#### CIVIL APPROPRIATION ACCOUNTS (CLASSES I-V), 1954-55

### REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER AND AUDITOR GENERAL

#### GENERAL

- 1. The Civil Appropriation Accounts for 1954-55 are being published in two volumes, the present volume relating to Classes I-V and the second, to be issued later, to Classes VI-X. The contents of Classes I to IV are substantially the same as in 1953-54, but Class V was reduced by the transfer to Class VI of the Vote for the Ministry of Labour and National Service, and to Class X of the Votes for National Insurance and Family Allowances and the National Assistance Board.
- 2. My examination of the Appropriation Accounts for 1954-55 has followed the general lines described in previous Reports, particular attention being given to the systems of control and accounting used by Departments. I have no general criticism to make of the standards maintained.

#### Excess Votes

3. Excess Votes are required in two cases, viz.:—

Class V, Vote 1.—Ministry of Housing and Local Government. Excess expenditure of £402,758 5s. (see paragraphs 67-8 below).

Class V, Vote 11.—National Health Service, Scotland. Excess expenditure of £122,751 8s. 5d. (see paragraphs 96-7 below).

Excesses of £10 14s. 5d. on Class IV, Vote 4 (Imperial War Museum) and £1,906 15s. 8d. on Class X, Vote 2 (Ministry of Pensions and National Insurance) were due to the extra cost of the scheme for the gradual introduction of equal pay for men and women civil servants, and were accordingly met from the Vote for the Civil Service (Equal Pay Scheme), Class I, Vote 24B, under the arrangements described in paragraph 27 below.

#### Adjustment of Balances on 1953-54 Votes

- 4. The balance to be surrendered out of Civil Votes (Classes I-V) for 1953-54 amounted to £29,648,632 12s. 4d. I certify that this balance has been duly surrendered to the Exchequer.
- 5. The excesses on the Votes for the Charity Commission and the Ministry of Supply (Assistance to Industry, Scrap Recovery, &c.) referred to in paragraph 3 of my last Report on Classes I-V have been made good by Vote of Parliament.

#### Outturn of the Year

6. It will be seen from the summary on pages 2 and 3 that the total amount to be surrendered on Classes I-V of the Civil Votes is £15,943,751 18s. 6d. made up thus:—

9. Particulars of the surpluses on the Votes for Classes VI–X and a statement of the aggregate surplus on the Civil Votes and Votes for Revenue Departments will be included in my Report on the Accounts of Classes VI–X.



#### Extra Receipts

10. Extra receipts payable to the Exchequer recorded in the Appropriation Accounts of the Civil Votes, Classes I-V, amount to £15,831,359 17s. A statement of the aggregate extra receipts on the Civil Votes, Classes I-X, and Votes for Revenue Departments will be included in my Report on the Accounts in Classes VI-X referred to in paragraph 9 above.

#### Store and Stock Accounts

11. Test examinations of the store and stock accounts relating to the Votes for Classes I-V have been carried out by my officers with generally satisfactory results. In the case of Votes for Classes VI-X the results will be dealt with in my separate Report on those Votes, while such comments as I have to make concerning stocks held for trading services are included in my separate Report on Trading Accounts and Balance Sheets, 1954-55 (H.C. 138 of 1955-56).

#### CLASS I, VOTE 2.—HOUSE OF COMMONS

#### Subhead A.4.—Sessional Allowance

- 12. By a Supplementary Estimate of 13 July 1954 (H.C. 215 of 1953-54), provision of £126,000 was made for sessional allowance to Members of Parliament, other than Ministers and Officers of the House, in respect of expenses wholly, necessarily and exclusively incurred by them in the performance of their duties as Members, payable as from 24 May 1954 at the rate of £2 for every day on which the House meets (other than a Friday). The Prime Minister had stated in the House on 8 July 1954 that this allowance would constitute a cash reimbursement, related to the actual sittings at Westminster, of the subsistence and other expenditure which Members are obliged to incur, and that the sum drawn would be deducted by the Inland Revenue from the total expenses on which the Member would otherwise be entitled to claim relief.
- 13. Payments of sessional allowance during the year amounted to £97,232 in respect of about 450 Members. A further 68 Members were ineligible for the allowance and over 100 Members made no claim.
- 14. The allowance has been paid for days on which the House met irrespective of whether the Member actually attended the sittings or not. Payments are made automatically on application by the Member but, as the allowance is intended to reimburse expenses which are wholly, necessarily and exclusively incurred by the Member in the performance of his Parliamentary duties, particulars of the amounts paid to each Member during the financial year are notified to the Inland Revenue Department. If the amount of expenses allowable for Income Tax purposes is found to be less than the sessional allowance drawn, the Department invite the Member to approach the Fees Office. The Member can then arrange with the Fees Office to repay the difference immediately or by deduction from future salary or sessional allowance payments.

#### CLASS I, VOTE 14.—THE MINT

15. Provision for the expenses of the Mint is made by a token vote as the expenditure is considerably less than the receipts. In 1954-55 the excess of receipts over payments was £6,540,882. Receipts are from (a) the banks for issues of new coin for circulation, £9,103,619, (b) other Governments and outside bodies for work undertaken for them, £1,009,055, and (c) the Treasury for silver extracted from withdrawn coins, £3,206,862.

#### Coin issued for circulation

16. United Kingdom coin is put into circulation by issuing it to the banks at face value. The system of cost accounting referred to in the Foreword to the Trading Accounts (H.C. 138 of 1955-56) enables the Mint to ascertain the production cost per 1,000 pieces for each denomination of coin but the cost of metal and manufacture bears no relation to the face value of the coin issued and the difference represents the greater part of the profit (£5,598,209) shown in the Trading Accounts.

#### Work for other Governments, &c.

17. As stated in the Foreword to the Trading Accounts, of the 499,400,527 coins struck by the Mint during the year, 235,661,609 were in discharge of orders by other Governments. The invoiced value of coin produced for other Governments brought to account in the Trading and Profit and Loss Account was £787,166. The work showed a satisfactory rate of profit to the Royal Mint. Sales of medals and miscellaneous work, which produced £99,844 in the year, showed, however, a small loss.

#### Extraction of silver from withdrawn coin

18. Mixed silver and cupro-nickel coin is withdrawn from circulation as it becomes available in the banks and is sorted in the Mint. The cupro-nickel coin sorted out is reissued and the silver coin sent to contractors for refining. So long as the country's requirements of white metal coin continue to expand, or remain static, the withdrawal of the silver coin gives rise to a corresponding demand for the issue of new cupro-nickel. The estimated expenditure on these operations for the year is as follows:—

- 19. Sales of extracted silver as recorded in the Trading Account for the year amounted to £3,185,388. The extracted silver is passed to the Treasury at the market bullion price and is being accumulated by them for ultimate transfer to the United States of America in discharge of lease-lend liabilities, as mentioned in paragraph 22 below. A special investigation carried out by the Mint for the quarter ended 30 June 1955 showed that the cost of sorting, extraction and replacement during the quarter was 1s. 2d. per ounce of fine silver extracted, which (taking the price of silver at 6s. 7d. per ounce) gives an excess of income over expenditure of 5s. 5d. per ounce for this operation.
- 20. Payments to the banks for mixed silver and cupro-nickel coin withdrawn are charged to Subhead I, which is credited with sums received from the banks for cupro-nickel sorted out and reissued. The net charge to the subhead thus represents broadly the value of silver coin sorted out and withdrawn in the year. Eventually, when the withdrawal of silver coin has been concluded, the net charges to the Vote for payments to the banks will have been balanced by receipts appropriated in aid, or handed over as Exchequer Extra Receipts, in respect of the additional issues of new cupro-nickel coin required, in the absence of a contraction in demand, to replace the silver coin withdrawn. Payments to the banks for mixed coin in 1954–55 amounted to £11,278,304 and reissues of cupro-nickel coin to £6,018,600, leaving a net charge of £5,259,704 compared with an estimate of £7,500,000. The subhead was thus overestimated for the year of account by £2,240,296 as compared with an overestimate of £1,989,336 for 1953–54.

