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Sir, Foreign Office, 15 June 1899.

THE Marquess of Salisbury has for some time past had under consideration the question of approaching the Royal Niger Company with a view to relieving them of their rights and functions of administration on reasonable terms. His Lordship has arrived at the opinion that it is desirable on grounds of national policy that these rights and functions should be taken over by Her Majesty's Government, now that the ratifications of the Anglo-French Convention of June 14th 1898, have been exchanged, and that the frontiers of the two countries have been clearly established in the neighbourhood of the territories administered by the Company. The state of affairs created by this Convention makes it incumbent on Her Majesty's Government to maintain an immediate control over the frontier and fiscal policy of British Nigeria such as cannot be exercised so long as that policy is dictated and executed by a Company which combines commercial profit with administrative responsibilities. The possibility of the early claim by the French Government to profit by the advantages in the Lower Niger which are secured to them by the Convention, makes it essential that an Imperial Authority should be on the spot to control the development of the policy which actuated Her Majesty's Government in granting those advantages, and to prevent the difficulties which would be sure to arise were the Company's officials alone to represent British interests.

There are, moreover, other cogent reasons for the step now contemplated. The West African frontier force, now under Imperial officers, calls for direct Imperial control; the situation created towards other firms by the commercial position of the Company which, although strictly within the rights devolving upon it by Charter, has succeeded in establishing a practical monopoly of trade; the manner in which this commercial monopoly presses on the native traders, as exemplified by the rising in Brass, which called for the mission of enquiry entrusted to Sir John Kirk in 1895, are some of the

arguments which have influenced his Lordship.

The question is not new to the Lords Commissioners, who at Lord Salisbury's suggestion, offered confidentially in November 1897, have had under consideration the terms on which the transfer could be made. Lord Salisbury does not therefore propose to enter into the financial aspect of the case, but would ask their Lordships to endeavour to come to an early settlement with the Company.

TREASURY MINUTE, dated 30th June 1899.

The First Lord and the Chancellor of the Exchequer state to the Board that Her Majesty's Government propose to give notice to the Niger Company of Her Majesty's intention to revoke the Charter of the Company.

The Charter contains provision that in case at any time it is made to appear to Her Majesty in Council expedient that the Charter should be revoked, the right and power is expressly reserved, by writing under the Great Seal, to revoke the Charter; nevertheless, Her Majesty's Government have felt

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that the company is entitled to full recognition of the position which it has rereated for itself, and to the rights which it has acquired in the territories

covered by the Charter.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer has accordingly been in communication with Sir G. T. Goldie, as the Chairman of, and as acting on behalf of the Niger Company, and has concluded with him an agreement, subject to the sanction of Parliament, by which, from the date on which the Charter is revoked:—

The company shall be relieved of all its administrative powers and duties, and shall assign to Her Majesty's Government the benefits of all its treaties and all its land and mining rights of whatever sort and however acquired, but shall retain—except as hereinafter specified—its plant and trading assets, and its stations and waterside depôts, with customary rights of access, buildings, wharves, workshops, and the sites thereof.

On the transfer to them of the above-mentioned powers, duties and rights, Her Majesty's Government will assume entire liability for the annual payment of 12,500l., now a charge upon the administrative revenue of the Company, being interest at 5 per cent. on 250,000l., the public debt of the Niger

territories, repayable at par on 1st January 1938.

The right to redeem the stock or any part of it at 120l. per 100l. stock on 1st January or 1st July in any previous year on giving three months' notice

is reserved by the Government.

Within one month after the revocation of the Charter Her Majesty's Government will pay to the Company a sum of £150,000 as the price of the rights aforesaid, and as compensation for the interruption and dislocation of the Company's business which will result from the revocation of the Charter.

Within the same period Her Majesty's Government will pay to the Company a further sum of £300,000, in repayment of sums advanced by the Company from time to time, including interest thereon, for the development and extension of the Niger territory in excess of the revenue from Customs duties and charges levied by the Company under the provisions of the Charter, such advances being in excess of and distinct from the necessary expenses of the ordinary civil administration of the territories.

Her Majesty's Government, on assuming the powers, rights and duties aforesaid, will impose a royalty on all minerals which may be worked in such portion of the British Province of Northern Nigeria about to be established as is bounded on the west by the main stream of the Niger and on the east by a line running direct from Yola to Zinder, provided that such minerals are exported from a British port or pass through a British Custom House.

