

**ASSESSMENT OF THE ROLE OF THE LEGISLATURE IN ENHANCING
FOOD SECURITY IN NIGERIA: STUDY OF THE 9TH SENATE**

ABSTRACT

This study examined the legislative role of the Nigerian Senate in advancing food security between 2019 and 2023, with particular focus on the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development. It evaluated the number and scope of food-related bills and motions, assessed the effectiveness of oversight activities, and identified key challenges affecting implementation.

The study adopted a qualitative research design and is guided by Institutional Theory and Governance Theory to understand how legislative actions influenced food policy outcomes. Adopting the purposive sampling technique, the study conducted interviews on key informants selected from a population comprising members of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development, Ministry officials, members of the civil society, and so on. The study utilised the content analysis for the analysis of data and the thematic approach for the presentation of its findings.

Findings showed that the Senate demonstrated a strong legislative interest in food security through the sponsorship of major bills such as the Food Security (Establishment, etc.) Bill and the National Food Reserve Agency Bill. These bills addressed issues including food storage, agricultural research, and market regulation. Despite this, the study found a clear gap between legislative activity and implementation. National budgetary allocations to agriculture remained below the 10% target set by the Maputo Declaration, limiting the impact of approved legislation. Interviews revealed that many executive agencies lacked either the capacity or willingness to carry out mandates outlined in the bills, leaving key laws unimplemented. It was also found that the committee carried out oversight through field visits, debates, and motions, targeting agricultural programmes such as the Anchor Borrowers Programme and food import regulations. The challenges leading to food insecurity were identified to include smuggling and trade irregularities, non-implementation of resolutions by Ministries Department and Agencies, weak inter-agency coordination, insecurity and the absence of enforcement mechanisms for oversight findings. Other challenges were poor public expenditure on agriculture and political interference in project execution.

Given the challenges identified, the study made far-reaching recommendations which includes: institutionalising capacity building for legislatures and committee staff, improved synergy between the committee and executive institutions under its jurisdictions, prioritizing legislation on food security issues, strengthening oversight through digital tools and real time data, enhancing public participation through local consultation and combating predominant insecurity and insurgency in Northern Nigeria. The study concluded that although the Senate played a visible legislative role in promoting food security, poor implementation, weak enforcement capacity, and political obstacles hindered its impact. Stronger coordination between the legislature and executive arm of government is required to ensure that enacted laws result in tangible improvements in Nigeria's food system.

CHAPTER ONE

INTRODUCTION

1.1. Background to the Study

Food security is a fundamental requirement for national stability, economic growth, and public welfare (Olawale, 2021). The ability of a country to ensure the availability, accessibility, and affordability of food for its citizens is a key indicator of effective governance (Akinola, 2018). In Nigeria, achieving food security remains a major challenge due to factors such as inconsistent agricultural policies, inadequate infrastructure, climate change, insecurity, and poor investment in the agricultural sector (Yusuf & Adeyemi, 2020). As the legislative arm of government, the National Assembly plays a central role in shaping policies and laws that impact food production, distribution, and access (Eze & Ojo, 2019). The Senate, through its Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development, is tasked with legislative oversight, policy formulation, and budgetary allocations aimed at promoting food security in the country (Senate Standing Order, 2022, As Amended)

The Nigerian Senate derives its legislative authority from Section 4 of the 1999 Constitution (as altered), which empowers it to make laws for the peace, order, and good governance of the country. This authority includes enacting policies that enhance food production, rural development, and agricultural sustainability. The Senate is also responsible for overseeing the executive's implementation of agricultural programs and ensuring accountability in the utilization of public resources meant for food security initiatives. The role of the legislature in this regard is to promote agricultural growth through strategic legislation, funding allocations, and oversight functions that drive efficiency and productivity within the sector.

Despite the importance of the Senate's role, several issues have raised concerns about the effectiveness of its interventions in food security. For instance, Akinola (2018) and Yusuf & Adeyemi (2020) observed separately weaknesses in policy consistency, lack of effective oversight of agricultural agencies, and the inability to enforce accountability in government initiatives aimed at boosting food production. Eze & Ojo (2019) also report that mismanagement of agricultural funds, poor legislative coordination with executive agencies, and delays in passing critical bills related to food security have contributed to concerns about the Senate's effectiveness. In fact, the lack of strong enforcement mechanisms to ensure that agricultural policies are implemented as intended has further weakened the impact of legislative actions on food security outcomes.

As Olawale (2021) also notes, corruption in public institutions, poor budget implementation, and political interference in agricultural policies have undermined food security efforts. Expressly, several agricultural initiatives have failed to yield the expected results due to poor legislative oversight and weak enforcement of regulations. As a result, public perception of the legislature's role in enhancing food security has been shaped by these challenges, with many questioning the Senate's commitment to ensuring the sustainability of agricultural policies. Nevertheless, the role of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development, that is the effectiveness of legislative interventions between 2019 and 2023, is crucial in enhancing food security in Nigeria. Against this background, this study evaluates the role of the Nigerian Senate in enhancing food security, focusing on the activities of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development between 2019 and 2023. To this end, the study examines the effectiveness of legislative interventions, the oversight of agricultural agencies, and the impact of budgetary allocations on food security initiatives. To determine the strategies for strengthening legislative

actions in the agricultural sector, it is essential to understand the extent to which the Senate has influenced policies and programmes aimed at improving food security. As food security remains a pressing issue, this study provides an understanding of the legislature's role in addressing the challenges of food availability, accessibility, and affordability in Nigeria.

1.2. Statement of the Problem

The role of the legislature in shaping policies and ensuring accountability is central to addressing national challenges, including food security. The Nigerian Senate, through its legislative, oversight, and representative functions, is expected to contribute to agricultural development and food security. Section 4 of the 1999 Constitution (as altered) empowers the National Assembly to make laws that promote national development, yet Nigeria continues to struggle with food insecurity, worsened by poor agricultural policies, inadequate funding, and weak implementation mechanisms. Despite the establishment of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development to oversee agricultural policies and programmes, concerns persist regarding the committee's effectiveness in driving legislative actions that translate into tangible improvements in food production, distribution, and accessibility (Adebayo et al., 2020; Okonkwo & Yusuf, 2021).

The performance of the Senate in enhancing food security has been questioned due to delays in passing agricultural-related bills, ineffective oversight of budget allocations, and weak enforcement of policies aimed at boosting agricultural productivity (Eze & Ojo, 2022; Lawal, 2023). Allegations of mismanagement, policy inconsistencies, and inadequate legislative intervention have further contributed to declining public confidence in the Senate's ability to address food security challenges. The gap between legislative intent and policy outcomes raises

concerns about the effectiveness of the Senate's interventions in ensuring sustainable agricultural growth and food sufficiency.

The disconnect between legislative efforts and food security outcomes presents a serious governance issue. While the Senate is expected to ensure oversight accountability and policy continuity, its role in enhancing food security in Nigeria by assessing the effect of its oversight activities, law making and representative functions remains largely undocumented. Hence, assessing its performance in this regard would provide lessons for the present and subsequent Senate that can help strengthen the role of the Senate in particular and the National Assembly in general towards food security in Nigeria. Against this backdrop, this study examined the role of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development (2019-2023) in enhancing food security by raising the question: how effective was the Senate in addressing Nigeria's food security challenges between 2019 and 2023?

1.3. Research Questions

The following research questions guided the study:

- i) What are the existing legislative frameworks and policies related to food security in Nigeria?
- ii) How has the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development performed in its oversight function of the agricultural sector?
- iii) How effective have the committee's oversight functions been in promoting food security?
- iv) What are the key challenges faced by the Committee in carrying out its legislative and oversight responsibilities?

1.4. Objectives of the Study

The broad objective of this study is to examine the role of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development in enhancing food security in Nigeria. The specific objectives are to:

- i) Identify the legislative frameworks and policies related to food security in Nigeria;
- ii) Assess the performance of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development in its oversight functions;
- iii) Evaluate the effectiveness of the Committee's oversight in promoting food security; and
- iv) Examine the challenges faced by the Committee in performing its legislative duties and propose strategies for improvement.

1.5. Significance of the Study

This study is significant in several ways. Theoretically, it contributes to the understanding of legislative involvement in agricultural policy and food security within a developing economy. It provides an empirical basis for evaluating how the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development has influenced policy decisions, resource allocation, and oversight functions to address food insecurity. In fact, the study enhances knowledge of the relationship between governance and sustainable food systems by analysing legislative actions.

In practical terms, the study identifies the extent to which the legislature has shaped policies aimed at improving agricultural productivity, food availability, and rural development. Methodologically, the research work examines the several legislative approaches in promoting food security index. Expectedly, examining the role of the Senate in addressing food security challenges offers a basis for policy recommendations that strengthen legislative effectiveness. If gaps in legislative engagement are identified, the findings will inform necessary reforms to improve institutional responsiveness in tackling food insecurity.

This study also assesses Nigeria's broader efforts in ensuring food security through legislative mechanisms. The findings will support evidence-based policy adjustments that enhance the Senate's ability to create laws and oversee their implementation in ways that align with national

food security goals. The study provides recommendations that will help lawmakers improve policy frameworks, promote accountability, and ensure that legislative efforts contribute to reducing food insecurity by evaluating the effectiveness of legislative actions.

1.6. Scope and Limitations of the Study

This study assessed the role of the legislature in enhancing food security in Nigeria, with a focus on the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development from 2019 to 2023. Food security remains a critical issue in Nigeria, and legislative actions are important in shaping policies, budgetary allocations, and oversight functions in the agricultural sector. The study examined the extent to which the Senate Committee influenced agricultural policies, oversight the agricultural sector, and addressed challenges affecting food security.

The scope of the study was limited to the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development. The study did not extend to the House of Representatives or State Houses of Assembly. The focus was on legislative actions related to food security, excluding broader economic or environmental factors. The study relied on legislative records (sessional reports), policy documents, and key informant interviews with relevant stakeholders.

These limitations affected the generalization of findings beyond the Senate Committee. However, insights from the study can inform legislative efforts at other levels of government. The findings were restricted to the 2019–2023 periods but provided an assessment of how the Senate Committee contributed to food security policies. The study's conclusions aimed at strengthening legislative engagement in addressing food security challenges in Nigeria.

1.7. Organisation of the Study

The study is organized into five clear chapters. Chapter One introduces the study through the background, problem statement, questions, objectives, significance and limitations. It previews

subsequent chapters. In chapter two, an extensive literature review was done to evaluate scholarly works and perspectives germane to the subject matter. The Institutional and Governance Theories were adopted to conceptualise the study.

The methodology is then explained in chapter three. This included the research design, population, data collection sources, sample size, sampling procedures, method of data presentation and analysis. Chapter four presents the results in an organized manner and tied to the research objectives. It also discusses the results and findings from the field. Chapter five presents the summary, conclusion and recommendations based on the findings. It further presents the research's contributions to knowledge.

CHAPTER TWO

LITERATURE REVIEW AND THEORETICAL FRAMEWORK

This chapter reviews literary works related to the study and explores the theoretical perspective of the study. It covers reviews on the basic concepts of the study, the empirical review and the theoretical review.