#### CLASS I, VOTE 15.—NATIONAL DEBT OFFICE

#### Examination of Accounts of Non-Voted Services

21. Annual accounts of the National Debt Commissioners in respect of non-voted services, made up to 31 March 1955 or to a recognised closing date within the financial year then ended, have been duly rendered. Of these accounts the following are laid before Parliament in pursuance of statutory directions, together with my certificate in each case and such observations as may be necessary:—

County Court Funds Investment Account, Irish Land Purchase Fund Account, Local Loans Fund Accounts, Redemption Stock Sinking Fund Account, and Supreme Court (Deposit and Exchange) Account.

The accounts not laid before Parliament have also been examined by my officers with satisfactory results.

#### CLASS I, VOTE 21.—SILVER

#### Accumulation of Stocks of Silver

- 22. Reference was made in previous Reports to the arrangements under which silver was obtained during the period June 1943 to December 1945 from the United States without payment, subject to an undertaking to return an equivalent quantity within five years after the end of the war. This period has since been defined as ending on 28 April 1957.
- 23. Receipts from the United States under these arrangements amounted to just over 88 million ounces, which, after deduction of certain expenses, realised on sale about £12.5m. Some 5.7 million ounces were sold to certain Dominion and Colonial Governments on condition that a similar amount would be sold back to this country at the same price within five years of the end of the war. These obligations have been met, except for 27,948 ounces still outstanding at 31 March 1955 from three Colonies.
- 24. Since 1946-47, when the Vote of Credit ceased, net provision for silver purchases and sales has been made first on the Miscellaneous Expenses Vote and latterly on the separate Silver Vote. Provision is made to acquire silver from the Royal Mint or from other sources and silver so acquired may be sold as necessary to meet the essential needs of home and export industries or accumulated towards meeting H.M. Government's obligation to the United States Government. The silver is handled and stored by the Royal Mint and by the Bank of England as agents for the Treasury. Between 1946-47 and 1954-55 some 145.5 million ounces were purchased at a cost of £39.3m., the main source of supply being silver extracted from coin withdrawn from circulation (see paragraph 19 above); in the same period 88.5 million ounces were sold for £24.3m.
- 25. Purchases in the year and receipts from sales are shown in the explanatory note to Subhead A of the Account (page 52). These include short-term dealings with members of the silver market involving sales of £2,664,908 and repurchases of £2,646,020. This temporary accommodation of the market results in a small profit to the Treasury who have, in addition, the use of the sale proceeds for the period.
- 26. At 31 March 1955 the Bank of England and the Royal Mint held between them 57 million ounces accumulated at a cost over the period of £15m. About a million and a half further ounces were in stock at that date but had not been paid for by the Treasury. No replacement of the silver loaned by the United States has yet been made.

#### CLASS I, VOTE 24B.—CIVIL SERVICE (EQUAL PAY SCHEME)

- 27. Parliament was informed on 25 January 1955 of a proposed scheme under which the existing scales of pay of most women civil servants would be increased by seven equal annual instalments, beginning on 1 January 1955, so that, on the payment of the seventh instalment their scales would become identical with men's scales. A Supplementary Estimate would be necessary in order to obtain Parliamentary authority for the scheme.
- 28. The Treasury in their Minute dated 2 February 1955 (Cmd. 9380) explained that civil service organisations had not at that date accepted the scheme and if the customary arrangements for the presentation of Supplementary Estimates were to be followed for Departments which needed additional provision in 1954–55, it was not possible to delay their presentation until such acceptance was forthcoming. In these circumstances and following the procedure adopted in the past when similar conditions obtained, it had been decided to present a single Supplementary Estimate, from which advances would be made to any Vote on which there was prospective excess expenditure caused by the introduction of the scheme. The Treasury added that a departure from the general rule that the Vote of each Department should show the cost of the staff of that Department could only be justified in quite exceptional circumstances; in their judgment such circumstances existed in the present case.
- 29. Accordingly, Supplementary Estimate (H.C. 45 of 1954–55) was presented on 4 February 1955, providing £234,000 to meet such part of the additional cost caused by the introduction of the scheme as could not be met from savings on the Votes of the Departments concerned.
- 30. The Account, at page 58, shows expenditure of £1,917 10s. 1d. Of this, £10 14s. 5d. was issued to the Imperial War Museum Vote (Class IV, Vote 4) and £1,906 15s. 8d. to the Ministry of Pensions and National Insurance Vote (Class X, Vote 2). I have satisfied myself that the amounts so allocated do not exceed the relevant expenditure on the Votes concerned.
- 31. The large surplus of £232,082 9s. 11d. is explained by the Accounting Officer as being due to the ability of Departments to meet the increased cost from savings on their respective Votes to a greater extent than had been expected. The footnote to the Account shows that the total expenditure so met amounted to £224,600.

#### CLASS II, VOTE 1.—FOREIGN SERVICE

Subhead D.3.—Initial Cost of Official Transport, &c.

Subhead D.4.—Maintenance and Running Expenses of Official Transport

32. In paragraph 56 of my Report on the Appropriation Accounts in Classes VI to X, 1953-54, I mentioned that the Government Car Service, operated by the Ministry of Works, did not include, inter alia, the cars operated by the Foreign Office. The cost of these cars and of other forms of transport operated at home and abroad by the Foreign Office is borne on the Foreign Service Vote. Expenditure in 1954-55 amounted to £575,000 approximately, of which £112,300 (Subhead D.3) was for new vehicles, £211,700 (part of Subhead D.4) for maintenance and running costs and £251,000 (part of Subheads A.1 and A.2) for the pay of drivers. Receipts credited to Appropriations in Aid included some £77,700, recoveries in respect of transport services, and some £16,000 in respect

of sale of cars. According to returns compiled during the early part of 1955 the Foreign Office fleet, excluding motor-cycles, consisted of 18 vehicles at headquarters in London and 513 vehicles at some 150 oversea posts.

- 33. For the car pool at headquarters, quarterly returns furnished to the Treasury show that, in the 52 weeks ended 23 April 1955, the average running cost, including administration (other than superannuation), depreciation and accommodation was 1s.  $6 \cdot 2d$ . per mile for a total mileage of 247,782. The average cost per mile in the previous year was 1s.  $6 \cdot 4d$ .
- 34. Official transport of some kind is provided at about 150 Foreign Service posts abroad (Diplomatic Missions, Consular and other posts). Individual cars are provided for the use of some 80 Heads of Diplomatic Missions; all other requirements of the post are met from pool transport which consists, according to local requirements, of staff cars, utilities and trucks. The number of vehicles in these pools varies from 25 at Washington to a single vehicle at a number of posts. Foreign Service officers above certain ranks are expected to run their own private cars and a contribution towards the capital cost and provision for running expenses are included in the foreign allowance payable to them. Such officers may not normally make any call on official transport for their personal use. The instructions also provide for the vehicle establishment to be reviewed at regular intervals; for the use of official cars for private purposes to be subject to certain restrictions and to be paid for at a fixed charge, at present one shilling per mile; and for technical reports and returns showing certain costs and mileages for the car pool as a whole.
- 35. The returns furnished, however, do not include the pay of the drivers of cars for the individual use of Heads of Missions, administration expenses, depreciation, insurance, freight on spares, nor, in general, garage rent; and in consequence no comprehensive figure for the running costs of these car pools is available. Such costs as are available show wide variations between different posts mainly because of varying local conditions and the effect of exchange rates. The mileage covered in 1954–55 totalled some 5,800,000. I understand that the Foreign Office rely to a great extent on the Foreign Service Inspectorate (who visit posts abroad at intervals of three years or so) to ensure that the official car pools are economically and efficiently operated.

