations to the Historical Section of the Committee of Imperial Defence for their help in this and other matters, and for placing a room at their disposal.

The Committee wish also to take this opportunity of placing on record their appreciation of the work of the officers of that section who acted as their secretaries. They are particularly indebted to them for able memoranda on the principles and practice of nomenclature and classification.

*Personal evidence.*—To supplement the documentary evidence, the Committee have taken full advantage of the permission given to them to call upon individual officers with special knowledge for their assistance. In most cases these officers attended meetings of the Committee and took part in the discussions, and several were good enough to describe the course of particular campaigns in lectures. At an early meeting the Committee decided that the evidence of these officers should not be recorded. In coming to this decision the Committee were prompted by two main considerations. In the first place, they felt that they would be able to obtain a better idea of the actual circumstances by informal discussion than by formal evidence. In the second, they considered that only in such a way could they obtain the benefit of hearing the views of officers of high rank without abrogating their own responsibility for their recommendations.

Definition  
of limits.

4: Of the various tasks allotted to the Committee in their terms of reference, the definition of the limits of engagements, both geographical and chronological, has been the simplest.

As regards *chronological* limits it was decided—

That no attempt should be made to define the time more closely than by the “day” (midnight to midnight).

That, owing to the varying length of the preparatory action, and the difficulty of fixing its actual commencement, this period should not be included, but that “zero day” should be taken as the first day in all cases.

That, on the other hand, the period of consolidation after an attack should, as a general rule, be included.

As regards *geographical* limits the Committee decided to denote the boundaries of battle areas by easily recognizable geographical features which could be followed on such generally accessible maps as those of the 1/100,000 series. In doing so they have been influenced by the conviction that, for the purposes of this Committee, a meticulous accuracy was of less importance than that their recommendations should be generally intelligible without the use of special maps.

The general principle followed has been to include in a battle area only what might fairly be regarded as the actual “battlefield.” With the great range of modern guns any attempt to comprise in this all positions occupied by our artillery engaged,\* or all ground covered by the enemy’s shell fire, would unduly extend the limits. For the rear line, the geographical feature approximating most closely to the main line of the heavy artillery has been taken, but the flanks have been fixed to correspond with the outside limits from which the infantry assault was delivered, or within which the enemy’s infantry advanced to the attack. The above, of course, applies especially to trench warfare, but the same principles have been applied as far as practicable to engagements in the open.

In certain cases it has been found impossible to define the limits more closely than by the expressions “beyond” a certain line or base, or “in the neighbourhood of” a certain place. The use of such means of definition has, however, been confined to cases where it is thought that no doubt can arise as to the troops concerned. Where there has been a danger of this occurring, as, for instance, in rear-guard actions where the main body had passed over the same ground on the same day, formations have been named. Otherwise, the indication of the troops engaged has been strictly avoided as being beyond the province of the Committee.

As regards *subsidiary actions*, the Committee decided that any which took place outside the geographical limits laid down as above for the main battle, should be considered on their merits as separate engagements. In cases, however, where such engagements were definitely undertaken as contributing to the battle, this has been indicated.

Classifica-  
tion of en-  
gagements.

5. It is in devising a system of classification which would be generally applicable that the Committee have been confronted with the most difficult problem. This is due, of course, to the very different conditions prevailing in the different theatres of war. If a scale suitable for some of the minor theatres had been strictly applied to the Western Front, it would have involved an innumerable list of "raids" and similar minor operations. If the process had been reversed, it would have meant omitting all mention of any but one or two actions in wars of some years' duration. It must always be remembered that if the actual fighting in other campaigns never reached the intensity of the great battles in France and Belgium, the troops who took part in them enjoyed none of the amenities due to a European environment; they had to undergo privations of food and ordeals of climate for long periods without any chance of relief; and they suffered in some cases very severely from the depressing effects of disease. They would have real cause for disappointment if their fights were denied a place in the roll of engagements as being mere skirmishes in comparison with the great struggles in the West.

Moreover, in judging of the importance of military action, due weight must be given to the moral and political effect at the time. Engagements may have a far-reaching influence out of all proportion to the number of troops engaged. To go further, success or failure in the defence of some frontier post—insignificant by European standards—may well be the decisive factor in determining the attitude of the inhabitants of vast regions, and thus affect the whole course of the subsequent campaign.

The Committee came early to the conclusion that any attempt to classify the engagements in all the theatres of war on hard-and-fast rules based on the numbers engaged, the casualties suffered, or any similar foundation must work unfairly in practice. The principles they have followed in their classification are explained in the following paragraphs.