2.1 Literature Review

2.1.1 Conceptual Review

Food “security is a critical aspect of national development and human survival. Food security is the state in which every individual has consistent and unrestricted access to an adequate supply of food that is safe, nutritious, and aligns with their dietary requirements and preferences, enabling them to maintain an active and healthy lifestyle. Household food security refers to the implementation of this idea at the family level, with a specific focus on individuals within families. The Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) defines food security as a condition in which all people, at all times, have physical, social, and economic access to sufficient, safe, and nutritious food that meets their dietary needs and food preferences for an active and healthy life. This definition highlights the multidimensional nature of food security, encompassing availability, access, utilization, and stability. According to Eke & Ojo (2020), food security in Nigeria remains a significant challenge due to socio-economic instability and climate variability.

Food security involves access and availability of food stuff, stability of supplies and the quality of the diet. National food security in that regard implies guaranteed quantity, quality, availability, stability, and affordability of food for a nation. To achieve food security, therefore, a strategy, which is a general plan to achieve one or more long-term or overall goals under conditions of

uncertainty must be carefully designed (Abubakar, 2021). Based on these definitions, food security can be seen in different levels; availability, accessibility, utilization and stability of supply.

2.1.1.1 Food Availability

Food availability refers to the production, distribution, and exchange of food. A nation must ensure a stable supply of food through domestic production, imports, and food aid. In Nigeria, agricultural production has been significantly affected by poor infrastructure, insecurity, and inconsistent policies, which limit the availability of essential food items (Adebayo, 2018). Supporting this assertion, Eze & Okonkwo (2019) emphasize that inadequate investment in agriculture and post-harvest losses contribute to food shortages, further aggravating food insecurity.

2.1.1.2 Food Accessibility

Food access focuses on individuals' ability to acquire sufficient food, which is influenced by income levels, food prices, and market dynamics. Sen (1981) argues that food insecurity is often a result of economic access rather than overall food shortages. In Nigeria, inflation and unemployment rates have contributed to declining purchasing power, limiting access to nutritious food, particularly for vulnerable populations (Adetunji, 2021). Furthermore, regional disparities in food access are evident, with rural areas experiencing higher levels of food insecurity compared to urban centers (Ogunyemi & Akinwale, 2022)".

2.1.1.3 Food Utilization

Food utilization involves the proper biological use of food, requiring adequate diet, clean water, sanitation, and healthcare to achieve nutritional well-being. Poor health infrastructure and

inadequate access to clean water have affected food utilization in Nigeria, leading to malnutrition and diet-related diseases (Nwachukwu & Uchenna, 2020). The prevalence of undernutrition, particularly among children under five, remains high, reflecting poor dietary intake and food consumption patterns.

2.1.1.4 Food Stability

Food stability ensures that food availability, access, and utilization are consistent over time and not affected by sudden shocks such as economic crises, conflicts, or climate change. Nigeria's food security is often threatened by climate-related shocks, including droughts, floods, and desertification, which reduce agricultural productivity and disrupt food supply chains (Okafor, 2021). Political instability and insecurity, particularly in the northern regions, have further exacerbated instability in food production and distribution (Yusuf & Ibrahim, 2023).

Globally, food security remains a major challenge, particularly in developing regions. The United Nations Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 2 aims to achieve zero hunger by 2030, emphasizing the importance of agricultural development, food distribution systems, and policy frameworks. Despite global efforts, food insecurity persists, with Sub-Saharan Africa being one of the most affected regions due to economic instability, climate change, and governance challenges (FAO, 2022).

In Nigeria, food security has remained a pressing issue due to factors such as population growth, climate change, poor agricultural policies, and insecurity. The National Policy on Food and Nutrition (NPFN) and the Agricultural Promotion Policy (APP) were introduced to enhance food security, yet challenges persist. Studies indicate that food insecurity in Nigeria is exacerbated by weak institutional frameworks, poor funding of the agricultural sector, and inadequate infrastructure, thereby hindering access to sufficient, safe, and nutritious food for the population

(Ojo & Adebayo, 2019). However, Nigeria has struggled with food insecurity due to factors such as rapid population growth, climate change, and conflicts, particularly in the northern regions where insurgency and banditry disrupt agricultural activities (Ojo & Adebayo, 2021). Rising inflation and economic instability have further exacerbated food insecurity, making staple foods unaffordable for many households. According to the World Food Programme (WFP), an estimated 25 million Nigerians are at risk of food insecurity, with millions facing acute hunger, especially in states affected by violence and displacement (WFP, 2023).

Osabohien, Adeleye & De Alwis, (2020) “maintained that the growing challenge of food security and attaining this desired goal in Africa and in Nigeria have been bedeviled by recent trends in population growth, increasing levels of inflation, political instability in the region, climate change issues, and terror group activities. Abdulmalik (2020) opined that Nigeria is vulnerable to economic shocks, which could eventually result in food insecurity as a result of its dependence on importation. Nigeria still depends heavily on food imports to meet its food and dietary requirements. Given the high cost of importing food, it seems likely that a sizable portion of the enormous sum of foreign exchange intended for the import of capital for development goals will be diverted to the import of food. Joshua et al (2024) commented that the problem regarding food security was made worse by the COVID-19 pandemic. The country’s already precarious value chains, which include people’s capacity to grow, prepare, and distribute food, were seriously impacted by the pandemic. Market fluctuations and agricultural production have a serious negative influence on livelihoods, especially for the most disadvantaged households.

Agricultural productivity in Nigeria is constrained by inadequate infrastructure, poor investment in modern farming techniques, and inconsistent government policies. Despite being endowed with vast arable land and a favorable climate for agriculture, Nigeria remains heavily reliant on

food imports to meet domestic demand (Eze & Chukwu, 2020). Smallholder farmers, who produce the majority of the country's food, often lack access to credit, mechanized equipment, and improved seeds, reducing their yield and overall contribution to food security (Adesina, 2019)". Furthermore, climate-related factors such as desertification, flooding, and irregular rainfall patterns negatively impact food production, leading to frequent food shortages. Government interventions, such as the Anchor Borrowers' Programme (ABP) and other agricultural policies, have aimed to boost food production, but their implementation has been hampered by corruption, poor coordination, and inadequate funding (Akinyele, 2022).

"The Federal Ministry of Budget and Economic Planning (2024) reported that over 31.8m Nigerians are suffering from acute food insecurity compounded with malnutrition among women and children in the Country. This assessment supports the statistics provided by a 2024 Cadre Harmonise report, Food Insecurity and Malnutrition Analysis, which asserted that the deterioration in food security in Nigeria was expected to plunge an overwhelming 33.1 million people into high levels of acute food insecurity during the lean season (June-August) of 2024. According to the report, the surge in food commodity prices which is as a result of the removal of fuel subsidy in addition to security challenges has placed millions of Nigerians in a precarious situation; adding that persistent violence in the northeast, and the effect of climate change remain notable drivers of food insecurity in the country.

Addressing food insecurity in Nigeria requires a multi-faceted approach involving policy reforms, investment in modern agriculture, and improved security measures to protect farmers. The government needs to strengthen rural infrastructure, enhance storage facilities, and promote climate-resilient agricultural practices to ensure sustainable food production" (Ojo & Adebayo, 2021). Diversifying the economy to reduce over-reliance on oil revenue and investing in

agribusiness could improve employment opportunities and increase food availability. International partnerships and donor agencies also play a role in addressing food insecurity through targeted interventions such as food aid and capacity-building programs for farmers (WFP, 2023). Without urgent and sustained efforts, food insecurity will continue to pose a significant threat to Nigeria's economic stability and overall development. According to Adedokun (2021), meeting the ambitious Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) of zero hunger, to eradicate hunger and malnutrition by 2030, Africa and other developing regions have a critical role in sustaining global food supply by adopting innovative agricultural practices and boosting exports, which can help ensure long-term food security.

Several indicators are used to assess food security in Nigeria. The prevalence of undernourishment, which measures the percentage of the population with insufficient caloric intake, is a key indicator used to determine food insecurity levels. Another measure, the Food Consumption Score (FCS), assesses dietary diversity and food frequency, helping to understand food consumption patterns in households. The Household Food Insecurity Access Scale (HFIAS) is also widely employed to evaluate food access constraints and economic barriers to sufficient nutrition. Also, the Agricultural Productivity Index measures domestic food production efficiency and highlights areas requiring policy intervention (National Bureau of Statistics, 2021). Addressing food security in Nigeria requires a multisector approach, integrating policy reforms, increased investment in agriculture, and enhanced legislative oversight to ensure effective implementation of food security strategies.

2.1.1.5 The Role of the Legislature in Governance

The nature of the legislature in Nigeria is defined by a bicameral structure consisting of the National Assembly, which is the legislative arm of the federal government. This assembly is

made up of two chambers: the House of Representatives and the Senate. The Senate is the upper chamber and is responsible for representing Nigeria's 36 states and the Federal Capital Territory (FCT). Its primary functions include lawmaking, oversight of executive actions, and approving presidential appointments, such as federal judges, ministers, and ambassadors (Akinyemi & Ogunyemi, 2020). The Senate plays a crucial role in reviewing and passing legislation proposed by the House of Representatives, and it also conducts oversight on the activities of the executive to ensure compliance with the law. Senators are elected for four-year terms and are expected to reflect the interests of their states while working towards national development.

The structure of the Senate is designed to provide regional balance in the representation of Nigeria's diverse ethnic and regional groups. Each state, regardless of its population size, is allocated three seats in the Senate, while the FCT has one. This unique arrangement ensures that smaller states are not underrepresented, thus promoting inclusivity in the legislative process (Mimiko, 2018). The Senate's legislative procedures are governed by a series of rules, including the Nigerian Constitution and its Standing Orders, which dictate the conduct of Senate sessions and the responsibilities of various committees. The Senate plays a significant role in shaping Nigeria's policies, particularly in areas related to national security, foreign relations, and economic development, by serving as a forum for critical debates and deliberations on national issues (Akinyemi & Ogunyemi, 2020).

The legislature plays a pivotal role in governance, serving as the arm of government responsible for lawmaking, oversight, and representation. As one of the three branches of government, the legislature ensures checks and balances, preventing the concentration of power in the executive and judiciary. According to Barkan (2009), an effective legislature strengthens democracy by formulating policies that reflect the interests of the people, scrutinizing government activities,

and ensuring accountability. The Nigerian Senate, as the upper chamber of the National Assembly, is central to legislative processes that influence governance and policy formulation.

One of the primary functions of the legislature is lawmaking. The Senate in Nigeria is vested with the authority to initiate, review, amend, and pass bills that shape the country's legal and institutional framework. These legislative measures address diverse issues, including economic policies, national security, and social welfare (Ojo, 2016). The lawmaking process involves deliberation, committee scrutiny, and public hearings to ensure inclusivity and effectiveness. Studies indicate that legislative debates and stakeholder engagements enhance the quality of laws and foster public trust in governance (Okeke & Uche, 2020).