#### CLASS II, VOTE 3.—BRITISH COUNCIL

#### Audit of Overseas Expenditure

- 36. The Grant in Aid Account includes receipts and payments in 68 overseas countries. As in previous years the local accounts produced to me for expenditure abroad are not generally supported by sub-vouchers but the expenditure is examined locally by members of the internal audit staff, by professional accountants or by auditors of the Oversea Audit Service, whose reports are made available for my inspection.
- 37. For various reasons the audit of local expenditure cannot always follow closely on the end of the year of account, and accordingly the results of examination of certain sections of the expenditure abroad in 1954–55 are not yet available to me.

CLASS II, VOTE 11.—DEVELOPMENT AND WELFARE (COLONIES, &C.)

CLASS II, VOTE 12.—DEVELOPMENT AND WELFARE (FEDERATION OF RHODESIA AND NYASALAND, AND SOUTH AFRICAN HIGH COMMISSION TERRITORIES)

Provision for expenditure under the Colonial Development and Welfare Acts, 1940 to 1955

- 38. As stated in paragraph 29 of my Report for 1946–47, the Colonial Development and Welfare Act, 1945 extended the operation of the Act of 1940 to 31 March 1956 and raised the limit of expenditure permissible to £120m. over the ten years to that date, subject to an annual limit of £17.5m. including not more than £1m. for research. By Acts of 1949 and 1950, the limit of expenditure permissible during the ten-year period was further raised to £140m. and the annual limit to £25m., including £2.5m. for research.
- 39. The Colonial Development and Welfare Act, 1955, which received the Royal Assent on 29 March 1955, extended the operation of the existing Acts to 31 March 1960: it also raised the total provision under the Acts to £220m. and increased the annual limit on expenditure to £30m. of which up to £3m. might be spent on research. As approximately £40m. of the provision made available under the earlier Acts remained unspent at 31 March 1955 and the new Act provided an additional £80m., the total amount available for expenditure in the five-year period to 31 March 1960 is £120m. This will permit an average expenditure of £24m. a year as compared with the actual rate of expenditure of some £14m. a year over the years 1951–1954 and of nearly £16m. in the year 1954–55.
- 40. By circular despatch of 26 April 1955, subsequently published as Cmd. 9462, Colonial Governments were informed that the whole of the sum remaining unspent from the provision under the 1945 and 1950 Acts had already been allocated to them or the central services. Of the new provision of £80m. an aggregate of £14.35m. would be made available for central schemes for research, higher education, higher technical education, surveys, broadcasting, post-selection training for H.M. Oversea Civil Service, &c.; £12.35m., including such financial assistance as may be necessary to safeguard the banana and citrus industries of certain West Indian Governments, would be set aside as a general reserve; and the remaining £53·3m, would be allocated to individual territories on the basis of their relative financial needs. allocations to territories range from £13m. to the Federal and Regional Governments of Nigeria to no further assistance to the Gold Coast, Hong Kong and Singapore other than eligibility for aid from central allocations; they absorb the £10m. advance cover, announced in Parliament on 24 June 1953, including special provision of up to £3m. approved in view of the world rice shortage to finance experiments in rice production in territories where conditions are suitable.
- 41. The new allocations also include sums of £1m. and £500,000 respectively to Nyasaland and Northern Rhodesia, which by the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland (Constitution) Order in Council, 1953, constitute with Southern Rhodesia the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland. Since federation, certain existing colonial development and welfare schemes relating to matters which are a federal responsibility have been transferred to the Federal Government. That Government has become responsible to the Commonwealth Relations Office for the administration and accounting of these schemes and for any new schemes of a similar nature. Accordingly, from 1954–55, provision for such schemes was included in the Vote for Development and Welfare administered by the Commonwealth Relations Office (Class II, Vote 12). Schemes which remain under the administration of the territorial Governments

continue to be accounted for to the Colonial Office and provision for them was included in the Estimate for Development and Welfare (Colonies, &c.) (Class II, Vote 11).

42. At 31 March 1955 commitments for grants and loans approved under the Acts totalled £136,310,410 and total expenditure charged to Development and Welfare Votes and to be set against the amount authorised under the Acts amounted to £101,149,716.

#### CLASS III, VOTE 12.—PUBLIC TRUSTEE

43. A test examination of the Public Trustee's Trust Accounts has been carried out in accordance with the Regulations under the Public Trustee Statutory Rules. The results of the examination, which were satisfactory, have been reported to the Treasury.

#### CLASS IV, VOTE 1.—MINISTRY OF EDUCATION Subhead C.—Grants to Local Education Authorities

#### Teachers' Training Colleges

- 44. Apart from courses provided at University Departments of Education and approved art schools, the training of teachers is conducted at teachers' training colleges maintained by local education authorities and voluntary bodies. In 1953–54 there were 84 local education authority training colleges (64 general, 12 domestic science, 5 physical education and 3 technical) and 54 voluntary training colleges, of which five were not grant-aided.
- 45. It is the practice of the Ministry of Education to analyse and compare the annual accounts rendered to them by the local education authority teachers' training colleges. The analysis for 1953-54 (the latest year for which complete accounts are available) showed that at some 60 general training colleges which were wholly or mainly residential the total cost per student ranged from £232 to £557 per annum. Costs of teaching staff varied from £75 to £180, of clerical and maintenance staff from £10 to £105 and of boarding from £50 to £184 per student. Receipts from students, which were limited to a contribution towards boarding costs assessed on an income basis, averaged £16 per head per annum.
- 46. In view of the considerable variations in cost, not all due to the incidence of unfilled places, I asked the Ministry what steps were taken by them to ascertain the causes of the relatively high costs of certain colleges and whether they were able to satisfy themselves that costs are not excessive and that due regard is paid to economy. In reply the Ministry stated that where their analysis of the annual accounts throws up prima facie evidence that the cost of a college is unduly high, either in general or in respect of particular items of expenditure, the matter is taken up with the local education authority concerned; if adequate explanation of the high costs is not forthcoming, reductions are called for. A more detailed investigation was being made with the cooperation of the authorities of eight selected colleges with the object of establishing more precisely the effect of various factors and of examining the possibility of fixing standard costs for certain items. The report on this investigation was expected
- 47. The Ministry explained that, although the number of vacancies had never been large in relation to the total capacity of the colleges and had fallen considerably since 1953-54, colleges taken into use in conditions of urgency after the last war had been particularly affected by poor recruitment. Other factors affecting the cost per student were the size of the college, suitability of

the premises and its geographical situation. The two colleges with the highest cost per student were both relatively small and were accommodated in old buildings not ideally adapted for the purpose. It was intended to close one of them in 1960 and the other about 1961.

- 48. The total cost of local education authority teachers' training colleges in 1953-54 was (apart from grants to students) about £5m. Under the grant regulations local education authorities maintaining colleges are reimbursed 100 per cent. of the net recognisable expenditure but all authorities, whether maintaining such colleges or not, are required to make a contribution towards the cost. The authorities' contribution is 40 per cent. (allocated among them on the basis of the average number of pupils on the registers in their areas) and the remaining 60 per cent. is a final charge to the Ministry Vote.
- 49. The grants payable by the Ministry to the authorities of voluntary training colleges equal the approved tuition fee and the approved boarding fee less a student's contribution assessed on an income scale. Capital grants not exceeding one-half of approved expenditure are also payable in certain circumstances. The total cost in 1953-54, borne on Subhead D.1, was about £2.9m.