Her Majesty's Government will pay to the Company, or its assigns, one-half of the receipts from any royalty so imposed for a period of 99 years from the revocation of the Charter, and no specific taxation shall be imposed on the mining interest, as such, which would prevent the imposition of such an amount of royalty as may be compatible with the development of that

industry in the territories in question.

On the revocation of the Charter, Her Majesty's Government will take over from the Company its war materials and buildings for administrative purposes, and so much of the Company's plant, including steamers, buildings, and land at stations, wharves, stores, &c., as is specified in the Schedules attached to this Minute. An inventory of the stores taken over is to be settled by an officer nominated by the Government and an officer nominated by the Company not later than 1st October next. A sum of 115,000l. is to be paid to the Company for everything included in this clause.

My Lords approve the terms of the Agreement as stated to them by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, and direct that an order may be submitted to the Queen in Council revoking the Charter of the Company on a date to be

specified in such order.

Let copies of this Minute be laid before both Houses of Parliament.

- (i.) I would premise by stating that the valuations in the Estimate B. are only approximate and liable to variation in the event of valuation being taken on the spot. Sir George Goldie has probably put them rather on low side in most cases to avoid any appearance of successive demands in the event of local valuation being required.
- (ii.) Asaba. I should propose transferring headquarters to this station from Old Calabar. In consultation with Colonial Office I have by cable stopped the erection of large gaol at Old Calabar, which was just commencing, as the Asaba gaol would serve for entire territories, and if taken over only a small prison at Old Calabar would be required.
- (iii.) Akassa. Upper and Lower Beaches. These valuations Sir George Goldie settled in consultation with his Board of Directors, and the amounts given are those which the Company is prepared to accept. In the Company's books I understand that the "Upper Beach" stands at £43,008 and the Lower Beach at £59,243. These sums appear high, but it must be taken into consideration that in both cases the land had to be reclaimed and made up from swamp—which entails very heavy expenditure. I am personally acquainted with Akassa and know this to be the case—also that to make any fresh station it would be necessary to reclaim swamp and make it up for the purpose.
- (iv.) Akassa, Upper Beach. This includes slipway and machine shop, which I consider it is most important should be in the hands of Government when it is remembered the large number of Governmental steamers and launches in use, and the dependence on them of the transport. All existing Protectorate launches from Opobo to Benin would be sent for repairs to Akassa. I have stopped erection of machine shop at Dagema pending decision as regards Akassa shops, but if these are not taken over I should advise the erection of one there. Appendix A. gives full particulars. If the shops be taken over by Government the repairs to launches, &c., of trading firms would be carried out in or about actual cost, the "rule of the forge" holding good except in cases of emergency, when Government would take precedence.
- (v.) Akassa, Lower Beach. The taking over of this is in my opinion a matter of great importance, in order that equal facilities may be provided for all persons wishing to trade in the Niger. This point is the depôt for all the Niger trade, or nearly so at present, though the Company depôt to some extent at Burutu. If the Company retain their present beach it will be almost impossible for rival firms to establish in the Niger owing to the expense they would be put to in forming depôt, reclaiming swamp, and making land. The same applies in the question of Government buildings, the erection of which would be at very heavy expense even if suitable site could be procured. It is possible that depôts, Queen's and bonded warehouses might be made at Burutu, but owing to Niger navigation it would seem essential that these shald exist at both places. If the Government take over this Beach as suggested, all traders coming in would have depôt ready for them in Queen's and bonded warehouses at one of the points, and sufficient buildings would be left to the Company for their depôt. The erection of Queen's and bonded warehouses at Burutu would take some time. There would of course be usual rental charged for storeage in such warehouses.
- (vi.) I estimate to take over portion of the Company's force, and lay great stress on the importance of this. I have estimated for re-arming this force in Schedule C. with the Lee-Metford rifle. It is now armed with Sniders.

SCHEDULE II.

WAR MATERIALS, Administrative Buildings, Vessels, &c., to be taken over by the Government of Northern Nigeria from the ROYAL NIGER COMPANY, with Notes as at Price assessed, &c.

I.—Buildings, Land, &c.