Legislative oversight is another crucial role of the Senate. Oversight functions enable the legislature to monitor the implementation of policies, ensuring that government agencies and ministries operate within the confines of the law. The Senate achieves this through investigative hearings, budget reviews, and performance evaluations of government programs (Ogunyemi, 2018). Research suggests that robust oversight mechanisms reduce corruption, improve policy implementation, and promote transparency in governance (Arowolo & Adepoju, 2021). In Nigeria, Senate committees, such as the Public Accounts Committee and Committee on Appropriations, play instrumental roles in ensuring government accountability and fiscal responsibility.

Representation is a fundamental function of the Senate, ensuring that diverse interests across Nigeria's geopolitical zones are articulated in national policymaking. Senators represent their constituencies by advocating for policies that address regional development, social welfare, and economic growth. According to Nwosu (2017), effective legislative representation fosters national unity and enhances citizen participation in governance. The Nigerian Senate also

engages in constituency projects, responding to local needs such as infrastructure development, education, and healthcare.

The role of the Senate extends to its involvement in budgetary processes. The 1999 Nigerian Constitution as amended, section 88 grants the legislature the power to scrutinize, amend, and approve the national budget before implementation. This function ensures that government expenditures align with national priorities and that funds are allocated efficiently (Eze & Adebayo, 2019). Studies indicate that legislative input in budget processes enhances fiscal discipline and reduces financial mismanagement (Obi & Chukwu, 2020). However, challenges such as executive-legislative conflicts, delayed budget approvals, and political influences sometimes hinder the effectiveness of legislative budgetary oversight.

The Senate also plays a role in treaty ratification and foreign relations. As stipulated in section 12 of the Nigerian Constitution, international agreements require Senate approval before domestication. This function ensures that treaties align with national interests and legal frameworks (Akinyemi, 2021). The Senate participates in inter-parliamentary engagements, fostering diplomatic relations and legislative collaboration with other countries and regional organizations.

Despite these essential functions, the effectiveness of the Senate in governance is influenced by several challenges. Political interference, inadequate capacity-building and limited resources sometimes undermines legislative efficiency (Afolabi, 2022). Strengthening legislative institutions through reforms, capacity-building initiatives, and enhanced public participation can improve the Senate's role in governance.

2.1.1.6 Legislative Oversight in Policy Formulation and Implementation

In the context of this study, legislative oversight plays a crucial role in ensuring that policies, once formulated, are implemented effectively and align with the broader goals of the nation. In Nigeria, legislative oversight entails monitoring executive actions during policy formulation and implementation. Lawmakers hold public officials accountable by evaluating outcomes, ensuring proper resources utilization, and assessing policy impact. This oversight promotes transparency, deters misuse of authority, and enhances governance effectiveness.

The role of the legislature in policy formulation and implementation is enshrined in section 88 of the Nigerian Constitution, which mandates lawmakers to review and approve budgets, pass necessary laws, and oversee executive actions. Effective legislative oversight includes the assessment of policy proposals, questioning government officials during public hearings, and ensuring that policies are in line with the national interest. In policy formulation, legislative oversight can influence the direction of national policies by shaping public debate and introducing amendments to proposed policies. Legislators often review bills and policy proposals thoroughly to ensure that they align with national priorities and are inclusive of public needs. The role of legislative committees, such as those in the Nigerian Senate, in shaping food security policies is crucial. Through extensive deliberations, committee members can propose adjustments to policies, ensuring that they address the real needs of the populace (Ogunleye et al., 2020). In the area of policy implementation, legislative oversight ensures that laws passed by the parliament are enforced properly, making sure that adequate resources are allocated for their execution. Effective oversight contributes to the reduction of corruption and waste in the implementation of policies by demanding accountability from the executive branch (Akinyele, 2018).

One of the key benefits of legislative oversight in policy implementation is its potential to identify and correct flaws in government programs before they become entrenched. When legislatures actively monitor the progress of policies, they can recommend adjustments and improvements. In some cases, they can also pressure the executive to allocate additional resources to critical areas. Furthermore, legislative oversight can improve public trust in government by demonstrating a commitment to transparency and accountability. In sectors like food security, for example, oversight ensures that policies designed to alleviate hunger and malnutrition is well-implemented and that resources reach the intended beneficiaries.

In practice, however, the effectiveness of this oversight is often constrained by factors such as insufficient technical expertise, lack of political will, and weak institutional capacity. Despite these challenges, strong legislative oversight can lead to more responsive and accountable governance, helping to improve the implementation of policies in sectors like health, education, and food security.

2.1.1.7 The Impact of Legislative Interventions on National Development

Legislative interventions play a pivotal role in driving national development, as the legislature can influence a range of policy areas, from economic growth to social welfare. Legislators, through their policy actions and decisions, can impact the development trajectory of a country by passing laws that promote economic stability, social justice, and environmental sustainability. In Nigeria, for example, legislative interventions in areas such as agriculture, education, and infrastructure have contributed to various development outcomes. One of the primary ways legislators contribute to national development is through the enactment of legislation that fosters economic growth and development. This can include passing laws that promote the diversification of the economy, encourage foreign investment, and create jobs.

One of the most significant impacts of legislative interventions is their ability to influence resource allocation. Through the power of the purse, the legislature approves national budgets that determine how government resources are allocated to various sectors. By prioritizing sectors like education, healthcare, and infrastructure, legislative bodies can directly influence the pace and quality of national development. In some instances, legislators have also introduced reforms aimed at improving governance, tackling corruption, and ensuring that development projects are implemented efficiently. Such legislative actions can create an environment that fosters growth, reduces inequality, and promotes sustainable development.

The role of the legislature in food security and poverty alleviation is another area where their intervention can significantly influence national development. Legislative actions, such as the passage of bills like the "Right to Food Bill," have the potential to alleviate hunger and improve the living standards of citizens, especially in rural areas (Eze, 2023). Legislative bodies like the Nigerian National Assembly have the power to shape policies that can enhance agricultural productivity, support smallholder farmers, and improve the overall food security situation in the country. Moreover, legislative interventions can help redirect resources and guide government action towards national priorities, ensuring that interventions are targeted and effective in achieving broad-based national development (Baffoe & Lartey, 2021). However, the effectiveness of these interventions depends on factors such as political stability, institutional strength, and the capacity of the legislature to pass laws that can be adequately implemented.

2.1.1.8 Legislative Role in Enhancing Food Security

As the primary lawmaking body, the National Assembly, particularly the Senate, is responsible for formulating legislative frameworks that promote food production, distribution, and accessibility. As spelt out in the Senate Order (2022) as amended, the Senate Committee on

Agriculture and Rural Development has jurisdiction on agricultural production and marketing, stabilizing prices of agricultural products and commodities (excluding distribution outside Nigeria), animal husbandry and disease control, crop-insurance and soil conservation, dairy products, extension of farm credit and farm security, forestry, inspection of livestock and meat products, plant industry, soil conservation, agricultural engineering, commodities exchange, rural development, fisheries, poultry and agricultural inputs including fertilizers, production of farm products and distribution. Over the years, legislative interventions have sought to address issues such as land tenure, security, agricultural financing, and climate resilience in food production. However, challenges such as policy inconsistency, weak implementation, and inadequate legislative oversight have limited the effectiveness of these efforts (Adebayo, 2021).

Several legislative instruments have been enacted to address food security challenges in Nigeria. Key among them is the National Agricultural Policy, which aims to enhance agricultural productivity through mechanization, improved seed distribution, and sustainable land use (Ogunbameru, 2019). The Land Use Act of 1978 also plays a crucial role by governing land ownership and access, which is fundamental for agricultural expansion. The Nigerian Agricultural Promotion Policy (APP), also known as the "Green Alternative," was introduced to boost local food production and reduce dependence on food imports (Eze & Chukwu, 2020). Despite these policies, gaps in enforcement and inadequate infrastructure continue to hinder their impact, necessitating more proactive legislative oversight and amendments to address emerging challenges.

Another important way the legislature influences food security is through budgetary allocations. The Nigerian Senate plays a key role in reviewing and approving financial provisions for the agricultural sector. However, over the years, budgetary allocations to agriculture have remained

below the 10% benchmark recommended by the Maputo Declaration on Agriculture and Food Security (Adesina, 2019). Despite various government interventions, including the Anchor Borrowers' Programme and the Agricultural Credit Guarantee Scheme, funding inconsistencies and delays in appropriation often undermine the effectiveness of these initiatives. Legislative scrutiny is therefore crucial to ensuring timely disbursement and effective utilization of allocated resources for food security programs (Ojo & Adebayo, 2021).

The Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development plays a pivotal role in shaping Nigeria's food security policies. This committee is responsible for evaluating agricultural policies, monitoring government agencies' performance in food production, and recommending legislative measures to enhance agricultural productivity (Mimiko, 2018). Through public hearings, oversight visits, and stakeholder engagements, the committee assesses challenges facing the agricultural sector, including climate change impacts, farmer-herder conflicts, and supply chain disruptions. However, critics argue that legislative oversight has been weak, with limited enforcement of policy recommendations, thereby reducing the committee's overall effectiveness (Akinyemi & Ogunyemi, 2020).

Moreover, several legislative interventions have sought to address food security challenges in Nigeria. One notable case is the National Assembly's role in the enactment of the 2019 Fertilizer Quality Control Act, which aims to regulate the production, importation, and distribution of fertilizers to enhance soil fertility and crop yields (Akinyele, 2022). Currently, the passage of the Right to Food Bill, under legislative review, seeks to establish food as a fundamental human right, ensuring government accountability in food security policies (Eze, 2023). Worthy of mention is the Senate intervention in securing emergency food assistance for internally displaced persons (IDPs) in conflict-prone areas, demonstrating the role of the legislature in addressing

acute food crises (World Food Programme, 2023). These case studies highlight the potential of legislative actions in mitigating food insecurity, though stronger enforcement mechanisms are required for sustained impact.

2.1.1.9 Challenges of Legislative Involvement in Food Security in Nigeria

Despite the legislature's involvement in addressing food security, several challenges hinder its effectiveness. One major issue is institutional and structural limitations, which include inadequate technical capacity, weak research support, and limited legislative coordination with relevant agencies, Adebayo (2021). These constraints make it difficult for lawmakers to develop and enforce comprehensive food security policies effectively. The fragmentation of responsibilities among various government institutions often results in inefficiencies and overlaps in policy implementation (Ogunbameru, 2019). In the words of Adesina (2019), the limited synergy between federal, state, and local governments further complicates legislative interventions, as conflicting interests and priorities undermine coordinated action on food security initiatives.

Executive-legislative relations and policy conflicts also pose significant challenges. Frequent disagreements between the executive and legislative arms of government often delay the passage and implementation of critical agricultural policies (Adesina, 2019). The rift between the Executive and the Legislature during the 8th Senate was a clear indication of the effects of these conflicts on national development. These conflicts can stem from political differences, partisan interests, or competing economic agendas, which result in stalled policies and disrupted food security programs (Ojo & Adebayo, 2021). Furthermore, the lack of clear policy direction and shifting government priorities contribute to inconsistencies in food security legislation, making it difficult for long-term programs to be effectively executed (Eze & Chukwu, 2020). Mimiko (2018) asserted that in some instances, budgetary allocations for food security programs are

stalled due to political rivalries and a lack of consensus on policy priorities, further exacerbating food insecurity in the country.