#### Subhead D.3.—College of Aeronautics (Grant in Aid)

- 50. I have referred in previous Reports to the College of Aeronautics which was established in 1946 to provide post-graduate instruction in aeronautical science for those employed in the aircraft industry or in the technical branches of Service and civil aviation and to undertake research in matters relating to aeronautics. The College is financed by grants in aid from the Vote of the Ministry of Education but capital expenditure on works services is a final charge on the Vote for Public Buildings. In 1954–55 issues from the grant in aid amounted to £395,500 and £460,000 is provided in the Estimates for 1955–56.
- 51. The accounts of the College for the year ended 31 March 1955 show that £34,688 was spent on equipment (plant, machinery, &c.) and £564,760 on maintenance. Receipts apart from the grant in aid amounted to £183,091, mainly from tuition and residence fees (£37,400) and contract work undertaken for the aircraft industry, &c. (£84,000). The expenditure included £259,298 for salaries and wages. The College staff at 31 March 1955 numbered 463 of whom 49 were engaged on tuition of about 150 students and 51 were employed solely on research and other services for civil aviation. In addition about 70 Ministry of Works employees are normally engaged on maintenance work, the cost of which is borne by the College.
- 52. The premises and airfield when first occupied by the College were in the ownership of the Air Ministry but have since been vested in the Ministry of Works who charge an annual rental related to the cost of the buildings and capital works provided. The rent paid in 1954–55 was £51,049 which included £14,847 additional assessments for previous years. Capital expenditure on new works and extensions borne on Ministry of Works Votes, 1954–55 (Class VII, Votes 1 and 3) amounted to £54,118.
- 53. The College provides a two-year course for selected students and in my Report for 1947-48 I mentioned that it expected to provide eventually for about 300 students at any one time. During 1954-55 the number of whole-time students in residence averaged 149, made up of 68 first-year and 81 second-year students. In addition short-term courses were held which represented the equivalent of four whole-time students. Of the entrants in 1953 some 30 per cent. were sponsored by Service Departments and Governments and about

40 per cent. were in receipt of grants from local education authorities; less than 20 per cent. were sponsored by aircraft firms and only 5 per cent. paid their own fees. I am informed by the Ministry of Education that the continuance of aid by local education authorities to College students has been under discussion with the authorities and that it has been agreed in principle that local education authorities should not be expected in future to aid post-graduate students of this kind, for whom other arrangements should be made.

54. Particulars of the maintenance cost per student during the last four years are as follows:—

- 55. The fees of £200 per annum (£75 for tuition and £125 for board) charged to United Kingdom students, which were based on institutions regarded as comparable, have remained unchanged since 1946.
- 56. The Governors of the College have for some time had under consideration the desirability of enlisting the support of firms in the aircraft industry both by way of direct financial assistance to the College and in aiding students to attend. In February 1955 the Ministry informed the Governors of the great importance they attached to such a policy. No financial contribution, however, has yet been received from the aircraft industry.

### CLASS IV, VOTE 1.—MINISTRY OF EDUCATION CLASS IV, VOTE 13.—Public Education, Scotland

#### Camps Acts, 1939 and 1945

- 57. Reference was made in previous Reports to payments by the Ministry of Health and the Department of Health for Scotland under the Camps Act, 1939, for the construction, maintenance and management of camps of a permanent character.
- 58. The Act authorised payments by way of grant or loan, up to a maximum of £1,200,000 in all, to recognised companies not trading for profit. Advances were made up to this maximum, namely £1,032,000 to the National Camps Corporation Ltd. for 31 camps constructed in England and Wales and £168,000 to the Scottish Special Housing Association Ltd. for five camps in Scotland. Under the original agreements with these companies, one-half of advances for the provision and equipment of the camps and the whole of advances for working expenses were repayable with interest at 4 per cent. by equal half-yearly instalments over 20 years. The advances to the two companies so repayable amounted to £560,684 and £84,623 respectively; demand for repayment of the other half of the capital advances was to be made only in certain circumstances, e.g. liquidation.

- 59. During the war the camps were used as residential schools for evacuated children. Of the expenditure in that period on the English camps £12,946 was deemed to be of value for peace-time use and thus to constitute an additional liability of the company; one-half (£6,473) was to be treated as a redeemable advance.
- 60. On the return of evacuated children to their homes the camps became available for use by education authorities generally for educational purposes and responsibility for administering the Act was transferred to the Minister of Education by the Camps Act, 1945, and to the Scottish Education Department by direction under the Reorganisation of Offices (Scotland) Act, 1939.

#### (i) Camps in England and Wales

- 61. Because of rises in costs after the war and economy measures on the part of local education authorities the National Camps Corporation Ltd. found itself in financial difficulties and in 1951 and again in 1953 the Ministry of Education, with Treasury consent, extended, by ten years on each occasion, the period of repayment of the redeemable advances. Two camps had to be sold as a result of local developments, and the Corporation were authorised to retain the proceeds. The financial position, however, continued to deteriorate and in September 1955, as there seemed little chance of the company paying its way, the Minister, after formally demanding repayment of the outstanding loans, appointed a receiver to dispose of the assets in the 28 camps then remaining.
- 62. At 31 March 1955 redeemable advances of £296,801 had been repaid, leaving a balance outstanding of £270,356. In addition the Minister will be a creditor for £477,789, being capital advances falling to be repaid on the winding up of the company.

#### (ii) Camps in Scotland

63. To assist the Scottish Special Housing Association Ltd. in the transition from wartime conditions, the Scottish Education Department agreed to meet the deficit on the company's maintenance account from the Education (Scotland) Fund. From 1 April 1947, when ownership and management of the camps was transferred to a new company, Scottish National Camps Association Ltd., the Department agreed to continue grants until the company was able to pay its own way from the income obtained from local education authorities and others using the camps. Although considerable use has been made of the camps each year and several increases in charges have been made since 1949, the company has not been able, in face of rising costs, to pay its way. The following grant payments have been made from the Fund:—

Loan repayments by the companies during the same periods amounted to £62,723, made up of capital (£41,243) and interest (£21,480).

64. The amount of redeemable advances outstanding at 31 March 1955 was £30,692 18s. 8d. The final instalment of capital and interest is due early in 1960. In the event of the Scottish National Camps Association Ltd. being wound up, all property and assets are transferable to the Secretary of State.