- (a.) Jebba Island.—The only land on either bank to be retained by the company will be Port Illorin (below the cliffs), with river frontage as may be precisely determined later. There is a mud wall house on the island which, however, will not be of much use to Government, and is old and dilapidated. It may serve as a store if re-roofed.
- (b.) Lokoja.—Everything, except the trading station and bank between it and the river, will be taken over. This includes a large and valuable two-storey house, together with the land round the station and down to the river, and a good parade ground. Also a quartermaster's and three other stores, each 60 ft. by 15 ft., a new store, 60 ft. by 30 ft.,

guard room of stone (two storeys), 30 ft. by 30 ft., hospital, 60 ft. by 15 ft., orderly room, 80 ft. by 12 ft., and a valuable magazine on Stirling Hill, and the musketry range. Also two iron stores (60 ft. by 30 ft) near the river bank, with surrounding land.

(c.) IBI.—Government House, which I understand is a very good building in an excellent position, 44 ft. by 20 ft., four brick outhouses and an armoury (iron), 60 ft. by 30 ft., with a masonry boundary wall, 120 yards square and 8 feet high, in good condition, with adjoining land. The whole offered at 12,000l.*

It is impossible to say what is the value of the land included in these areas. All of it has been acquired by private purchase and cleared at considerable cost. The buildings will be of great value to Government. Though not personally acquainted with all the buildings enumerated, and as yet ignorant of the precise areas to be retained by the new trading company, I am, generally speaking, of opinion that the sums asked are fair, and even moderate, and that a local valuation would probably result in their increase rather than their decrease, while it is certain that by private sale the company could obtain higher prices.

The value of these is not in question, the sums shown being the book value accepted by the Treasury. The question of their being taken over by Government is also not at issue, since they are part of the administrative machinery which the Treasury have agreed to take over, and a private trading company would not be allowed to hold these war materials. A portion of the artillery will be useful, as also of the Sniders (for arming civil constabulary); the remainder may perhaps later be disposed of to other colonies; the clothing will be utilised as far as possible. In this may be included the electric search light, 3446.

The value of these are, I understand, to be proved from the books of the company. The company are not anxious to get rid of these, but they are of absolutely vital importance to Government, since the Niger is the main artery on which the life and existence of the administration must depend, and its navigation is the sole means of importing stores and building material, and of carrying on the postal and other services. The two hulks are administrative, and must be taken; they will be most useful. The "Liberty" is the sole boat capable of carrying a cargo; the launches must supplement her as far as possible, and will also be used for postal and administrative purposes.

Notes on the Niger Districts and Niger Coast Protectorates, 1882—1893.

National Africa Company.

In 1882 a Company, entitled the "National African Company, Limited," was formed to take over the business of the "United Africa Company, Limited," in Central Africa and in the Niger Regions.

Treaties with Native Chiefs.

In October 1884, the Company purchased the business and objects of the "Compagnie Française de l'Afrique Equatoriale." In the same year various Treaties were concluded between Consul Hewett and native chiefs of the Niger Districts, by which these territories were placed under British protection. (See List, page 17, &c.).

Navigation of the River Niger.

On the 26th February 1885, the General Act of the Berlin Conference was signed, Chapter V. of which contained an "Act of Navigation for the Niger," which applied, generally, to the Niger and its affluents the free navigation articles of the Final Act of the Congress of Vienna of 1815.

British and German Spheres of Influence.

In April-June 1885, the British and German Governments entered into an Agreement, by an exchange of Notes, defining their respective spheres of action in the Gulf of Guinea. By this Agreement Germany engaged not to make acquisition, accept Protectorates, or interfere with the extension of British influence in that part of the Gulf of Guinea lying between the right river bank of the mouth of the Rio del Rey entering the sea between 8° 42' and 8° 46' long, cast of Greenwich and the British colony of Lagos, nor in the interior, to west of a line following the right river bank of the Rio del Rey from the said mouth to its source, thence striking direct to the left river bank of the Old Calabar or Cross River, and terminating, after crossing that river, at the point about 9° 8' of long, east of Greenwich, marked "Rapids" on the English Admiralty chart.

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British Protectorate. Niger Districts.

On the 5th June, 1885, a Notification was inserted in the "London Gazette" to the effect that a British Protectorate had been established over the Niger Districts; the territories comprised within the Protectorate were defined to be—the line of coast between the British Protectorate of Lagos, and the right or western bank of the mouth of the Rio del Rey; and also the territories on both banks of the Niger, from its confluence with the River Benué at Lukoja to the sea, as well as the territories on both banks of the River Benué, from the confluence up to and including Ibi (page 11).

Royal Charter, National Africa Company.