Corruption, political will, and bureaucratic inefficiencies further complicate legislative efforts to ensure food security. Cases of misappropriation of agricultural funds, procurement fraud, and political interference in food distribution programs weaken the impact of legislative interventions (Akinyele, 2022). The influence of vested interests, including powerful agribusiness entities and political elites, often leads to policy capture, where food security programs are manipulated to serve private interests rather than the public good (Ogunbameru, 2019). Furthermore, Eze & Chukwu (2020) concurred that a lack of sustained political will to enforce food security laws and prioritize agricultural development contributes to poor policy outcomes. Lawmakers may introduce food security-related bills but fail to push for their effective implementation due to competing political and economic interests. Slow bureaucratic processes and excessive red tape hinder the swift implementation of legislative directives on food security, making it difficult for agricultural reforms and support programs to reach the intended beneficiaries (Mimiko, 2018).

Poor policy implementation and monitoring mechanisms significantly reduce the effectiveness of legislative actions in addressing food security. Ogunbameru (2019) gathered that while several agricultural policies have been enacted, weak monitoring and evaluation frameworks have led to ineffective enforcement and accountability gaps. The absence of reliable data and performance metrics further complicates legislative oversight, making it difficult to assess the impact of food security programs and make necessary adjustments (World Food Programme, 2023). Many food security policies lack proper enforcement mechanisms, leading to weak adherence at the state and local government levels (Ojo & Adebayo, 2021). The Nigerian legislature often faces challenges in tracking and evaluating the outcomes of allocated funds for agricultural programs, which

results in recurring issues of mismanagement and project failures (Adesina, 2019). Addressing these challenges requires a holistic approach that includes stronger intergovernmental collaboration, institutional reforms, enhanced oversight, and improved accountability mechanisms.

2.1.2 Theoretical Review

In examining the role of the legislature in enhancing food security, various theoretical frameworks have been employed by scholars to explore how legislative action, policy, and oversight influence food security outcomes. Political economy theory has been used in several studies to analyze the influence of the legislature on food security, focusing on the broader socio-economic and political context in which food security policies are shaped. Scholars using this framework emphasize the role of political institutions and economic structures in shaping government policies on food security. The theory posits that the distribution of resources and power dynamics within a state significantly impact the formulation and implementation of policies.

Baffoe & Larney (2021) applied political economy theory to understand the relationship between the legislature, policy reforms, and food security in Ghana. They argued that the political economy of food security policies was influenced by party politics, lobbying, and the strategic interests of the political elite (Baffoe & Larney, 2021). Similarly, Akinyele (2018) utilized the political economy framework to explore the role of Nigeria's National Assembly in food security policy development, highlighting how the political interests of legislators often align with regional or partisan priorities, which can hinder the effective implementation of food security initiatives (Akinyele, 2018).

Institutional theory emphasizes the role of formal and informal rules, norms, and practices within institutions such as the legislature, and how these shape the legislative process in areas like food security. This theory is used to explore how institutional arrangements, such as parliamentary committees and legislative oversight, influence policy outcomes. Njoku & Aniebonam (2019) employed institutional theory to analyze how the Nigerian Senate's institutional structures, including committees and subcommittees on agriculture and rural development, influence food security policies. They argued that while these institutions theoretically have the capacity to enhance food security, in practice, weak institutional structures, lack of coordination, and poor oversight mechanisms undermine legislative effectiveness (Njoku & Aniebonam, 2019). Similarly, Okoro & Nwosu (2022) applied institutional theory to assess the role of parliamentary procedures in shaping food security debates, concluding that despite the formal powers vested in the legislature, institutional limitations often prevent substantial legislative action in addressing food insecurity (Okoro & Nwosu, 2022).

Policy process theory examines how policies are formulated, adopted, implemented, and evaluated. It is particularly useful for understanding the complex and dynamic processes through which legislative bodies influence food security policy over time. According to this framework, food security policy is not only shaped by the legislative process but also by the interplay of multiple actors, including legislators, executive agencies, civil society, and international organizations. Ogunleye et al. (2020) applied policy process theory to examine how the Nigerian legislature engages in food security policy formation. They identified stages in the policy process, including agenda setting, policy formulation, and policy adoption, highlighting that while the legislature is involved in all these stages, its impact is often limited by external factors such as executive dominance, public opinion, and the influence of international organizations (Ogunleye

et al., 2020). Similarly, Thompson & Adewumi (2021) used policy process theory to argue that the lack of policy continuity in the Nigerian legislature contributes to the inefficiency of food security interventions, as the policy process often becomes fragmented and disjointed (Thompson & Adewumi, 2021).

The human security framework shifts the focus from state-centric perspectives to human-centered ones, emphasizing the protection and empowerment of individuals in various domains, including food security. In this context, the legislature's role is viewed through the lens of its responsibility to safeguard the well-being of citizens, ensuring access to basic needs like food. Ezeani (2020) applied the human security framework to examine the Nigerian National Assembly's role in ensuring food security, arguing that lawmakers must prioritize the security and welfare of vulnerable populations. This framework helped to identify the legislature's potential to enact policies that directly address issues like poverty, hunger, and access to nutritious food, as well as its failure to do so in many instances due to inadequate legislative action and competing interests (Ezeani, 2020).

Governance theory, particularly its focus on multi-level governance, has been useful in analyzing the role of the legislature in food security policy. This theory emphasizes the involvement of various actors at multiple levels (national, regional, local) and the importance of coordination among them. Adedeji & Ogunyemi (2021) utilized governance theory to assess the multi-level roles of Nigeria's legislature in ensuring food security. Their study highlighted the interactions between the federal legislature, state assemblies, and local government councils, noting that while the federal legislature plays a crucial role in policy development, local government actors are often more directly involved in food security implementation. The study also emphasized the

challenges of governance fragmentation and the lack of coordination across these levels (Adediji & Ogunyemi, 2021).

These theoretical frameworks provide valuable insights into how the legislature can shape food security outcomes. The political economy theory emphasizes the broader political and economic context, institutional theory highlights the role of legislative structures, policy process theory focuses on the stages of policy development, the human security framework shifts attention to individual well-being, and governance theory examines the coordination among different levels of government. Collectively, these frameworks offer a comprehensive understanding of the complex and multi-faceted role that legislatures play in promoting food security.

2.1.3 Empirical Review

In a critical study on legislative efforts toward food security in Nigeria, Adebayo (2021) assessed the effectiveness of relevant laws and policies enacted by the National Assembly. The study employed a mixed-methods approach, combining surveys of policymakers, legislative document analysis, and secondary data from government reports on agriculture and food security. Findings indicated that while legislative actions played a crucial role in shaping food security policies, weak institutional frameworks and poor inter-agency coordination significantly reduced their impact. The study also highlighted inconsistencies in policy implementation, as many food security-related bills were either delayed or lacked the necessary executive backing for effective enforcement. Adebayo (2021) concluded that the legislature had a vital role in enhancing food security, but this required better synergy with executive agencies, improved legislative oversight,

and the establishment of more comprehensive agricultural policies. The study recommended strengthening intergovernmental collaboration, enhancing the technical capacity of legislative committees on agriculture, and ensuring that food security policies are backed by adequate funding and implementation strategies.

Eze & Chukwu (2020) examined the impact of agricultural budgeting on food security in Nigeria, with a specific focus on how government financial allocations to the agricultural sector influenced food production and availability. The study adopted a quantitative research approach, analyzing budgetary allocations to agriculture from 2010 to 2020 using statistical regression models to determine their correlation with food security indicators such as food availability, affordability, and accessibility. The findings revealed that despite an overall increase in agricultural funding over the years, food insecurity remained prevalent due to issues such as non-allocation of funds, poor disbursement processes, and bureaucratic inefficiencies. The study found that a significant portion of the budget was spent on administrative costs rather than direct agricultural support, limiting the effectiveness of food security programs. The study also highlighted that while some policies aimed at enhancing food security were well-structured, a lack of transparency and accountability in budget execution often led to project failures. The authors concluded that to improve food security, the government must not only increase agricultural funding but also ensure that funds are properly allocated and efficiently utilized. The study recommended strict budget monitoring, enhanced transparency mechanisms, and a legislative framework that mandates timely and effective budget implementation for agricultural development.

Mimiko (2018) explored the influence of Nigeria's federal structure on legislative representation in agricultural policy and food security. The study employed a qualitative case study approach,

analyzing Senate deliberations, legislative bills, and policy documents related to agriculture from 2007 to 2017. Through content analysis and interviews with legislators and policy experts, the study found that Nigeria's federal system often led to fragmented decision-making, where state and federal governments pursued conflicting agricultural policies. The study revealed that while the Senate played a critical role in shaping national agricultural policies, state governments sometimes implemented contradictory policies due to political and economic differences. This lack of coordination weakened the overall impact of legislative interventions in food security, as agricultural initiatives failed to achieve nationwide uniformity and effectiveness. The research further identified instances where political interests influenced the allocation of agricultural resources, leading to disparities in funding and support for different regions. The study concluded that Nigeria's legislative structure must be reformed to enhance coordination between federal and state governments in food security policymaking. It recommended the creation of a centralized agricultural policy framework that integrates federal and state initiatives, along with regular stakeholder consultations to ensure alignment between legislative actions and food security priorities.

Ogunbameru (2019) investigated the relationship between land tenure security and agricultural productivity in Nigeria, emphasizing its implications for food security. The study utilized an econometric modeling approach, analyzing data from the Nigerian Agricultural Survey and land ownership records across different geopolitical zones. The findings revealed that insecure land tenure policies discouraged long-term agricultural investments, as farmers were often reluctant to invest in improved farming techniques or infrastructure without guaranteed land rights. The study highlighted that land disputes, weak enforcement of property rights, and inconsistent government policies on land ownership significantly hindered agricultural productivity. It was also found that

land tenure insecurity disproportionately affected smallholder farmers, who contribute the majority of Nigeria's food supply, thereby exacerbating food insecurity. The study concluded that legislative reforms are necessary to strengthen land rights, ensure fair land distribution, and establish clear legal frameworks that protect farmers from forced evictions. Ogunbameru (2019) recommended that the legislature should work towards passing comprehensive land reform laws that provide long-term land security, streamline land registration processes, and reduce bureaucratic bottlenecks that delay land ownership documentation for farmers.

Ojo & Adebayo (2021) examined the effects of climate change and insecurity on food security in Nigeria, focusing on the role of legislative interventions in mitigating these challenges. The study employed a policy analysis framework, reviewing legislative bills, government reports, and international food security assessments to evaluate how Nigerian lawmakers had responded to environmental and security threats affecting agricultural production. The findings revealed that climate change, particularly erratic rainfall patterns, desertification, and flooding, had significantly reduced agricultural productivity in many parts of the country. The study highlighted that insecurity, particularly armed conflicts, banditry, and farmer-herder clashes, disrupted farming activities and food supply chains, further worsening food insecurity. While the Nigerian legislature had introduced policies to address these issues, such as the National Climate Change Policy and various agricultural resilience programs, weak enforcement mechanisms and poor legislative oversight limited their effectiveness. The study concluded that stronger legislative action is needed to integrate climate adaptation strategies with food security policies, alongside improved security interventions to protect farming communities. It recommended that the legislature enhance its monitoring role, allocate more resources to climate-smart agriculture, and pass laws that ensure better protection for farmers against violence and displacement.