Sub-  
division of  
battles.

6. The extension of the period covered by the so-called battles in Europe from days to weeks, and even to months, has introduced an entirely new factor, and the term "battle" in the ordinary pre-war application of that word is obviously no longer sufficient. From the despatches it is plain that the Commander-in-Chief's conception of such operations as the so-called "Battle of the Somme" (1916) was a *series of great blows*, each delivered with the full force available, after the necessary pause for preparation. The Committee have endeavoured to present them in this form by resolving them into their successive stages:—first the main attack—then the succeeding general attacks marking the opening of new phases. Each of these constitutes in itself a "Battle" of the first magnitude, and the whole operation thus comes to form a Group of Battles.\* This is, after all, only a parallel to the changes in organization. The expansion in the size of the field armies has necessitated their subdivision, not only into Armies, but into "Groups of Armies." We spoke of the "British Armies" in France, not of the "British Army," so we may speak of the "Battles of the Somme" rather than of the "Battle of the Somme." This principle has accordingly been followed by the Committee in all such cases. Historical sanction for this usage is not wanting. Wellington's operations on the French frontier in 1813 were grouped by Napier under the title of the "Battles of the Pyrenees," and half a century later, in the American Civil War, we have the "Battles of the Wilderness."

Even with this arrangement, many of the individual battles will still be on so grand a scale that the Committee have seriously considered the possibility of further subdivision by *breaking up the front* of the great simultaneous attacks and denominating the struggle for each distinctive feature a separate battle. This would no doubt appeal to many units—from corps to battalions—to whom a battle fought on a wide front often means only the fighting for some definite locality. The Committee have the greatest sympathy with such feelings, and have always been anxious to give due regard to them, but it is their duty to consider the commanders who planned as well as

the units who executed, and any such subdivision of the front is liable to give a false impression as regards the unity of the plan. It would be misleading if such attacks as those of the 1st July, 1916, and the 31st July, 1917, were represented as a series of disjointed actions. Moreover, to name even all the villages which were scenes of desperate conflicts would carry such subdivision beyond all reason. Thus at once would arise the risk of injustice to those units who fought just as gallantly for less prominent localities, or for some nameless trench.

The Committee, therefore, decided that battles fought under a single plan on a continuous front should not be broken up, but should each constitute a separate battle. At the same time, they have mentioned some of the more important tactical incidents of the battles when this could be done without risk of obscuring the greater issues involved. It must not, however, be inferred that the fighting at the places named was necessarily more severe than on other parts of the front, or that the number of such incidents recorded is any criterion of the greatness of the battle itself.

Terminology.

7. As regards the terms to be employed in describing the different engagements, the Committee have had great difficulty in arriving at any system which would adequately cover the very wide range required.

The only names in the military terminology which convey any real indication of proportion are "battle," "action," and "affair," and these are obviously inadequate to convey all the gradations. As explained above, the Committee decided to supplement them by adopting the plural—"Battles"—for those *prolonged operations* which were such a feature of the later stages of the war on the Western Front. Even with this addition a gap was still left, for there were no means of differentiating between battles so different in size as, say, Messines and Ctesiphon. The Committee carefully considered the possibility of recommending the use of some such term as "super-battle" or "battle-royal"\* to denote those battles which did not come within the category of "groups of battles," but were yet vastly greater in scale than any single "battle" of the past. It was felt, however, that the objections to such compounds outweighed any technical advantage that might be gained by their use.

In the use of the above terms, and also of what may be called *descriptive* terms, such as "capture," "occupation," "attack," "defence," &c., the Committee have endeavoured to maintain a certain consistency. Thus the rank of "battle" has been confined as a general rule to engagements of primary importance fought out between forces not smaller than the corps. The title "action" has been employed for the next class, the limit in this case being taken as the division; lesser engagements have been styled "affairs." The term "combat" has been avoided as having reverted to its original use of a hand-to-hand fight between individuals, and so become obsolete in the sense in which it was employed in the last century. "Capture" has been reserved for operations where the primary object was the capture of a definite locality, and where this was only accomplished by actual fighting of some importance; where this latter condition was absent "occupation" has been used, and the same distinction has been drawn between "passage" and "crossing." Again the term "attack" has been confined to unsuccessful offensive operations, and "defence" to successful defences of definite localities, the term "German (or other) attack" being used in cases of simple resistance to an attack. In some cases the Committee have made use of the expedient of combination to give recognition to the cumulative effect of a series of small collisions where—as often in bush fighting—a number of these have taken the place of a pitched battle.