On the 10th July, 1886, a Royal Charter was granted to the "National African Company, Limited" (page 11).

British and German Spheres of Influence.

In July—August, 1886, a Supplementary Agreement was entered into between the British and German Governments defining their respective spheres of action in the Gulf of Guinea from the Rio del Rey to a point to the east and near to Yola.

British Protectorate. Niger Districts.

On the 18th October, 1887, another Notification was inserted in the "London Gazette," in which it was stated that the British Protectorate of the Niger Districts then comprised the following territories:—On the line of coast between the British Protectorate of Lagos and the right or western river bank of the mouth of the Rio del Rey, and all territories in the basin of the Niger and its affluents, which were or might be for the time being subject to the government of the "National African Company, Limited" (then called the "Royal Niger Company"), in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the said Company, dated 10th July, 1886 (see page 16).

British and French Spheres of Influence.

On the 5th August, 1890, a Declaration was signed by the British and French Governments, which contained the following clause:—

"The Government of Her Britannic Majesty recognises the sphere of influence of France to the south of her Mediterranean Possessions up to a line from Say on the Niger to Barrawa on Lake Tchad, drawn in such manner as to comprise in the sphere of action of the Niger Company all that fairly belongs to the kingdom of Sokoto; the line to be determined by Commissioners to be appointed."

British and German Spheres of Influence.

On the 1st July 1890, another Agreement was entered into between the British and German Governments defining their spheres of influence in the Gulf of Guinea and in other parts of Africa.

Prohibition against Alcoholic Liquors.

On the 18th June 1892, that portion of the Niger Protectorate which lies on, or to the north of, the 7-degree of north latitude was, by notification to the Signatory Powers of the Brussels Act, placed under the terms of Art. 91 of that Act, within the zone of prohibition of alcoholic liquors.

British and German Spheres of Influence. Rio del Rey.

On the 14th April 1893, an agreement was signed between the British and German Governments, in which it was declared that the right bank of the Rio del Rey waterway should be the boundary between the Oil Rivers Protectorate and the Colony of the Cameroons.

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On the 13th May 1893, a Notification was inserted in the "London Gazette," announcing that the portion of the British Protectorate of the Niger Districts which was under the administration of Her Majesty's Commissioner and Consul would, from the date of that Notification, be administered under the name of the "Niger Coast Protectorate," and would cease to be known as the "Oil Rivers Protectorate." (Page 35.)

And on the 15th November 1893, a further Agreement was signed between the British and German Governments defining the boundary between their respective spheres of influence in the region extending from the Rio del Rey to "a point to the east of, and close to Yola," and on Lake Chad.

Treaties with Native Chiefs.

Between 1884 and 1893 numerous Treaties were concluded by the National Africa Company and by the Royal Niger Company with native Chiefs and others possessing territories in the basin of the Niger districts, by which they engaged to make no cession of territory or to enter into any Treaty negotiations with Foreign States without the previous consent of the British Government, and in return for which they were placed under British protection. (A list of these Treaties is given at page 17, &c.)

NOTIFICATION of the British Protectorate of the Niger Districts. Foreign Office, 5th June, 1885.

It is hereby notified for public information that, under and by virtue of certain Treaties concluded between the month of July last and the present date, and by other lawful means, the territories on the West Coast of Africa, hereinafter referred to as the Niger Districts, were placed under the Protectorate of Her Majesty the Queen from the date of the said Treaties respectively.

The British Protectorate of the Niger Districts comprises the territories on the line of coast between the British Protectorate of Lagos and the right or western bank of the mouth of the Rio del Rey. It further comprises the territories on both banks of the Niger, from its confluence with the River Benué at Lukoja to the sea, as well as the territories on both banks of the Benué, from the confluence up to and including Ibi.

The measures in course of preparation for the administration of justice and the maintenance of peace and good order in the Niger Districts will be duly notified and published.

ROYAL CHARTER.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith. To all to whom these Presents shall come Greeting:—

Whereas an humble Petition has been presented to Us, in Our Council, by the National African Company, Limited. of 34 to 40, Ludgate Hill, in the City of London (hereinafter referred to as "the Company").