Ezeani (2020) examined how Nigeria's legislature addresses food security, as a human security concerns, with a focus on the effectiveness of legislative actions and policies. The study aims to assess the legislative body's effectiveness in responding to food insecurity challenges, emphasizing the need for the National Assembly to prioritize food security. Using a qualitative methodology, the research involved document analysis of legislative debates, policy frameworks, and government reports related to food security. The study reveals that while the Nigerian legislature has passed several food security-related laws, such as the National Food Security Bill, the implementation of these policies has been hindered by factors like insufficient funding, political interference, and lack of coordination with other government levels. Despite passing food security policies, the legislature has failed to make food security a central agenda, which results in inadequate outcomes. These constraints limit the legislature's capacity to significantly improve food security in the country. Ezeani (2020) concluded that food security, as a human security issue, must be central to Nigeria's legislative agenda. The study recommended strengthening legislative oversight to ensure the effective implementation of food security policies, increasing budget allocations for agriculture, fostering collaboration with other stakeholders, and ensuring policy coherence to address the interconnected challenges of food insecurity, poverty, and malnutrition. These measures are essential for the National Assembly to fulfill its mandate in improving food security in Nigeria.

Ogunleye, Akintoye, & Olaniyan (2020) examine the role of Nigeria's legislature in food security policy formulation, focusing on the policy process and the challenges faced by lawmakers in addressing food security. The study investigates how the legislature contributes to shaping food security policies and identifies the institutional, political, and resource-based challenges that limit its effectiveness. The research aims to provide insights into how the Nigerian legislature can

better influence food security outcomes through enhanced involvement in the policy process. Using a qualitative research design, the study analyzes legislative debates, policy documents, and interviews with key stakeholders, including legislators, government officials, and food security experts. The findings highlight that although the legislature has been involved in food security policy formulation, its impact is constrained by factors such as political interference, limited institutional capacity, and inadequate coordination with the executive. Despite introducing bills and engaging in debates on food security, the effectiveness of legislative actions is often undermined by insufficient funding and competing political priorities. The study concludes that while the legislature plays a critical role in shaping food security policy, its effectiveness is hindered by political and institutional challenges. Ogunleye, Akintoye, & Olaniyan (2020) recommend improving legislative oversight mechanisms, ensuring food security is prioritized in the national policy agenda, and fostering stronger collaboration between the legislature and executive. The study advocates for increased budget allocations for food security and capacity-building for legislators to enhance their understanding of food security issues.

Thompson & Adewumi (2021) explore the fragmentation in Nigeria's food security policy and examine the legislative role in addressing these challenges. The study aims to understand how policy fragmentation impacts food security initiatives and the legislative actions that contribute to or alleviate these issues. They also focus on the factors leading to fragmentation, such as political interference and lack of coordination. Thompson & Adewumi (2021) conducted a content analysis of legislative debates and policy documents, along with interviews and a survey of key stakeholders, thus adopting a mixed-methods approach. The findings reveal that food security policies in Nigeria are fragmented, leading to inefficiencies and poor implementation. Despite the legislative body's involvement in food security policy formulation, there is a lack of cohesion and

strategic alignment, which hampers progress. The study concludes that policy fragmentation remains a significant obstacle to effective food security in Nigeria. Thompson & Adewumi (2021) recommend a more coordinated and unified approach to policy development, with the legislature playing a more proactive role in ensuring better inter-governmental coordination and oversight to improve policy implementation.

Njoku & Aniebonam (2019) examine the institutional constraints faced by the Nigerian Senate in engaging with food security policy. The study aims to identify the challenges that hinder legislative involvement in food security issues and the impact of these constraints on policy formulation and implementation. The researchers also explore the ways in which the Senate navigates these challenges to influence food security outcomes. The study employed a qualitative approach, analyzing Senate debates, legislative reports, and interviews with Senators and other stakeholders. The findings highlight that institutional constraints such as inadequate funding, political interference, and a lack of specialized knowledge among legislators limit the Senate's ability to effectively engage with food security issues. The study also revealed that the Senate has made efforts to influence food security policy, although these efforts are often insufficient and fragmented. Njoku & Aniebonam (2019) concluded that overcoming institutional constraints is essential for enhancing the Senate's role in food security policymaking. The study recommended the strengthening of the Senate's capacity through training, better access to relevant information, and improved coordination with other governmental and non-governmental bodies involved in food security.

Okoro & Nwosu (2022) explored the institutional challenges that hinder the Nigerian legislature's role in promoting food security. The study aims to identify the factors that limit legislative effectiveness in addressing food insecurity and to assess the potential for the legislature to

improve food security policies. The researchers focus on institutional issues, such as bureaucratic inefficiency and political dynamics that influence legislative action on food security. By adopting a qualitative approach, the study analyzed legislative proceedings, food security policy documents, and interviews with lawmakers and food security experts. The findings showed that while the Nigerian legislature has made strides in promoting food security, institutional challenges like weak coordination between branches of government, lack of political will, and inadequate expertise in agriculture limit its effectiveness in addressing food insecurity. Partisan politics and insufficient budget allocations have hampered the success of food security policies. The study concluded that addressing these institutional challenges is crucial for enhancing the legislature's role in food security. Okoro & Nwosu (2022) recommended the improvement of inter-governmental collaboration, increasing budgetary allocations for food security, and strengthening legislative oversight to ensure the implementation of effective food security policies.

Akinyele (2018) investigated the political economy of food security in Nigeria, focusing on the legislative challenges and prospects for improving food security. The study examines the political and economic factors that influence the legislative process in the food security sector, assessing how these factors either promote or hinder legislative efforts to address food insecurity in the country. The research highlights the importance of aligning political will and economic resources to achieve effective food security policies. The study employed a qualitative research design, analyzing legislative documents, policy frameworks, and interviews with lawmakers, policy experts, and agricultural stakeholders. The findings indicate that Nigeria's legislative challenges in food security stem from political instability, weak institutional structures, and inadequate coordination between the legislature and other sectors. Economic constraints, including limited

funding and lack of political commitment undermine the effectiveness of food security policies. Akinyele (2018) concluded that overcoming political and economic barriers is crucial for enhancing the legislature's role in food security. The study recommended that fostering political consensus, strengthening institutional capacity, and ensuring that food security remains a top priority in national development agendas will promote sustainable food security in Nigeria.

Adedeji & Ogunyemi (2021) examine the role of the Nigerian legislature in food security through the lens of multi-level governance. The study aims to analyze how the legislature interacts with other levels of government, such as local and state governments, in addressing food security challenges. The research explored the dynamics of intergovernmental collaboration and how the legislature can enhance food security by fostering effective coordination at multiple governance levels. The study used a qualitative approach, including an analysis of policy documents, legislative debates, and interviews with legislators and key stakeholders involved in food security. From the findings, it was revealed that while multi-level governance has the potential to improve food security, the lack of effective coordination and communication between different levels of government hinders the legislative role. Fragmented policies, political rivalry, and insufficient resources at local and state levels contribute to the inefficiency of food security initiatives. The study concluded that for the legislature to effectively contribute to food security, it must strengthen its collaboration with other levels of government. Adedeji & Ogunyemi (2021) recommended enhancing legislative oversight, improving policy integration across various government tiers, and ensuring better resource allocation for food security programs at the local and state levels.

Abdulmalik (2020) examined the relationship between food insecurity and poverty reduction in Nigeria. The study aimed to explore how food insecurity exacerbates poverty and hinders efforts

to reduce poverty in the country. The research also investigates the socio-economic consequences of food insecurity on vulnerable populations and its impact on national development goals related to poverty alleviation. The study employed a quantitative research methodology, analyzing statistical data on food insecurity, poverty levels, and related socio-economic indicators. The findings reveal that food insecurity significantly contributes to the persistence of poverty in Nigeria, particularly in rural areas where access to food is limited. The research indicates that food insecurity exacerbates poverty by limiting access to essential resources such as education, healthcare, and income-generating opportunities. The study concluded that addressing food insecurity is crucial for achieving sustainable poverty reduction in Nigeria. Abdulmalik (2020) recommended the implementation of comprehensive policies that integrate food security and poverty reduction strategies, improving agricultural productivity, and ensuring equitable access to food for all segments of the population.

Akinyele (2022) explored the policy perspectives and implementation challenges related to food security and nutrition in Nigeria. The aim of the study was to identify the key factors influencing food security policies and the barriers hindering their successful implementation. The research emphasized the need for effective policy frameworks to ensure adequate food access, improve nutrition, and address food insecurity in Nigeria. The study employed a mixed-methods approach, combining a review of food security policies, statistical data on food availability, and interviews with policymakers, agricultural experts, and stakeholders in the food security sector. The findings presented that issues such as poor policy coordination, inadequate funding, and weak institutional frameworks significantly hinder their successful implementation, despite the several policies aimed at improving food security. The lack of attention to nutrition alongside food security exacerbates the problem, leading to poor health outcomes. Akinyele (2022) concluded that

overcoming implementation challenges requires strengthening the policy coordination mechanisms, increasing investment in the agriculture sector, and integrating nutrition into food security policies. The study recommended the promotion of greater collaboration among stakeholders and ensuring that food security policies are adaptable to the evolving socio-economic context of Nigeria.

Baffoe & Lartey (2021) investigated the political economy of food security in Ghana, focusing on how political and economic factors influence food security policies and their implementation. The study aimed to understand the interplay between political decisions, economic structures, and the achievement of food security in Ghana, with a particular focus on the role of governance and policy processes. The research utilized a qualitative approach, analyzing political and economic data, policy documents, and interviews with key stakeholders involved in food security. The findings suggested that Ghana's food security policies are deeply influenced by political priorities, economic constraints, and global market dynamics. Despite some progress, the political economy of food security remains marred by challenges such as political instability, inadequate funding, and insufficient policy coherence. These issues limit the effectiveness of food security policies and prevent the country from achieving long-term food security goals. The study concluded that addressing the political and economic barriers to food security requires a more integrated approach, with stronger political commitment, improved governance structures, and better alignment between food security policies and economic development strategies. Baffoe & Lartey (2021) recommended that increasing investment in agriculture, fostering political stability, and improving inter-agency coordination will enhance food security outcomes in Ghana.

Eke & Ojo (2020) examined the food security challenges in Nigeria, focusing on both socioeconomic and climatic factors. The study analyzed how these factors contribute to food

insecurity in Nigeria, exploring the complex interplay between economic conditions, climate change, and food security. The researchers also assess how these challenges hinder the country's ability to achieve sustainable food security. Using a mixed-methods approach, the study combined a review of relevant policy documents, socioeconomic data, and climate change reports with interviews and surveys of key stakeholders in the agriculture and food security sectors. The findings revealed that socioeconomic issues, such as poverty, inadequate infrastructure, and limited access to markets, and climatic challenges, including erratic rainfall and droughts, significantly contribute to food insecurity. These factors disrupt food production and distribution, making it difficult to address the rising demand for food. The study concluded that overcoming food security challenges in Nigeria requires addressing both the socioeconomic and climatic dimensions. Eke & Ojo (2020) recommended implementing comprehensive policies that address poverty reduction, enhance agricultural resilience to climate change, and improve infrastructure to support food distribution networks.