These and other rules which have been formulated from time to time by the Committee have, however, been intended only as general guides in applying the terms available, and they have not hesitated to depart from them where such a course appeared to be justified by the circumstances. The proportion of the troops engaged to the whole force in the field has been taken into account; moral and political effect has been considered; and the prescriptive right acquired by some engagements which have seized the popular imagination to higher titles than are strictly warranted has been recognized.

terminology.

8. The great extension of the battle fronts has brought with it peculiar difficulties in deciding on appropriate names. "Double-barrelled" names† have been freely used in despatches and in official accounts, and had, no doubt,

many advantages *at the moment*. But the Committee can find no sanction for such a system in the practice of English historians, or among the Battle Honours of British Regiments. Even when officially adopted abroad, as in "Gravelotte—St. Privat," such double names appear to have dropped out of popular usage.

It is true that no battles fought by the British Army in the past have been at all on the same scale as some of those under consideration. Many of the older battles, however, were fought over fronts of several miles which included more than one locality of importance, so that the use of double names could have been justified in their case by the same arguments as now apply. But in each case one name appears to have been selected, and the Committee consider that this is the only course likely to ensure the general adoption of the official names. They are aware that their choice has often been quite arbitrary, but it has never been made without the fullest consideration of all suggested alternatives.

In cases where several battles have been fought over the same ground and must obviously bear the same name, as in the case of the four successive "Battles of Ypres," the Committee came early to the conclusion that it was better to distinguish them by the year in which they were fought than to number them—to speak of "Ypres 1915" rather than of "Second Ypres." The advantage of this course is well exemplified by the case of the Battles of the Aisne. Three great battles were fought on the same stretch of that river, in 1914, 1917, and 1918, but only in the first and third of these did British troops bear a part. For us to designate the battle in 1918 the "Second Battle of the Aisne" (as it was so far as British troops were concerned) would lead to confusion since the French have officially entitled it the "Third Battle." For us to call it the "Third Battle" would be equally misleading. "Aisne 1918" solves the difficulty.

The Committee considered the possibility of using "date-names" in some cases in which it was particularly difficult to decide on the most appropriate geographical designation as, for instance, for the opening attack in the Battles of the Somme, 1916, or the initial blow of the great German offensive in 1918. Careful examination of historical precedent, however, proves that dates, although frequently used in contemporary writings, have not persisted in practice, but have always been replaced eventually by "local" names.\* The Committee are of opinion that "1st July" and "21st March," however familiar now, will not convey the same meaning to future generations, and they have decided not to recommend any such titles.

The fact that in so many theatres we were fighting alongside troops of the Allied armies has introduced some complications. Full use has been made of the information supplied by the Allied Military Missions as regards the names officially adopted abroad, and where detachments from the British Army were fighting as portions of the army of one of the Allies, as on the Marne and Aisne in 1918, and in Italy, the names approved by the nation chiefly concerned have been adopted. The Committee consider, however, that for the battles *in which the British Armies in France took a major part*, official adoption of the names which have become familiar to the British public, as well as to the troops, is essential. For instance, to call the Battle of Loos "The Third Battle of Artois" would be impossible.

The nomenclature adopted by the enemy has also been noted.

With regard to the spelling of place-names, the Committee have throughout been guided by the advice of the inter-departmental Permanent Committee on Geographical Names†, to whom they are greatly indebted for continual assistance. In a few cases the general system has been departed from, in order to retain a conventional form which has become generally familiar.

inclusion. 9. A tabulated list of the engagements fought during the War, classified, and with their geographical and chronological limits defined as directed, is attached.

As a general rule no reference has been made to the work of the Navy or Air Force, or to Allied troops fighting in line with our own. In some few cases, however, where the other forces have been small, and where the co-operation has been very close, their engagements have been included.

By an arrangement in several columns, by the use of different terms and of varieties of type, the Committee have endeavoured to indicate the relative importance of events, in accordance with the principles explained in the preceding paragraphs. It is fully recognized that many cases may be found which are not entirely in accord with these principles. The Committee believe, however, that any attempt to apply hard and fast rules to such a

complex subject would result in much greater inconsistencies, and would, moreover, in many cases be unjust. The members of the Committee have themselves had very varied experiences during the war; they have had access to the official documents as well as the assistance of a large number of officers specially qualified to speak on the subject; they have carefully considered each case in all its aspects, and they believe that their recommendations do substantial justice.