And whereas the said Petition states (among other things) that the

And whereas the said Petition states (among other things) that the Petitioner Company was incorporated in the year 1882, under the Companies Acts, 1862 to 1880, as a Company limited by Shares. And that the Capital of the Company is 1,000,000*l*, divided into 100,000 Shares of 10*l*. each, with power to increase. And 91,675 of such shares have been subscribed

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for and issued; and a further 6,000 of such Shares have been subscribed for and are about to be issued, making in all, 97,675 of such shares. And that the objects of the Company, as declared by the Memorandum of Association of the Company, are (amongst others) the following, that is to say:—

To carry on business and to act as merchants, bankers, traders, commission agents, shipowners, carriers, or in any other capacity, in the United Kingdom, Africa, or elsewhere, and to import, export, buy, sell, barter, exchange, pledge, make advances upon, or otherwise deal in goods, produce, articles, and merchandise, according to the custom of merchants, or otherwise.

To form or acquire and carry on trading stations, factories, stores, and depôts in Africa or elsewhere, and to purchase, lease, or otherwise acquire, carry on, develop, or improve any business or any real or personal property in the United Kingdom, Africa, or elsewhere, or any undivided or other interest whatsoever therein

respectively.

To apply for, acquire, and hold any Charters, Acts of Parliament, privileges, monopolies, licences, concessions, patents, or other rights or powers from the British Government, or any other Government or State, or any potentate or local or other authority in Africa or elsewhere; to exercise, carry on, and work any powers, rights, or privileges, so obtained; and to constitute or incorporate the Company as an anonymous or other Society in any foreign Country or State.

To purchase, or otherwise acquire, open and work mines, forests, quarries, fisheries, and manufactories; and to stock, cultivate and improve any of the lands of the Company, erect buildings thereon,

and sell the produce thereof.

To do all other things whatsoever, whether of the like or other nature, which the Company may consider in any way incidental or conducive to the foregoing objects or any of them.

And whereas the Petition further states that the Kings, Chiefs, and peoples of various territories in the basin of the River Niger, in Africa, fully recognising, after many years' experience, the benefits accorded to their countries by their intercourse with the Company and their predecessors, have ceded the whole of their respective territories to the Company by various Acts of Cession specified in the Schedule hereto.

And whereas, in consideration of such Cessions, the Company agreed, amongst other things, not to interfere with any of the native laws and not to encroach on or to interfere with any private property unless the value should be agreed upon by the Owner and the said Company, and payment made of

such value.

And whereas the Petitioners further state that the Company, since their incorporation, have been actively engaged in carrying into effect the objects stated in the aforesaid Memorandum of Association, and have purchased the business of all European traders in the regions aforesaid, and are now the sole European traders there, and are now engaged in developing the resources of such regions and in extending trade further into the interior.

And whereas the Petition further states that the Company and their predecessors, whose businesses they purchased, have, during many years past, expended large sums of money and made great exertions in and about acquiring the confidence of the said native Kings, Chiefs, and peoples, which have resulted in the said cessions of territory, and large expenditure will be incurred in carrying the same into effect and discharging the obligations

arising thereunder.

And whereas the Petition further states that the condition of the natives inhabiting the aforesaid territories would be materially improved, and the development of such territories and those contiguous thereto, and the civilization of their peoples would be greatly advanced if We should think fit to confer on the Company, and the Petitioner Company therefore most humbly pray that We will be graciously pleased to grant by Our Royal Charter authority to accept the full benefit of the several Cessions aforesaid, and all

such other powers and authorities in relation to the premises as to Us may seem meet, subject nevertheless to such conditions as We may think fit to impose.

And whereas the Petition further states that if such authority were conferred on the Petitioner Company they would thereby be enabled to render to Our Dominions services of much value, and to promote the commercial

prosperity of many of Our Subjects.

Now, therefore, We, having taken the said Petition into Our Royal consideration, in Our Council, and being satisfied that the intentions of the Petitioner Company are praiseworthy and deserve encouragement, do hereby will, ordain, grant, and declare as follows, that is to say:—

Authorisation to Company.

1. The said National African Company, Limited (in this Our Charter referred to as "the Company"), is hereby authorised and empowered to hold and retain the full benefit of the several Cessions aforesaid, or any of them, and all rights, interests, authorities, and powers for the purposes of government, preservation of public order, protection of the said territories, or otherwise, of what nature or kind soever, under or by virtue thereof, or resulting therefrom, and ceded to or vested in the Company in, over, or affecting the territories, lands, and property comprised in those several Cessions, or in, over, or affecting any territories, lands, or property, in the neighbourhood of the same, and to hold, use, enjoy, and exercise the same territories, lands, property, rights, interests, authorities, and powers respectively for the purposes of the Company and on the terms of this Our Charter.