Eze (2023) investigated the prospects and challenges associated with the Right to Food Bill in Nigeria's legislative process. The study objective was to explore the potential impact of the bill on food security in Nigeria and to identify the challenges that may impede its passage and effective implementation. The research focused on the legislative process and the political, legal, and institutional barriers that could affect the bill's success. Adopting a qualitative approach, the study analyzed legislative records, policy documents, and interviews with lawmakers, legal experts, and food security advocates. The findings highlighted that while the Right to Food Bill has the potential to enhance food security by establishing food as a fundamental right, challenges such as political opposition, insufficient public awareness, and a lack of political will pose significant obstacles. Institutional inefficiencies and lack of coordination among relevant

stakeholders further hindered the progress of the bill. The study concluded that for the Right to Food Bill to succeed, there must be stronger advocacy, greater political commitment, and better public engagement. Eze & Ojo (2020) recommended improving the legislative framework for food security, ensuring better coordination among government agencies, and fostering broader societal support for the bill.

Ojo & Adebayo (2019) examined the role of institutional frameworks in addressing food security in Nigeria. The study aims to analyze the effectiveness of existing institutions and structures in promoting food security and to identify gaps that limit their impact. The research investigated how institutional inefficiencies and fragmented governance affect the implementation of food security policies in the country. The study adopted a qualitative approach, reviewing institutional frameworks, and policy documents, and conducting interviews with key stakeholders in government agencies, civil society, and the private sector. The findings revealed that the efforts of the several institutions tasked with food security in Nigeria are often hindered by poor coordination, overlapping mandates, and a lack of resources. Institutional weaknesses in governance and limited political commitment to food security exacerbate the problem. Ojo & Adebayo (2019) concluded that for Nigeria to achieve sustainable food security, institutional reforms are necessary. They recommend improving coordination among agencies, strengthening policy frameworks, and ensuring adequate funding for food security initiatives, adding that enhancing institutional capacity at the local level is crucial for effective policy implementation.

2.1.4 Gaps in Literature

Existing studies on the role of the legislature in food security in Nigeria have primarily focused on policy formulation and implementation without adequately assessing the effectiveness of legislative oversight in ensuring policy continuity and accountability (Njoku & Aniebonam,

2019; Thompson & Adewumi, 2021). While governance theory and institutional theory have been applied separately in analyzing legislative influence on food security, there is a lack of integrative studies that examine the intersection of institutional structures and governance mechanisms in shaping legislative actions on food security. Most research has also overlooked the role of inter-governmental collaboration between the federal, state, and local legislative bodies in promoting food security initiatives (Adedeji & Ogunyemi, 2021). Furthermore, limited empirical studies have explored how political dynamics, legislative-executive relations, and bureaucratic inefficiencies impact the effectiveness of food security laws and policies in Nigeria.

This study is justified because it fills the identified gaps by providing a comprehensive analysis of the legislature's role in food security through an integrated application of institutional and governance theories. It seeks to assess not only the legislative process in food security policymaking but also the extent to which oversight mechanisms contribute to policy effectiveness. The study further examines how legislative-executive relations and multi-level governance structures affect the implementation of food security policies. By addressing these gaps, the study contributes to a deeper understanding of legislative performance in food security governance and offers recommendations for strengthening legislative engagement in food security policy formulation, implementation, and oversight. This research will be valuable for policymakers, legislators, and stakeholders in the agricultural sector seeking to enhance food security in Nigeria through improved legislative mechanisms.

2.2 Theoretical Framework

For this study, the researcher adopted the Institutional Theory and the Governance Theory to explore the role of the senate in enhancing food security in Nigeria. Foremost, the Institutional theory originated in the early 20th century, gaining prominence through the works of scholars

such as Thorstein Veblen and Max Weber, who emphasized the role of institutions in shaping economic and social behaviors. The theory evolved significantly in the mid-20th century with contributions from new institutionalists like Douglass North, who highlighted the importance of formal and informal institutions in economic development and governance. Institutional theory explains how formal structures, rules, and norms shape legislative decision-making and policy implementation - making it relevant for analysing food security governance. Over time, the theory has expanded to include perspectives on institutional change, particularly in understanding how legislatures function within broader governance frameworks.

Institutional theory provides a valuable framework for examining how legislative structures shape policy decisions on food security in Nigeria. This theory posits that formal institutions, such as laws, regulations, and legislative bodies, influence policy outcomes by structuring decision-making processes, shaping actors' behaviors, and defining the scope of governance. In Nigeria, the National Assembly plays a crucial role in the formulation and implementation of food security policies through its legislative and oversight functions. Institutional frameworks determine how policies related to agriculture, food distribution, and rural development are developed and executed, ultimately impacting food security.

Legislative institutions in Nigeria influence food security through various mechanisms, including budgetary allocations, lawmaking, and policy evaluation. Studies have shown that legislative committees on agriculture and food security are instrumental in shaping policy decisions by scrutinizing executive actions, ensuring policy coherence, and advocating for increased investments in the agricultural sector (Ojo & Adebayo, 2019). However, institutional weaknesses, such as bureaucratic inefficiencies, legislative-executive conflicts, and corruption, often hinder

the effectiveness of legislative interventions in addressing food security challenges. The lack of strong institutional enforcement mechanisms has led to delays in policy implementation and the misallocation of resources meant for agricultural development (Njoku & Aniebonam, 2019).

To enhance food security, Nigeria's legislature must strengthen institutional mechanisms by improving inter-agency collaboration, enforcing transparency and accountability in agricultural policy implementation and ensuring that food security legislation is effectively executed. Institutional reforms, such as the establishment of specialized legislative bodies dedicated to food security, can enhance the capacity of lawmakers to formulate and oversee policies aimed at addressing food shortages, improving agricultural productivity, and ensuring equitable food distribution across the country (Akinyele, 2018).

On the other hand, the Governance Theory emerged in response to the limitations of traditional public administration and political science approaches, particularly in the late 20th century. Early governance studies were influenced by scholars such as Foucault and Rhodes, who emphasized the shift from hierarchical government control to more decentralized and network-based governance. The theory gained traction in the 1990s, particularly through the World Bank's emphasis on "good governance" as a key factor in economic development and policy effectiveness. Governance theory highlights the interactions between state and non-state actors in decision-making, policy implementation, and service delivery. In the context of Nigeria's food security policies, governance theory helps to analyze the role of the legislature in ensuring transparency, accountability, and efficiency in policy processes.

Governance theory emphasizes the role of institutions, actors, and processes in ensuring policy efficiency and effectiveness. This theory is particularly relevant in assessing the role of

legislative governance in shaping food security outcomes in Nigeria. Good governance in the legislative process is essential for ensuring that food security policies are well-designed, adequately funded, and effectively implemented. The legislature contributes to governance by enacting policies, overseeing their implementation, and engaging stakeholders in decision-making processes.

In Nigeria, governance challenges such as policy inconsistency, weak enforcement mechanisms, and limited stakeholder engagement have hindered the effectiveness of legislative interventions in food security. Studies indicate that while the legislature has enacted several food security-related policies, such as the National Food Security Act, inefficiencies in governance structures have led to weak policy implementation and poor coordination between federal, state, and local governments (Eze, 2023). Moreover, legislative governance plays a role in ensuring accountability by monitoring the performance of food security programs and evaluating their impact on vulnerable populations. When governance structures are weak, policies fail to achieve their intended outcomes, leading to persistent food insecurity, particularly in rural areas (Thompson & Adewumi, 2021).

For this study, the Nigerian legislature must adopt a more participatory and transparent approach to policymaking. This includes strengthening legislative oversight, improving inter-governmental coordination, and ensuring that food security policies align with national development priorities. Furthermore, legislative governance should focus on fostering partnerships between government institutions, private sector actors, and civil society organizations to create a more inclusive and efficient food security framework (Adedeji & Ogunyemi, 2021). Through improved governance

mechanisms, the legislature can enhance the effectiveness of food security policies, promote sustainable agricultural development, and ensure that food security remains a national priority.

CHAPTER THREE

METHODOLOGY

This chapter outlines the research methods adopted to achieve the objectives of the study. The methodology is presented under the following sub-headings: research design, population of the study, sample size, methods of data collection, sources of data, and method of data analysis.

3.1. Research design

This study employed a qualitative research design to assess the role of the legislature in enhancing food security in Nigeria, with a focus on the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development (2019–2023). The qualitative approach is appropriate for gaining in-depth insights into legislative processes, decisions, and their impact on food security without experimental manipulation.

The study relied on official legislative documents, particularly sessional reports (annual records of the committee's activities) of the committee to evaluate legislative activities. In addition, key informant interviews were conducted with individuals directly involved in legislative processes. The analysis centered on how the committee's constitutional functions influenced food security outcomes. This design aligns with the interpretative paradigm of qualitative research, which seeks to understand relationships and meanings through detailed contextual analysis.

3.2. Population of the Study

The target population comprises institutions and individuals directly involved in legislative processes related to food security in Nigeria during the 9th Senate (2019 - 2023). These include current and former members of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development, the committee's secretariat, officials from the Federal Ministry of Agriculture, representatives of Civil Society Organisations with legislative or food security mandates, and legislative staff. Key

informants with direct knowledge of the committee's activities were also included. This population was selected based on their involvement in oversight, policymaking, and implementation of food security initiatives. Table 3.1 presents a tabular representation of the categories and description of targeted population used the study.

3.3. Sample of the Study

The sample size consisted of eighteen (18) key informants, selected purposively from the identified target population. This includes three (3) respondents each from six stakeholder groups: committee members, legislative aides, officials of the Federal Ministry of Agriculture, civil society representatives, food security experts, and legislative staff. This sampling is

consistent with qualitative research norms, as emphasized by Sandelowski (1995), who noted that sample size in qualitative research is guided by informational adequacy rather than numerical representativeness. Similarly, Boddy (2016) suggested that a sample size of 15-30 participants is adequate for qualitative studies. Table 3.2 below shows the sample size distribution used for the study.

3.4. Method of Data Collection

This study employed two primary data collection methods: review of legislative documents and key informant interviews. Sessional reports of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development (2019–2023) were analyzed to assess legislative activities aimed at enhancing food security, including bills, motions, and oversight engagements.

Key informant interviews were conducted with policymakers, legislative aides, and experts in food security to gather qualitative insights into the committee’s role. These combined methods

allowed for a comprehensive understanding of the committee's interventions and the challenges surrounding food security policymaking.

3.5 Sources of Data

The study took data from primary and secondary sources. The primary data source was the key informant interviews conducted with relevant stakeholders. The secondary sources comprised legislative documents, including sessional reports of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development (2019–2023). These data sources provided the basis for the analysis and discussion of findings in chapter four.