### CLASS IV, VOTE 12.—BROADCASTING Home Services (Sound and Television) Subhead A.1.—Grant for General Purposes

- 65. The original Estimate of £14m. for this grant was increased to £17.6m. by a Supplementary Estimate (H.C. 208 of 1953-54) presented on 5 July 1954. Of the increase of £3,600,000, £3,400,000 represented further grant estimated to become payable to the British Broadcasting Corporation as a result of an increase in the fee for a television receiving licence from £2 to £3 with effect from 1 June 1954. The balance of £200,000 represented additional grant arising partly from an alteration in the terms of the Agreement with the Corporation and partly from an adjustment in respect of the grant for 1953-54. The grant payable to the Corporation from 1 April 1953 for Home Services (Sound and Television) under the provisions of an Agreement dated 12 June 1952 (Cmd. 8579) had been equal to 86 per cent. of the net revenue from broadcast receiving licences. This Agreement was revised by a Supplemental Agreement dated 28 June 1954 (Cmd. 9196), which provides that the Postmaster General shall, out of such aids or supplies as from time to time may be appropriated by Parliament therefor, pay to the Corporation:—(a) in respect of the year ended 31 March 1955 a sum equal to the net licence revenue less £2m.; (b) in respect of each of the two following years a sum equal to the net licence revenue less £2.75m.; and (c) in respect of the remainder of the term of the present Licence, which expires on 30 June 1962, such sum as the Treasury may authorise. The "net licence revenue" consists of all sums received by the Postmaster General in respect of the issue of broadcast receiving licences less a sum equal to the expenses incurred by him in relation to broadcasting services within the British Islands.
- 66. Although Post Office accounts and returns provide information from which a reasonably reliable estimate can be made, in the later months of a financial year, of the licence revenue likely to be received in that year, neither the licence revenue nor the amount of the expenses incurred can be ascertained with complete accuracy until after the close of the year. Payments to the Corporation, within the amount granted by Parliament, are made in instalments during the year and an adjustment is made in the following year for the balance of the sum finally found to be due. In previous years the amount to be adjusted has been relatively small. In January 1955, however, it became apparent that the difference between the Parliamentary grant and the sum due under the Agreement would be substantial. The actual sum due to the Corporation under the Agreement for the year under review, after allowing for the contribution to the Exchequer of £2m. and expenses of the Postmaster General amounting to £1,583,942, proved to be £19,317,250, including £447,908 brought forward from the previous year. Payments to the Corporation during the year were, however, limited to £17,600,000, the amount of the Parliamentary grant, leaving £1,717,250 to be met from the grant for the year 1955-56.

### CLASS V, VOTE 1.—MINISTRY OF HOUSING AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT Excess Expenditure

67. The Account shows that expenditure on Subhead B.1 (Grants under the Rural Water Supplies and Sewerage Acts, 1944 and 1951) exceeded the Estimate by £639,882 5s. The Treasury sanctioned the meeting of £237,124 of this excess from the savings on Subheads B.2 (Grants in respect of Water and Sewerage Services in Development Areas) and D.2 (Grants to Local Authorities under the Town Development Act, 1952) but did not consider that the use of savings elsewhere on the Vote to meet the balance of the excess could properly

be authorised without the authority of Parliament. It is proposed to apply to Parliament for an Excess Vote in respect of the balance of the excess viz.: £402,758 5s. and for authority to apply the sum of £402,748 5s. out of the balance of the savings on other subheads of the Vote towards meeting it, leaving a token sum of £10 to be voted as a Supply grant.

68. The excess on Subhead B.1 was due to the earlier submission of claims by local authorities consequent on the publication of the Rural Water Supplies and Sewerage Bill on 4 February 1955. Whereas the Act of 1944 provided that, with certain exceptions, grants were to be paid as lump sums, the Bill proposed to authorise the Minister to pay grants, including those outstanding under the 1944 Act, either in the form of lump sums or of periodical payments. Grant claims paid in England in February and March 1955 amounted to £501,965 and £899,920 respectively compared with a monthly average of £359,000 over the preceding ten months.

### CLASS V, VOTE 2.—HOUSING, ENGLAND AND WALES Subhead C.—Emergency Housing Services

- 69. In paragraphs 52-60 of their Third Report the Public Accounts Committee of 1951-52 reviewed and commented on the cost to the Exchequer of emergency housing in requisitioned properties. The subsequent Treasury Minute of 18 November 1952 and evidence given to the Public Accounts Committee of 1952-53 described the measures being taken to secure a progressive reduction in the cost of the service. In addition to terminating the Ministry's liability for costs incurred in rest centres after March 1953, the measures included a request to local authorities to make regular reviews of charges to occupants and urged upon them the speediest practicable release of requisitioned properties.
- 70. Expenditure on emergency housing charged in the present Account is £15,634,421 and receipts amount to £9,979,937 bringing the totals for the nine years to 31 March 1955 to £138,813,266 and £65,855,994 respectively.
- 71. The expenditure is mainly incurred on the accommodation of families in requisitioned dwellings, the number of which fell from 87,878 at 31 March 1951 (including 58,183 in the London Region) to 59,467 at 31 March 1955 (including 47,902 in the London Region). Summaries of quarterly returns furnished by local authorities to the Ministry show that the number of families housed averaged 136,739 in 1950–51 and was 106,289 at 31 March 1954, the latest date for which complete returns are available. Some of these properties are used as "halfway houses" in which each family has at least one room but shares cooking and other facilities with other occupants. The average number of families so accommodated in 1950–51 was 1,375; in 1953–54 it was 2,241, including an estimated number of 236 in "halfway houses" converted by the London County Council from rest centres for which precise figures of numbers and cost are not yet available. In addition, approximately 32,900 families were accommodated in hutments, camps, &c., during 1950–51 and 21,900 at 31 March 1954.
- 72. The summaries also show that the average gross cost per family in requisitioned dwellings other than "halfway houses", excluding capital costs, rose from £90 14s. in 1950-51 to £95 2s. in 1953-54. The average rent paid by occupiers rose from £51 14s. in 1950-51 to £58 10s. in 1953-54 leaving net losses of £39 and £36 12s. for these years. For families in "halfway houses" the average gross cost, excluding capital expenditure, rose from £99 6s. in 1950-51

to £107 19s. in 1953-54. Receipts from occupiers rose from £43 9s. in 1950-51 to £51 5s. in 1953-54 leaving net losses of £55 17s. and £56 14s. for these years. Incomplete returns for 1954-55 indicate some reductions, compared with 1953-54, in gross and net costs per family in both types of dwelling.

- 73. Capital expenditure on requisitioned dwellings consists of the cost of adaptations, initial repairs and miscellaneous expenditure, and of terminal compensation to owners under Section 2 (1) (b) of the Compensation (Defence) Act, 1939. In 1950-51 expenditure amounted to £886,600 of which £414,300 consisted of compensation to owners. Incomplete returns for 1954-55 show capital expenditure of £1,714,100 including £1,683,000 compensation to owners. The increase in the compensation cost is attributable to the progres, made in releasing properties and settling owners' claims.
- 74. Under the Requisitioned Houses and Housing (Amendment) Act, 1955, which came into effect on 6 June 1955, the power of the Minister to retain possession of requisitioned houses was terminated and the right to possession was vested in the appropriate local authority until not later than 31 March 1960. The Act provides that the Minister shall reimburse expenditure by local authorities on terminal compensation and shall meet 100 per cent. of deficits, as assessed by him, incurred in connection with requisitioned houses for the period ending 31 March 1956, and 75 per cent. of such deficits incurred in the years 1956-57 to 1959-60. The Act also provides for special grants to be paid where the Minister is satisfied that net expenditure to be borne by local authorities in any financial year after 31 March 1956 is greater than reasonable, and for contributions towards the lease or cost of purchase of houses by local authorities required for former occupants of requisitioned houses.

#### CLASS V. VOTE 2.—HOUSING, ENGLAND AND WALES CLASS V, VOTE 12.—HOUSING, SCOTLAND

Guarantees of Excess Advances made by Building Societies for House Purchase

- 75. Section 5 of the Housing Act, 1949, provides that in England and Wales, with the approval of the Minister, a local authority may guarantee the repayment to a building society of any advances with interest thereon made by the society to its members to enable them to build or acquire houses. Where a local authority guarantees not more than two-thirds of the excess of an advance over the sum which would normally be advanced without the guarantee, the Minister may, with the consent of the Treasury, undertake to reimburse the authority one-half of any loss suffered by them under the terms of the guarantee.
- 76. In May 1954 with Treasury approval the Ministry of Housing and Local Government issued details of two schemes under which the Minister was prepared to accept liability under the above statutory provisions. Scheme A provided that, where an intending purchaser was able to put down only a 10 per cent. deposit on a dwelling worth (purchase price or valuation whichever is the lower) up to £2,500, the Minister would reimburse one-half of any loss sustained by a local authority as a result of a guarantee extending to two-thirds of the principal of, and interest on, the difference between the 90 per cent. advance actually made by the building society and a 70 per cent. advance. Scheme B provided that where the purchaser was able to put down only 5 per cent. on a post-1918 dwelling worth up to £2,000 the Minister would reimburse one-half of any loss sustained as a result of a guarantee extending to two-thirds of the principal of, and interest on, the difference between the 95 per cent. advance actually made and a 66% per cent. advance.