Fulfilment by the Company of Promises given.

2. The Company shall be bound by and shall fulfil all and singular the stipulations on their part contained in the Acts of Cession aforesaid, subject to any subsequent agreement affecting those stipulations approved by one of Our Principal Secretaries of State (in this Our Charter referred to as "Our Secretary of State").

British Character of the Company.

3. The Company shall always be and remain British in character and domicile, and shall have its principal Office in England; and its principal representative in the Territories aforesaid, and all the Directors shall always be natural born British subjects, or persons who have been naturalised as British subjects, by or under an Act of Parliament of Our United Kingdom.

Restriction of Transfer by Company.

4. The Company shall not have power to transfer, wholly or in part, the benefit of the Cessions aforesaid, or any of them, except with the consent of Our Secretary of State.

Foreign Powers.

5. If at any time Our Secretary of State thinks fit to dissent from or object to any of the dealings of the Company with any foreign Power, and to make to the Company any suggestion founded on that dissent or objection, the Company shall act in accordance therewith.

Slavery.

6. The Company shall, to the best of its power, discourage and, as far as may be practicable, abolish by degrees any system of domestic servitude existing among the native inhabitants; and no foreigner, whether European or other, shall be allowed to own Slaves of any kind in the Company's territories.

Religions of Inhabitants.

7. The Company as such, or its Officers as such, shall not in any way interfere with the religion of any class or tribe of the people of its territories, or of any of the inhabitants thereof, except so far as may be necessary in the

interests of humanity; and all forms of religious worship and religious ordinances may be exercised within the said territories, and no hindrance shall be offered thereto except as aforesaid.

Administration of Justice to Inhabitants.

8. In the administration of Justice by the Company to the peoples of its territorities, or to any of the inhabitants thereof, careful regard shall always be had to the customs and laws of the class, or tribe, or nation to which the parties respectively belong, especially with respect to the holding, possession, transfer, and disposition of lands and goods, and testate or intestate succession thereto, and marriage, divorce, and legitimacy, and other rights of property and personal rights.

Treatment of Inhabitants Generally.

9. If at any time Our Secretary of State thinks fit to dissent from or object to any part of the proceedings or system of the Company relative to the people of its territories, or to any of the inhabitants thereof, in respect of slavery or religion, or the administration of Justice, or other matter, and to make to the Company any suggestion founded on that dissent or objection, the Company shall act in accordance therewith.

Facilities for British National Ships.

10. The Company shall freely afford all facilities requisite for Our Ships in the harbours of the Company.

Flag.

11. The Company may hoist and use on its buildings, and elsewhere in its territories, and on its vessels, such distinctive flag indicating the British character of the Company as Our Secretary of State and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty shall from time to time approve.

General Powers of Company.

12. The Company is hereby further authorised and empowered, subject to the approval of our Secretary of State, to acquire and take by purchase, cession, or other lawful means, other rights, interests, authorities, or powers of any kind or nature whatever, in, over, or affecting the territories, lands, or property comprised in the several Treaties aforesaid, or any rights, interests, authorities, or powers of any kind or nature whatever, in, over, or affecting other territories, lands, or property in the region aforesaid, and to hold, use, enjoy, and exercise the same for the purposes of the Company, and on the terms of this Our Charter.

Questions of Title.

13. If at any time Our Secretary of State thinks fit to object to the exercise by the Company of any authority or power within any part of the territories comprised in the several Cessions aforesaid, or otherwise acquired by the Company, on the the ground of there being an adverse claim to that part, the Company shall defer to that objection.

Prohibition of Monopoly.

14. Nothing in this Our Charter shall be deemed to authorise the Company to set up or grant any monopoly of trade; and subject only to customs duties and charges as hereby authorised, and to restrictions on importation similar in character to those applicable in our United Kingdom, trade with the Company's territories under our protection shall be free and there shall be no differential treatment of the subjects of any Power as to settlement or access to markets, but foreigners alike with British Subjects will be subject to administrative dispositions in the interests of commerce and of order.

The customs duties and charges hereby authorised shall be levied and applied solely for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses of government, including the administration of justice, the maintenance of

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order, and the performance of Treaty obligations, as herein mentioned and including provision to such extent and in such a manner as our Secretary of State may from time to time allow for repayment of expenses already incurred for the like purposes or otherwise, in relation to the acquisition, maintenance, and execution of Treaty rights.

