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COLONIAL DEVELOPMENT PLANS GENERALLY APPROVED DURING 1949-50

Fiji

The Fiji Plan is a revision of that which was submitted for approval in 1945. The whole of the original plan has been radically re-cast to place greater emphasis upon projects of a definite economic value, i.e. to provide for more development and less welfare. The new Plan envisages a total expenditure of $\pounds F4,264,115$. Of this sum, approximately $\pounds F1,163,310$ will be provided from Colonial Development and Welfare funds, $\pounds F1,086,690$ from local revenues, and $\pounds 2,000,000$ from loans, of which it is hoped to raise $\pounds \frac{3}{4}$ million locally, leaving $\pounds 1\frac{1}{4}$ million to be obtained from outside the Colony. Since the plan was prepared, however, the revenue surplus for 1949 and the estimated surplus for 1950 have made possible an increase in the contribution from local revenues. As a result it is probable that the overseas loan requirement will now be not more than $\pounds F1,000,000$.

Since the Colony's economy is principally dependent upon agricultural products a large part of the Plan is devoted to the production and development of natural resources, a sum of \pounds F1,531,942 (including \pounds F566,000 for a hydroelectric scheme) representing 36 per cent. of the whole, being set aside for schemes under this head. For schemes classified under the heads of Communications and General and Social Services, sums of \pounds F1,455,490 and \pounds F1,091,622 respectively have been allocated. In particular the Plan provides for the expenditure of \pounds F615,092 on agricultural research and land development, \pounds F367,422 on medical services, and \pounds F684,991 on education and other social services. Provision is also made for a contribution of one-sixth of the cost of an international airport, estimated at \pounds F340,000. It is however doubtful whether the international airport will in fact be built in the form originally proposed and this money may instead be used to inaugurate a local air service.

Dominica

In drawing up the Dominica Plan account had to be taken of the fact that the Colony is grant-aided and can contribute little towards development expenditure from its own resources.

The Plan, the emphasis of which is on agricultural development, provides in its final form for a total expenditure of £1,057,000 of which £536,000 will be obtained from Colonial Development and Welfare funds and £300,000 raised by loans, the remainder being made up by investment by the Colonial Development Corporation in citrus fruit packing sheds and cold storage plant, hydro-electricity, and purchase of a citrus estate. The Plan includes provision for a four-year road programme costing £350,000.

Aden

Approval has also been given to a revised Development Plan for the Colony of Aden, which does not, however, involve an increase in Aden's allocation of Colonial Development and Welfare moneys.

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Jamaica

In Jamaica the 10-year Development Plan has been revised so as to reduce the total cost by over £1 million and to lessen the burden of priority recurrent expenditure by some 40 per cent.

Uganda

A revised Plan for Uganda has been approved which, although not greatly altering the balance of the Plan as originally prepared, involves a new financial principle whereby development expenditure is integrated with the normal cost of administration.