- 77. These two schemes were replaced in September 1955 by a single scheme to apply to dwellings worth up to £2,500. The maximum advance remains at 95 per cent. for post-1918 houses and 90 per cent. for others; but the normal advance above which the guarantee operates is governed by a sliding scale and depends upon the amount of the deposit made by the borrower, the larger the sum deposited the greater the normal advance under the scale. The Minister will not reimburse any loss in a case where the normal advance would be 80 per cent. or more.
- 78. When sanctioning the Ministry's original schemes the Treasury required further authority to be sought when the contingent Exchequer liability under the guarantees approached £2m. By 31 March 1955 guarantees had been given in respect of approximately 10,000 houses, the estimated contingent liability being £1,200,000. In November 1955 the Ministry informed the Treasury that the contingent Exchequer liability might then be around £2m. and that they thought there would be a continuing liability of at least that amount.
- 79. Broadly comparable schemes have been introduced in Scotland under Section 77 (2) of the Housing (Scotland) Act, 1950.

### CLASS V, VOTE 5.—NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE, ENGLAND AND WALES Subheads K.10 (England) and KK.10 (Wales)

#### Ambulance Services

80. Responsibility for the provision of ambulance transport required for the National Health Service in England and Wales, apart from vehicles required at hospitals for internal and inter-hospital use, rests with local health authorities whose net expenditure on the service approved by the Minister ranks for grant from the National Health Service Vote at 50 per cent. The following table showing the amounts of grant charged to Votes over the past few years indicates the continuing growth of expenditure by authorities on the service:—

81. Following the recommendation by the Public Accounts Committee of Session 1952-53, in paragraph 28 of their Third Report, that the Health Departments should make further efforts to examine the costs of local authority services which involve large payments from voted moneys, the Ministry have undertaken advisory surveys of the ambulance services of some 40 county councils or county borough councils in England and Wales. The authorities selected provided a representative cross section and together incurred about one-half of the total expenditure on the service. The conclusions drawn in interim reports on the results of the majority of these surveys are that with a few exceptions local authorities have organised their ambulance services in an economical manner and that, while increased costs of wages and materials are a contributing factor to the rising costs, the main factor is the increase in the demand made on the services, particularly by hospitals, whose requirements account for over 70 per cent. of the total demand. The increase was attributed partly to a lowering of the standards observed in deciding if an ambulance

should be provided; and partly to an increase in the numbers requiring transport to hospital for out-patient treatment and a tendency on the part of hospitals to discharge in-patients at the earliest possible stage with the consequence that transport is required to convey them to and from hospital for subsequent out-patient treatment, sometimes over long periods. Although real abuse of the service was found to be rare, there was at some hospitals too great a tendency to take for granted the availability of the service and a degree of laxity in ordering transport which resulted in uneconomical use of the service; the fact that hospitals were not responsible financially for the cost of the service did not help to keep demands down. The service is provided by both county councils and county borough councils. Reciprocal arrangements between county councils were found to be generally satisfactory but such arrangements between county councils and county borough councils were said to leave much to be desired in many areas.

82. The Ministry have notified individually the authorities covered by the surveys of any recommendations for improving the efficiency of their services. Most of the authorities have accepted the recommendations and are taking action accordingly. The Ministry have also drawn the attention of hospital authorities, where necessary, to survey reports which have indicated some degree of administrative laxity on their part in the ordering of ambulance transport.

CLASS V, VOTE 5.—NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE, ENGLAND AND WALES CLASS V, VOTE 11.—NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE, SCOTLAND Subheads F (England), FF (Wales) and F (Scotland) General Medical Services

Remuneration of General Medical Practitioners

- 83. The remuneration of doctors for National Health Service patients on their lists is paid from a Central Pool covering Great Britain, the main distribution being based on capitation rates. As I mentioned in paragraphs 69 and 70 of my Report for 1951–52, the size of the Pool for 1950–51 was determined in March 1952 by an independent adjudicator who adjusted his award by reference to the number of doctors in the service and not to the population as formerly had been the practice: the award also increased the "betterment" factor to be applied to doctors' pre-war net earnings to reflect current conditions. This award necessitated recalculation of the Central Pool for the years 1948–49 to 1951–52.
- 84. Following the adjudication of 1952 the amount of the Central Pool for each year has been calculated on the broad principle that it should provide a sum, which, together with the Exchequer contribution for superannuation and all professional earnings including income from private practice, will give doctors on average an income, after deducting practice expenses, equal to the corresponding average income under the award. The Pools for 1952–53 and 1953–54 have now been finally determined at £50,441,837 and £53,605,500 respectively, the increase being mainly due to the increased number of doctors in practice. Pending the final determinations, provisional distributions were made currently. Since 1 April 1953, following the recommendations of a working party of representatives of the Health Departments and the British Medical Association, these provisional distributions have been made at the annual capitation rate of 17s. for each Health Service patient on a doctor's list, with an additional 10s. for every patient within the range of 501 to 1,500.

85. In calculating the Pools for 1952-53 and 1953-54 practice expenses were taken as 32·3 and 33·4 per cent. respectively of gross professional earnings. In arriving at these figures the Ministry were guided by the results of sample inquiries undertaken by the Board of Inland Revenue. The Board however have indicated their unwillingness to continue these inquiries annually. In the light of this the Ministry proposed to the British Medical Association that a joint working party should be set up to consider a workable scheme for keeping the practice expenses percentage up to date in the years when no Inland Revenue investigation is undertaken. The Association felt however that it would be more satisfactory to continue the present arrangement of joint discussion rather than set up an entirely new body whose findings would then have to be submitted to both sides.

86. Further in the course of my examination of the Pools for 1952-53 and 1953-54, I noticed that the Ministry had assumed a figure of £2m. as representing the receipts by doctors from private practice. This was the figure adopted by the adjudicator as representing the 1950-51 receipts from this source and was, I understand, an estimate. I have inquired of the Ministry as to the evidence upon which they based their assumption that receipts from private practice have remained at the level of £2m. for years subsequent to 1950-51.