The Company from time to time, either periodically or otherwise, as may be directed by Our Secretary of State, shall furnish accounts and particulars in such form, and verified, in such manner as he requires, of the rates, incidence, collection, proceeds, and application of such duties, and shall give effect to any direction by him as to any modification of the description, rate, incidence, collection, or application of any such duties.

Conformity to Treaties.

15. The Company shall be subject to and shall perform, observe, and undertake all the obligations and stipulations relating to the River Niger, its affluents, branches, and outlets, or the territories neighbouring thereto, or situate in Africa, contained in and undertaken by Ourselves under the General Act of the Conference of the Great Powers at Berlin, dated the twenty-sixth February, One thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, or in any other Treaty, Agreement, or Arrangement between Ourselves and any other State or Power, whether already made or hereafter to be made.

Foreign Jurisdiction.

16. In all matters relating to the observance of the last preceding Article or to the exercise within the Company's territories for the time being of any jurisdiction exercisable by Us under the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, or the said General Act of the twenty-sixth February, One thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, the Company shall conform to and observe and carry out all such directions as may from time to time be given in that behalf by Our Secretary of State, and the Company shall, at their own expense, appoint all such Officers to perform such duties and provide such Courts and other requisites for the administration of Justice as he directs.

General Provisions.

And We do further will, ordain, and declare that this Our Charter shall be acknowledged by Our Governors, and Our naval and military Officers, and Our Consuls, and Our other Officers in Our Colonies and possessions, and on the high seas and elsewhere, and they shall severally give full force and effect to this Our Charter, and shall recognize and be in all things aiding to the Company and its Officers.

And We do further will, ordain, and declare that this Our Charter shall be taken, construed, and adjudged in the most favourable and beneficial sense for and to the best advantage of the Company, as well in Our Courts in Our United Kingdom, and in Our Courts in Our Colonies or possessions, and in Our Courts in Foreign Countries, or elsewhere, notwithstanding that there may appear to be in this Our Charter any non-recital, mis-recital, uncertainty or imperfection.

And We do further will, ordain, and declare that this Our Charter shall subsist and continue valid, notwithstanding any lawful change in the name of the Company, or in the Articles of Association thereof, such change being made with the previous approval of Our Secretary of State signified under his hand.

And We do, lastly, will, ordain, and declare that in case at any time it is made to appear to Us in Our Council expedient that this Our Charter should be revoked, it shall be lawful for Us, Our heirs and successors, and We do hereby expressly reserve and take to Ourselves, Our heirs and successors, the right and power, by writing, under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom, to revoke this Our Charter, without prejudice to any power to repeal the same by law belonging to Us or them, or to any of Our Courts, Ministers, or Officers, independently of this present declaration and reservation.

It further comprises all territories in the basin of the Niger and its affluents, which are, or may be for the time being, subject to the government of the National African Company, Limited (now called the Royal Niger Company), in accordance with the provisions of the Charter of the said Company, dated the 10th July 1886.

The measures in course of preparation for the administration of justice and the maintenance of peace and good order in the Niger Districts will be duly notified and published.

In consideration of the foregoing, the said National African Company (Limited) bind themselves not to interfere with any of the native laws or customs of the country, consistently with the maintenance of order and good government.

The said National African Company (Limited) agree to pay native owners of land a reasonable amount for any portion they may require.

The said National African Company (Limited) bind themselves to protect the said King and Chiefs from the attacks of any neighbouring aggressive tribes.

In consideration of the above, the said National African Company (Limited) have this day paid the said King and Chiefs of goods to the value of , receipt of which is hereby acknowledged.

As in past times disputes and palavers have arisen among the various European and other strangers and foreigners in the River Niger, and between these and the natives, and, as it is desirable to prevent such disputes and palavers again occurring by making a perpetual settlement, placing under one supreme authority all relations and affairs between the natives of and all strangers and foreigners: Therefore we, the Head Chief and Chiefs, and people of , being assembled in

, and acting in accordance with the laws of our country, do (in consideration of the in goods, receipt of which we hereby acknowledge, and in consideration of the further annual payment mentioned below), hereby promise and bind ourselves and our successors to keep and fulfil the following Articles of this Agreement:—