3.6 Instruments for Data Collection

This study utilized two main instruments for data collection: legislative documents (sessional reports) and key informant interviews. Legislative documents, specifically sessional reports of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development (2019–2023), were analyzed to assess the legislature's role in enhancing food security. Key informant interviews were conducted using a semi-structured interview guide. The guide contained open-ended questions and was used to interview 18 purposefully selected stakeholders, including legislators, committee staff, and agricultural policy experts. The interviews provided qualitative data on the Senate's legislative efforts, oversight activities, and policy initiatives related to food security in Nigeria.

3.7 Validity and Reliability

A pilot study was conducted before the main research to establish the validity and reliability of the primary data collection instruments. The key informant interview guide was pre-tested through discussions with five experts in legislative affairs and food security who met the sample

criteria. Their feedback was used to refine the wording and structure of the questions to ensure they aligned with the research objectives. Questions were incorporated based on participant suggestions to enhance the depth of responses.

The pilot interviews were documented, and the responses were analyzed to determine if revisions were necessary. Participants provided feedback on the clarity and relevance of the questions. The researcher made adjustments to the guide to ensure it effectively captured information on the role of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development in food security policy between 2019 and 2023. This process confirmed the content validity and reliability of the interview guide. Legislative documents, including sessional reports, were also reviewed to test their relevance and consistency with the study objectives. The selection criteria for these documents were refined based on expert input to ensure they accurately reflected legislative activities on food security. Through this pre-testing, the study established that the data sources were reliable and capable of generating consistent qualitative findings for the main research.

3.8 Method of Data Analysis

Data analysis for this study was conducted using content analysis. Content analysis is a method that involves the systematic examination of patterns in recorded communication. Given the nature of this study, content analysis focused on the textual presentation of data obtained from legislative documents and key informant interviews. This approach helped identify the role of the Senate in enhancing food security through its legislative functions.

The study relied on legislative documents, specifically sessional reports of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development (2019–2023). The number of bills, motions, and resolutions sponsored or reviewed by the committee represented its legislative interventions in food security. Key informant interviews provided additional information on the committee's

oversight and policy influence. Afterward, the findings were presented thematically in line with the study's objectives. Graphs and tables are used where necessary to organize and illustrate the data.

3.9 Analytical Framework

3.9.1. Legislative Framework and Policies Related to Food Security

The data required consists of qualitative materials derived from legislative documents and key informant interviews, which were purposively selected based on relevance. These data were analyzed using content analysis, with themes derived in line with the study objectives (Section 1.4).

This study adopted institutional and governance theories to examine the legislative framework and policies on food security. The study expects that legislative policies and frameworks will reflect institutional mechanisms that shape governance actions on food security.

3.9.2. Performance of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development

The required data consists of qualitative materials derived from sessional reports and key informant interviews, which were purposively selected based on relevance. These data were analyzed using content analysis, with themes derived in line with the study objectives (section 1.4).

This study adopted institutional and governance theories to assess the performance of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development. The study expects that the committee's activities will reflect institutional procedures and governance principles in shaping food security policies.

3.9.3. Effectiveness of Oversight Function on Food Security

This section explores the effectiveness of the Senate Committee's oversight on food security initiatives using qualitative data drawn from sessional reports and purposively selected key informant interviews. These data were analyzed using content analysis techniques, and interpretation followed thematic coding aligned with the study objectives in section 1.4. The theoretical framework is rooted in institutional and governance theories, which posits that legislative oversight effectiveness depends on institutional design, policy coherence, and governance accountability. It is expected that the Senate Committee's actions will reflect institutional mandates and contribute meaningfully to ensuring accountability and improved food security outcomes.

3.9.4. Challenges and Recommendations for the Senate Committee

This section assesses the challenges encountered by the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development and outlined evidence-based recommendations. Qualitative data were gathered from sessional reports and key informant interviews, analyzed thematically using content analysis. Interpretation was guided by the objectives in section 14. Drawing on institutional and governance theories, the study anticipates that structural constraints such as limited legislative authority, bureaucratic bottlenecks, and weak inter-agency coordination will shape the challenges. Recommendations will be informed by institutional responses, stakeholder insights, and comparative policy practices aimed at strengthening legislative roles in food security governance.

CHAPTER FOUR

DATA PRESENTATION, ANALYSIS AND DISCUSSION

This chapter presents, analyses, and discusses the data generated from fieldwork on the role of the Nigerian Senate in enhancing food security. Drawing from interviews, official records, and budget data, it evaluates legislative frameworks, institutional practices, and policy responses within the context of Nigeria's commitments and agricultural realities.

4.1. Legislative Framework and Policies Related to Food Security in Nigeria

Food security in Nigeria is governed by a comprehensive legislative and policy framework aimed at ensuring the availability, accessibility, and affordability of food for its citizens. The Nigerian Senate, particularly through the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development, plays a pivotal role in formulating and overseeing these frameworks. This section examines the key legislative frameworks and policies that have been instrumental in shaping Nigeria's food security landscape during the 9th Senate.

4.1.1. Constitutional Provisions and Amendments

The Nigerian Constitution provides the foundational legal basis for food security. The Fifth Constitutional Alteration Bill (No. 65) assented to on 17 March 2023, amended Section 16 of the Constitution to explicitly include the right to food and food security as a directive principle of state policy. The new Section 16A mandates the state to initiate and implement strategies that guarantee food security concerning availability, accessibility, and affordability for all citizens.

According to a member of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development,

The constitutional amendment was a significant milestone. It underscores our commitment to making food security a fundamental objective of state policy.

Indeed, the 2023 amendment to Section 16 of the Nigerian Constitution, introducing Section 16A, marks a significant shift in the nation's approach to food security. Mainly, the amendment

provides a constitutional mandate for the government to prioritize food security initiatives by enshrining the right to food as a directive principle of state policy. This legal foundation empowers citizens to hold the government accountable for food-related policies and programs.

However, the practical implications of this amendment depend on the development of corresponding legislation and effective implementation mechanisms. The absence of clear guidelines and enforcement strategies may hinder the realization of the constitutional provisions. Therefore, it is imperative for the legislature to enact laws that operationalize the constitutional mandate, ensuring that food security is not merely a policy aspiration but a tangible reality for all Nigerians.

4.1.2. National Agricultural Technology and Innovation Policy (NATIP) 2022–2027

The NATIP 2022–2027 serves as a strategic roadmap for transforming Nigeria's agricultural sector. It emphasizes the deployment of modern technologies and innovative practices to enhance agricultural productivity and ensure food security. The policy addresses challenges such as limited use of modern technologies, inadequate preservation facilities, and the need for climate-smart agriculture. To this end, an official from the Federal Ministry of Agriculture stated:

NATIP is our blueprint for revolutionizing agriculture. It focuses on technology adoption, value chain development, and sustainable practices to achieve food security.

The policy's emphasis on stakeholder synergy and alignment is particularly noteworthy. By fostering collaboration among federal and state governments, private sector actors, and civil society organizations, NATIP aims to create a cohesive framework for agricultural development (Falaju, 2022). This approach acknowledges the nature of food security and the need for coordinated efforts across various sectors. Nevertheless, the success of NATIP hinges on effective implementation and monitoring.

4.1.3. National Policy on Food Safety and Quality

Launched on 7 June 2024, the National Policy on Food Safety and Quality aims to modernize Nigeria's food safety regulatory framework. It seeks to minimize risks associated with food and water hazards, strengthen institutional capacities, and improve information and communication systems for food safety. Accordingly, a representative from a civil society organization involved in food safety advocacy noted as follows:

The policy is a comprehensive approach to ensuring that the food reaching Nigerians is safe and of high quality. It's a critical component of food security.

By improving information and communication systems for food safety, the policy aims to enhance transparency and accountability in the food supply chain. This is particularly important in a context where foodborne illnesses and contamination pose significant health risks. The policy's implementation requires robust coordination among regulatory agencies, including the National Agency for Food and Drug Administration and Control (NAFDAC) and the National Biosafety Management Agency (NBMA).

However, the effectiveness of the policy depends on the availability of resources and the commitment of stakeholders. This is because ensuring compliance with food safety standards necessitates continuous training, public awareness campaigns, and stringent enforcement mechanisms. Moreover, integrating food safety considerations into broader agricultural and food security policies is essential for a holistic approach.

4.1.4. Legislative Initiatives by the Senate

The Nigerian Senate has been proactive in enacting laws to bolster food security. Notably, it passed a bill to criminalize the export of large quantities of unprocessed corn to combat hunger and stabilize domestic food supply. Additionally, the Senate passed for a second reading a bill to establish the National Food Reserve Agency, aimed at developing the agricultural sector and

addressing emergency food crises. A former member of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development contended that:

These legislative measures are crucial in safeguarding our food resources and ensuring that Nigerians have sufficient food supply.

As Bright (2024) added, the proposed agency would be responsible for maintaining buffer stocks, managing storage infrastructure, and responding to food crises. Such an institution could play a pivotal role in mitigating the impacts of food shortages and price volatility.

4.1.5. Budgetary Allocations and the Maputo Declaration

The Senate has advocated for increased budgetary allocations to agriculture, urging the federal government to allocate at least 10% of the total annual budget revenue to agricultural production, in line with the Maputo Declaration. In fact, a legislative staff member highlighted thus:

Adequate funding is essential for implementing agricultural policies effectively. The 10% allocation is not just a target; it's a necessity for food security.

No doubt, Nigeria's commitment to allocating at least 10% of its annual budget to agriculture, as stipulated in the Maputo Declaration, remains a critical benchmark for evaluating government support for the sector. Despite this commitment, actual budgetary allocations have often fallen short, undermining efforts to enhance food security. This is profoundly expressed in the budgetary allocations for its parent ministry from budget data as provided in Table 4.1.

From Table 4.1, between 2022 and 2023, the total agricultural allocation increased by ₦135.57 billion, from ₦291.42 billion to ₦426.99 billion. This reflects a 46.5% increase, which appears positive at face value and could signal an improved prioritisation of agriculture in line with the

spirit of the Maputo Declaration. The central benchmark of the Maputo Declaration is the 10% allocation of the total national budget to agriculture. To contextualise the data, we must compare these sectoral allocations against Nigeria's total federal budgets in 2022 and 2023:

- Nigeria's 2022 Federal Budget: Approximately ₦17.1 trillion
- Nigeria's 2023 Federal Budget: Approximately ₦21.83 trillion

However, the percentage of agriculture in total budget is at 1.7% and 1.96% in 2022 and 2023 respectively. These figures indicate that Nigeria has consistently fallen short of the 10% Maputo benchmark, with allocations hovering below 2% of the national budget in both years. Despite nominal increases in the total agricultural budget, the relative commitment remains significantly below the Maputo target. Based on this, a former senator and ex-member of the Senate Committee on Agriculture posited thus:

The gains are visible on paper, but the percentage of actual national commitment is weak. Until agriculture gets the political priority it deserves, we'll continue to fall short of international targets like Maputo.

Remarkably, the Senate's advocacy for increased funding underscores the recognition of agriculture's potential to drive economic growth and poverty reduction. Adequate investment in the sector is essential for implementing policies like NATIP and for supporting initiatives such as the National Food Reserve Agency. Moreover, consistent funding is necessary for infrastructure development, research, and extension services.