### Subheads G (England), GG (Wales) and H (Scotland).—Chemists' Remuneration General

- 87. The Public Accounts Committee of Session 1955-56 referred in paragraph 19 of their Third Report to the continued inability of the Health Departments to give an assurance, based on ascertained facts, that payments to chemists for dispensing prescriptions under the Health Service were fair and reasonable; they considered this most regrettable and trusted that every effort would be made to complete the inquiries and negotiations then proceeding so that the propriety of chemists' remuneration could be further considered in the current Session in the light of actual results. The present position is summarised in the following paragraphs.
- 88. In England and Wales the information received from some 500 chemists concerning their earnings and expenses is being assembled preparatory to the production of a joint report by the accountants of both sides. I have recently inquired as to the progress made.
- 89. In Scotland the information needed for a review of chemists' remuneration was made available to the Department of Health in March 1955 in a joint report by accountants representing the chemists and the Department. From this report it appears that during 1952, the year reviewed, the payments to chemists at tariff rates had, after allowing for all costs, including depreciation and 5 per cent. on working capital, resulted in a surplus of  $3 \cdot 33d$ . per prescription. In April 1955 the Department informed the Treasury of this excess, adding that in their opinion the report had, moreover, overstated the chemists' expenses for certain major items; on the other hand there was no doubt that chemists' overhead expenses had risen since 1952 and this might absorb some part of the excess payment.
- 90. In the Department's view the information in the report would have justified an interim reduction in the rates of payment for Health Service dispensing. They considered, however, that Whitley negotiations on remuneration would have to be an essential preliminary and that these would have been unprofitable if embarked upon before the facts in the accountants' report had been examined

objectively in joint discussions. Accordingly, in May 1955, while making it clear that they reserved the right to propose a reduction at any time, they invited the chemists' representatives to join in discussions. The Department added that the chemists' representatives were now cooperating in the further inquiries and it was hoped to complete the field work early in 1956. The question of altering the rates of remuneration would then have to be considered in the light of the information obtained.

#### Purchase by chemists of drugs on terms more favourable than tariff prices

- 91. Payments to chemists comprise the cost of the ingredients used in making up prescriptions, an addition of 25 per cent. for oncosts, certain allowances and a dispensing fee. The prices paid for standard drugs or non-proprietary preparations are determined in accordance with a prescribed drug tariff based on wholesale prices. While, however, it is normal trade practice for wholesale prices to vary with the quantity purchased, the prices listed in the drug tariff are based on the quantities in which it is reasonable to expect the average chemist to buy. In consequence the larger chemists who can buy at more advantageous rates may make a profit from reimbursement at tariff rates. Moreover it appears that some large chemists may make private settlements with suppliers for rebates or concessions which go beyond the advertised arrangements for discounts.
- 92. The Ministry informed the Treasury in January 1955 that they had not hitherto considered it practicable to introduce differential tariff rates for chemists. The Treasury, however, pressed the Ministry to make vigorous efforts to secure for the Exchequer benefit from the fact that some chemists buy their supplies at less than the drug tariff prices. In March 1955 the Ministry approached the Association of British Pharmaceutical Industry with a view to arranging a small exploratory investigation at manufacturers and wholesalers to establish the actual prices paid by chemists to suppliers for widely prescribed standard drugs and preparations; but eventually, in October 1955, the Association declined to take part. I have recently asked the Ministry for information on the progress made in this matter, and for confirmation that their inquiries will cover proprietary preparations as well as standard drugs and non-proprietary preparations.
- 93. In Scotland inquiries so far have taken the form of a brief sample check to establish whether or not there was any significant variation between the net prices paid by chemists and the drug tariff rates. If the sample check suggests that the variation is significant a more detailed study will be undertaken.

Subheads I (England), II (Wales) and I (Scotland).—Remuneration of Opticians

94. I mentioned in paragraph 107 of my last Report that questions relating to the remuneration of opticians participating in the supplementary ophthalmic services were within the province of the optical Whitley Council for the National Health Service. A questionnaire designed to elicit all necessary information about earnings and costs had been sent in November 1954 to a number of representative opticians and the replies and accompanying financial statements would be examined by accountants advising each side of the Whitley Council. It was hoped that these inquiries would enable the Management Side of the Council and the Ministry to assess the reasonableness of opticians' remuneration for services rendered to the Health Service.

#### CLASS V, VOTES 5 & 11—contd.

95. The Ministry informed me in December 1955 that questionnaires were sent to 740 opticians but only 168 satisfactorily completed replies had been received: more were expected but it seemed unlikely that the numbers would be sufficient to raise the total to more than 220. If only this number were received the Management Side of the Whitley Council would consider the response as being disappointingly low, and they were therefore arranging to discuss the situation with the Staff Side.

### CLASS V, VOTE 11.—NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE, SCOTLAND Subheads P.1, P.2 and P.3.—Civil Defence Services Excess Expenditure

96. The Account shows under Civil Defence Services that expenditure charged to Subhead P.1 (Capital Expenditure) and P.3 (Purchase and Storage of Materials for Reserve) exceeded the Estimate by £11,970 1s. 3d. and £121,083 13s. 10d. respectively, while on Subhead P.2 (Current Expenditure) there was a saving of £10,302 6s. 8d. The Treasury sanctioned the application of the saving on Subhead P.2 towards making good the excesses on Subheads P.1 and P.3 but did not consider that the use of savings elsewhere on the Vote to meet the balance of the excesses could properly be authorised without the authority of Parliament. They explained to the Department that civil defence expenditure was too unlike the other subheads from which provision could be drawn for virement to be appropriate. It is proposed to apply to Parliament for an Excess Vote in respect of the balance of the excesses, viz., £122,751 8s. 5d. and for authority to apply the sum of £122,741 8s. 5d. out of the balance of the savings on other subheads of the Vote towards meeting it, leaving a token sum of £10 to be voted as a Supply grant.

97. The overspending was mainly due to an unexpected claim from the Ministry of Health in respect of canvas bought in 1952–53 and used for tentage. The Department were not aware that their previous payments to the Ministry for tentage had covered only the cost of making up the canvas and not the cost of the material; and the further claim was received too late for provision to be made in the Supplementary Estimate.

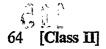

A net saving of £45,000 was realised on those Missions and Services which were separately estimated for, due mainly to reductions in the size of delegations and to fewer meetings. This saving was partly offset by an excess over the provisions for other Missions and Services, including unforeseen items.

B.—For political and administrative reasons information activity involving operational expenditure was not at the level anticipated. Savings arose in Germany on the provision for sponsored visitors.

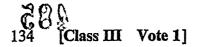

C.—The expenditure of local education authorities on which grant payments in 1954–55 were based proved somewhat lower than estimated and the product of a penny rate proved rather more than estimated. The saving in grant resulting in the main from these two factors amounted to approximately £1,760,000 and not £1,690,000 as anticipated in the Supplementary Estimate. The additional charge to this subhead in 1954–55 for grant on the cost of the provision of milk for drinking in grant-aided schools from 1 October 1954 was £5,000,000 approximately. This was met in part from the Supplementary Vote of £3,310,000 and in part from the above-mentioned saving.

The cost of the provision of milk for drinking in grant-aided schools to 30 September 1954 and in non-grant-aided schools for the whole year was borne on the Vote for the Ministry of Food (Class VIII, Vote 10) and amounted to £6,282,972.

Objects of an estimated value of £3,066 were found to be missing from the Victoria and Albert Museum up to 31 March 1955 as a result of stocktaking which is still in progress. To certain other objects which were recovered from this employee, damage had been caused to an estimated value of £50 (SS.10/258/01, SS.10/236/04).

Various items of early radiotherapy apparatus valued at about £320 were transferred as gifts from the Science Museum to the Wellcome Historical Medical Museum (SS.80/01).

## Teachers' (Superannuation) Act, 1925 Estimated position of Scheme at 31 March 1955

The credit balance in the Account of Revenue and Expenditure kept in accordance with Section 15 of the Act amounted to approximately £247m. and the Government Actuary estimated that the deficiency on the Scheme, after taking account of that balance, was about £201m.

The estimated deficiency does not include any liability in respect of pre-1922 service (the whole of which falls on the Exchequer), or any liability in respect of schemes set up under Section 21(1)(a) of the Act for which separate accounts are prepared.

In estimating the deficiency, use has been made of the data obtained for the 1948 actuarial review, adjusted as far as possible for changes in salary scales up to and including the 1954 Burnham award.

It is expected that the deficiency will, under existing law, tend to increase.