- 1. We give and grant to the National African Company (Limited) the entire and sole authority to grant, on such terms as that Company may think fit, to European or other strangers and foreigners, the right to trade, to work mines, to cultivate ground, to gather produce of any kind, or to carry on any other occupations in our country; and we agree that we will not grant such rights to, nor deal in any way with, any strangers and foreigners, nor enter into any Treaties whatever with them, without the consent and authority of the National African Company (Limited).
- 2. We promise full liberty and protection to the National African Company (Limited) in carrying on its various trades, mining operations, and all other occupations, and we give and grant to that Company complete freedom and immunity from or other taxes of any kind whatever.
- 3. We agree that the National African Company (Limited) shall have the sole right to supply all other strangers and foreigners with wood and other fuel.
- 4. We agree that the National African Company (Limited) shall have the sole and exclusive right to impose, farm, and retain for its own benefit, all and any duties it may think proper on goods landed by any strangers or foreigners from the river, or on native produce shipped by any strangers or foreigners from the land, and that we will not at any time interfere with that Company in so doing, but will give it every assistance to enforce such duties as acting on our behalf, and with the full authority of the laws of our country.

And I, , on behalf of the National African Company (Limited), having paid to the Chiefs of the above-mentioned in goods, do hereby promise to the Head Chief,

Chiefs, and people of , that, in further consideration of this Agreement, that Company will pay them annually.

On the 21st March 1887, the Royal Niger Company forwarded to the Foreign Office a List of the Treaties of the Company, showing:—

- 1. Which Treaties were inside of the British Protectorate as then already proclaimed, and which partly inside and partly outside; and
- 2. Which Treaties were included in the 37 referred to in the Charter of 10th July, 1886, and which, on the other hand, required the assent of the Secretary of State, under Section 12 of the Charter.

The 37 Treaties referred to in the Charter are marked with an asterisk. On the 10th April, 1894, the Royal Niger Company submitted to the Secretary of State (the Earl of Kimberley), for approval, a revised and completed List of 306 Treaties, which had been concluded by the Company with the Kings, Chiefs, and Peoples of various territories in the basin of the River Niger, in addition to the 37 Treaties enumerated in the Schedule of the Charter. With few exceptions, all these treaties had been duly communicated by the Company to the Secretary of State in previous letters. On the 23rd of April the general approval of these Treaties by the Secretary of State was conveyed to the Company, subject to certain specified conditions, all of which were accepted by the Company on the 27th of the same month.

NOTIFICATION of the British Protectorate of the Niger Coast; to be known as the "Niger Coast Protectorate," and no longer as the "Oil Rivers Protectorate." Foreign Office, 13th May, 1893.

"With reference to the notification in the 'London Gazette' of the 18th October, 1887, respecting the British Protectorate of the Niger Districts, and to certain agreements entered into between the British and German Governments, it is hereby notified, for public information, that the portion of the Protectorate under the administration of Her Majesty's Commissioner and Consul-General will, from the date of this notification, form a separate Protectorate, under the name of the 'Niger Coast Protectorate,' and will cease to be known as the 'Oil Rivers Protectorate.'
"The eastern limit of the line of coast of the Niger Coast Protectorate is

"The eastern limit of the line of coast of the Niger Coast Protectorate is defined in the Agreement between the British and German Governments of the 14th April, 1893."

On the 5th June, 1885, a Notification was published in the "London Gazette" of the establishment of the British Protectorate of the "Niger Districts," but no allusion was made to the "Oil Rivers," but on the 1st January, 1891, Major (now Sir Claude Maxwell) Macdonald, who, in June, 1889, was sent on a Special Mission to the Niger Districts, and in the following year to Berlin, with reference to the delimitation of the boundary between the Oil Rivers Protectorate and the German Colony of Cameroons, was Gazetted as Her Majesty's Commissioner and Consul-General in the Oil Rivers Protectorate and adjoining native territories, &c. The term "Oil Rivers Protectorate" was also employed in the Instructions issued by the Secretary of State on the 22nd February, 1890, under the Order in Council of 15th October, 1889, and in the Agreement between Great Britain and Germany of 14th April, 1893.

The Oil Rivers are the Benin, Escarvos, Warri, Forcados, Brass, St. Nicholas, St. Barbara, St. Bartholomew, Sombrero, New Calabar, Bonny, Andorio (St. Antonio), Opobo, Quo Ibo, Akpayafi, Qua, Cross, and Old

Calabar.