As from 6 August 1946 milk for drinking has been supplied to pupils in Primary and Secondary Schools without charge. Before 1 October 1954 the total cost was borne on the Vote for the Ministry of Food, but from that date the supply of milk to pupils in education authority schools has been the responsibility of education authorities, and the cost has been met from the Public Education Scotland Vote. In addition to the sum of £708,450 for that purpose borne on the Vote for Public Education, Scotland, a sum of £750,865 was borne on the Vote for the Ministry of Food (Class VIII, Vote 10) in 1954–55, of which £693,089 was for grant-aided schools.

In connection with the provision of school meals premises extra-contractual payments amounting to £2,279 were made by the Ministry of Works. These payments were mainly due to delay in delivery of supplies.

ESTIMATED POSITION OF THE SCOTTISH TEACHERS' SUPERANNUATION SCHEME AT 31 MARCH 1955. The credit balance in the Account of Revenue and Expenditure kept in accordance with section 106 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1946, amounted to approximately £39m. and the Government Actuary estimated that the deficiency on the Scheme, after taking account of that balance, was about £27m.

The estimated deficiency does not include any liability in respect of pre-1922 service, the whole of the cost of which falls to be met by the Exchequer.

In estimating the deficiency, use has been made of the data obtained for the 1948 actuarial review, adjusted as far as possible for changes in salary scales up to and including those operative from 1 April 1954.

It is expected that the deficiency will, under existing law, tend to increase.

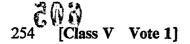

Subhead M.2.—Includes three extra-contractual payments of £309, £300 and £225 made by the Ministry of Works under delegated powers for additional constructional costs due to difficult working conditions arising from increased security measures, shortage of materials, &c.

Subhead N.3.—Includes an overpayment of compensation allowance of £14 written off under delegated powers.

Subhead O.—Includes extra-statutory payments of superannuation benefits (65 cases) and transfer values (2 cases) made to avoid anomalies pending amendment of Regulations or to prevent hardship. An overpayment of pension of £216 (£196 charged in a previous year) was written off with Treasury authority (ED.102/365/01).

The Civil Defence (Grant) Regulations, 1953, came into operation on 1 January 1954.

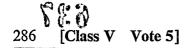
Subhead Z.—Claims abandoned, &c.:—

- (i) Private accommodation for ex-officers requiring in-patient treatment for their accepted disabilities is provided in beds made available under Section 4 of the National Health Service Act, 1946. Charges under that section were borne by the Ministry of Pensions up to 31 August 1953. During the year of account charges amounting to £2,662 were borne by the Ministry of Health by abatement of Appropriations in Aid (SS.5/36/01).
- (ii) £151, being arrears of rent of a cottage occupied by a Ministry of Works employee, was written off with Treasury approval (SS.80/08).
- (iii) Recovery of cost of controlled drugs supplied for treatment of private patients was waived, under delegated powers, in three cases amounting to £36.
- (iv) £4, being arrears of superannuation contributions due in one case, was waived under delegated powers.

Loss of stores, &c., written off under delegated powers:—

- (i) Miscellaneous deficiencies revealed at stocktaking (£471) (surpluses amounted to £476) in the directly administered hospitals and clinics, &c.
- (ii) Losses and breakages in transit of medical, &c., stores (£38).

Details of losses, &c., incurred by Hospital Authorities and Executive Councils will be set out in the Summarised Accounts presented under Section 55(4) of the National Health Service Act, 1946.



#### Notes—contd.

During the year five properties, vested in the Minister and valued at £82,650 and farm stock and equipment valued at £1,291, were transferred without payment to other Government Departments.

A private mental hospital was acquired by the Minister under Section 58 of the National Health Service Act, 1946, and administered by the Regional Hospital Board as from 1 April 1954, but completion of purchase was not effected until 2 July 1954. So as to give the transferred staff the benefit of the National Health Service (Superannuation) Regulations, 1950 to 1952, the hospital was regarded, with Treasury authority, as being acquired on 1 April 1954.

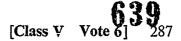
The gross amounts charged to Subheads B and BB consist of (1) cash advances by the Minister and (2) superannuation contributions and other receipts retained by Hospital Authorities in lieu of advances. Payments made by the Authorities include certain agency payments made on behalf of the Minister. The amounts shown in this Account are net after these agency payments have been transferred to their proper subheads. The receipts under (2) above are accounted for under Subhead Z as Appropriations in Aid or as receipts of other classes. The figures of receipts and agency payments used in this Account are based on special returns compiled by the Authorities from their accounts as prepared for audit and may differ to a small extent from the audited figures. In 1953–54 the differences resulted in a net undercharge to the Vote of £5,225 (undercharges £13,627, overcharges £8,402) an under-credit to Appropriations in Aid of £2,431 and an undercredit to Exchequer Extra Receipts of £2,596.

#### **Notes**

General.—Following the publication in 1953 of the report on "Clinical Research in relation to the National Health Service", the Clinical Research Board commenced its work in 1954. The published 1954–55 estimate for the Medical Research Council included provision for an appropriate expansion of Clinical Research, and this was shown as a separate item under each of the lettered subheads of the detailed estimate. It was later decided that since this additional financial provision represented the estimated cost of the extension of existing researches, it should be added to the various expense items under each lettered subhead and not shown separately. Some further provision for other new work was treated in the same way. The published estimate for 1955–56 was designed to give effect to this decision, the comparative 1954–55 figures being appropriately amended. The form of the 1954–55 accounts has been similarly amended.

- A.—Overspending of £5,020, largely due to the incidence of unexpected structural repairs to the building of the headquarters office.
- B.—Underspending of £5,092, largely due to the reduction of expenditure on central purchase of equipment and supplies for research units.
- D.1.—Expenditure includes a loss of £114 incurred by the staff canteen operated by the Council at the Medical Research Council Laboratories, Hampstead.
- D.2.—Overspending of £5,100, due to development and reorganisation of the Gambia Laboratories to an extent not foreseen.

J.6.—Saving due mainly to (a) the abandonment of the plans to build a Health Centre at Glenrothes (£8,000), (b) the delay in reaching agreement with contractors on final measurements for work done at Sighthill Health Centre (£11,500) and (c) payments for work done at Stranraer Health Centre being less than expected (£4,000).

K.1 and K.2.—The amounts paid to local authorities in settlement of final claims and in the form of advances were less than expected (K.1, £52,000; K.2, £28,000) after providing for £20,000 for advances against new expenditure incurred on the distribution of welfare foods. Reapportionment of clinic costs and the salaries of nurses employed on combined duties (midwifery, health visiting, home nursing, vaccination) resulted in savings on K.1 (£4,000) and K.2 (£10,000) which have been added to the expenditure on K.5 and K.4 respectively.

K.4, K.5, K.6 and K.8.—The amounts paid to local authorities in settlement of final claims and in the form of advances were more than expected (K.4, £6,000; K.5, £5,400; K.6, £11,600; K.8, £11,300). The excess expenditure on K.4 and K.5 was increased by £10,000 and £4,000 respectively as the result of reapportionment of clinic costs and the salaries of nurses employed on combined duties (see note on K.1 and K.2).

A.—Excess expenditure due to authorised increases in salary scales (£1,812); partly offset by savings due to staff changes (£768) and restriction of overtime (£217).

B.—Savings due to travelling and removal expenses being less than anticipated.

C.—Savings due principally to expenditure on laundry and window cleaning being less than expected.

E.—Savings due to reduction in staff (£820) and to restriction of overtime (£573) to a greater extent than seemed possible; partly offset by authorised increases in salary scales (£390).

F.—Savings due principally to travelling being less than expected.