4.1.6 Role of Regulatory Agencies

Agencies such as the National Agency for Food and Drug Administration and Control (NAFDAC) and the National Biosafety Management Agency (NBMA) play significant roles in ensuring food safety and managing biotechnology activities, respectively. Their mandates include

monitoring food quality, enforcing safety standards, and overseeing the introduction of genetically modified organisms. An official from NAFDAC emphasized this by stating that:

Our mandate is to ensure that food products are safe for consumption. We work closely with other agencies to uphold food safety standards.

Undoubtedly, effective regulation is essential for protecting public health and maintaining consumer confidence in the food system. These agencies must be adequately resourced and empowered to carry out their functions. Collaboration among regulatory bodies, as well as with international organizations, can enhance capacity and facilitate the adoption of best practices. Overall, Nigeria's legislative and policy frameworks for food security are comprehensive and reflect a strong commitment to addressing the nation's food challenges. The constitutional amendment, NATIP, food safety policies, legislative initiatives, budgetary considerations, regulatory oversight, and civil society engagement collectively form a robust foundation for achieving food security.

4.2. The Performance of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development

This section evaluates the performance of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development between 2019 and 2023. It focuses on the committee's legislative initiatives, oversight activities, stakeholder engagements, and alignment with national and international food security commitments, using evidence from interviews, policy documents, and official legislative records. Specifically, pursuant to Section 62(1) of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria 1999 (as amended), the 10th Senate of the National Assembly under the Senate Standing Rules 96(2) constituted Seventy (79) Standing Committees on Monday 7th August, 2023. These Committees were inaugurated by the Senate President, Godswill Akpabio CON, at the floor of the Senate on Wednesday, 25th September, 2023.

The Senate Committee on Agriculture Production, Services and Rural Development was one of the Standing Committees created and inaugurated by the Senate. The Committee was created for the purpose of rendering legislative support and undertaking oversight functions on matters that relate to the development of the Nigeria Agricultural Sector which may be referred to it by the Senate. The creation of the Committee on Agriculture Production, Services and Rural Development was to enable the senate interact and relate more closely with the relevant agencies under its purview such as the Ministry of Agriculture, and other stakeholders with a view to ensuring that the sector plays key roles in the economic transformation policy of the government. Table 4.2 presents the activities of the Senate Committee on Agriculture Production, Services and Rural Development during the period being studied.

Table 4.2 presents a detailed sessional overview of the legislative and oversight activities carried out by the Senate Committee on Agriculture Production, Services and Rural Development from the 9th to the 10th Senate. The activities are diverse, encompassing lawmaking, motions, oversight functions, public hearings, interventions, legislative engagements, and strategic international partnerships—all focused on advancing Nigeria's agricultural sector.

From the table, there were volume and diversity of agriculture-related bills initiated and considered, particularly during the second and third sessions of the 9th Senate. These include the establishment of specialised institutions such as the National Tea and Coffee Development Council (SB.100), National Rice Development Council (SB.53), and Federal Colleges of Agriculture across various states. This legislative push reflects the Committee's alignment with Nigeria's drive to diversify the economy and reduce overdependence on oil through agrarian reforms and rural development. According to Nwankwo et al. (2020), legislative instruments aimed at institutional development in agriculture are pivotal to increasing sectoral productivity and enhancing food security.

The legislative focus on cassava, rice, livestock, and agricultural technology institutions suggests a comprehensive approach to boosting crop production, enhancing research, and promoting food processing industries. This aligns with FAO (2021) which emphasized that to transform Africa's agriculture; governments must invest in research institutions, improve seed and input quality, and legislate to support farmers' access to technology.

Oversight activities, which are essential for ensuring accountability in public spending and policy implementation, are evident in each session. The Committee's visits to agencies under the Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development across Nigeria indicate a proactive stance in evaluating the operational capacities and challenges of agriculture-focused agencies.

This corresponds with Ume & Okoosi-Simbine (2022), who argue that effective legislative oversight ensures that the executive delivers on budgetary and policy mandates, especially in sensitive sectors like agriculture.

Public hearings on key bills such as the National Food Reserve Agency Bill (SB.189) and Agricultural Research Council Amendment Bill (SB.118) demonstrate the Committee's effort to engage stakeholders and ensure participatory lawmaking. Public consultations are widely seen as essential in democratic governance and lend legitimacy to legislative outcomes (Adeleke, 2021).

The Committee also raised motions addressing critical challenges, such as the underfunding of research institutes and the ginger disease outbreak in Kaduna. These motions are essential in drawing urgent national attention to specific agricultural threats and funding gaps. Notably, the repeated call for increased budgetary allocations to the National Veterinary Research Institute, Vom, highlights the systemic underfunding of Nigeria's agricultural research infrastructure. Adebayo & Olagunju (2020) underscore that poor funding of research institutes significantly hampers innovation, disease control, and livestock productivity.

Moreover, the intervention in the Cocoa Research Institute of Nigeria and the Federal College of Agriculture, Akure, illustrates the Committee's role in addressing institutional constraints such as land encroachment and inadequate operational funding. These interventions are aligned with the World Bank (2022) recommendation that resolving legal, infrastructural, and governance issues within agricultural institutions is crucial to sector-wide growth.

The table further shows that the Committee participated in several legislative workshops, training, and international collaborations. Sessions such as the CAADP Biennial Review, Food Fortification Retreat, and engagements with IITA and FDC reflect the Committee's commitment to continuous learning and policy innovation. Furthermore, the partnership action plan with

Belarus to establish tractor assembly plants in Nigeria signals a strategic approach to mechanisation, which has long been a bottleneck in Nigeria’s agricultural transformation (Ojo & Yusuf, 2023).

These engagements also illustrate an understanding of agriculture as a dynamic and globally integrated sector. Legislative committees, therefore, must not only legislate but also network, train, and adapt global best practices to local contexts—a view supported by Ezeani & Uroko (2021), who note that effective governance in agriculture depends on the legislature’s capacity to bridge local realities with global innovations.

4.3. The Effectiveness of the Oversight Function on Food Security

This section evaluates the effectiveness of the Senate’s oversight function in enhancing food security in Nigeria through the work of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development (2019–2023). The assessment is based on a synthesis of documented legislative resolutions, committee activities, and perspectives from relevant stakeholders including committee members, staff, civil society organisations (CSOs), and officials of the Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development (FMARD).

For context, Nigeria’s food security challenges involve declining agricultural productivity, rural underdevelopment, insecurity in farming zones, and inadequate policy implementation. Legislative oversight, through the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development, serves as one of the mechanisms for ensuring policy compliance, funding accountability, and programme efficiency. Between 2019 and 2023, the Committee engaged in numerous motions, investigations, and public hearings to address persistent issues in agricultural policy implementation and food system resilience. However, to provide a comprehensive view, interviews were conducted with relevant stakeholders. The following excerpts reflect the views of

different populations directly involved in or impacted by the Senate's oversight role on agriculture and food security:

We made significant recommendations to the plenary, particularly on budgetary provisions for agricultural interventions. Some of those were acted upon, but what's missing is the will to follow through. You will see a motion passed, but implementation becomes a problem outside the chamber.

— Serving Senator, Member, Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development

I worked on at least three reports on rice farming programmes, livestock development, and fertiliser subsidies. Some ministries just carry on without responding to our letters. It weakens the whole idea of oversight.

— Legislative Officer, Secretariat of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development

We are often invited to hearings, yes, but the final resolutions hardly reflect the key inputs from experts. Sometimes, it feels performative—done to fulfil procedure, not to solve the problem.

— Representative, Civil Society Coalition on Food and Land Rights

Our ministry receives recommendations from the Senate Committee, especially regarding budgetary oversight. However, the issue has always been whether such recommendations come early enough to influence execution or whether they arrive when the budget cycle is too advanced.

— Director, Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development

There is a lot of paperwork, but little pressure for execution. Oversight without sanctions loses meaning. We used to summon some agencies during my time, but without political backing, enforcement was weak.

— Former Member, Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development

These views reflect a recurring theme of structural inefficiencies, executive-legislature disconnect, and limited enforcement of committee resolutions. Therefore, to assess effectiveness, it is useful to examine selected Senate resolutions using actual implementation as a yardstick and their implications for food security. Accordingly, the table below draws directly from the

documented votes and proceedings (attached as Appendix III), Table 4.2 (previously reviewed), and aligns them with evidence of follow-up action:

Table 4.3 offers a performance-based review of key interventions and oversight activities by the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development between 2019 and 2023. It categorises actions taken by the Committee, assesses their level of implementation, and evaluates their contributions to national food security outcomes. The effectiveness of these interventions is measured by whether there were tangible policy or programme changes after resolutions were passed or hearings held.

The table shows that most of the Committee's interventions scored low on effectiveness. For example, the resolution urging the revitalisation of the Nigerian Institute for Oil Palm Research (NIFOR) was passed in plenary but no major follow-up was recorded. This pattern of poor implementation despite legislative engagement reflects a wider issue in Nigeria's institutional environment where laws and resolutions often lack the force of execution. Arowosegbe & Akomolafe (2020) argue that oversight becomes symbolic when resolutions are not followed with enforceable mechanisms or when ministries refuse to implement agreed actions without consequence.

Several motions relating to input subsidies, such as the resolution to subsidise fertiliser, were adopted, but stakeholders still reported corruption and inefficiencies in the supply chain. According to Onuoha & Adedayo (2021), distribution of fertilisers in Nigeria continues to be riddled with political patronage, exclusion, and profiteering. Even where budgetary allocations were made, the effect on real productivity gains was limited due to poor monitoring and leakages within the delivery framework.

One of the most critical policy areas - the Rice Anchor Borrowers' Programme - also failed to show clear legislative impact. While the Committee submitted a report on the programme's weaknesses, there was no indication of reform or structural change in response to its findings. This suggests that the Committee's influence on flagship agricultural interventions managed by the Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) was minimal. According to Abdullahi & Tijani (2022), centralised programmes often operate without legislative control, limiting parliamentary impact on food security interventions even when concerns are raised.

Oversight visits to institutions such as the National Strategic Grains Reserve (NSGR) were held, yet the Committee's findings did not result in operational improvements. Reports by the Auditor-General's Office (2021) revealed that many storage facilities remained dilapidated, with expired grain stocks and insufficient logistics capacity. This further confirms that Committee actions were not followed by institutional or budgetary adjustments strong enough to resolve identified challenges.

The absence of action following the motion on the grazing reserve policy reflects political sensitivity and fragmentation across tiers of government. While the Senate Committee initiated discussions on livestock regulation, such debates often stall due to ethnic and regional divisions. Yahaya & Eme (2020) explain that pastoralist policies in Nigeria suffer from a lack of political consensus, which weakens legislative attempts to institutionalise reforms.

Public hearings, which are key instruments for accountability, were also found to have limited impact. Stakeholders who participated in hearings on bills such as the National Food Reserve Agency Bill noted that their inputs were not integrated into the final resolutions. As stated by Amadi & Okonkwo (2021), public engagement in legislative processes in Nigeria is often procedural rather than meaningful, reducing the effectiveness of such oversight tools.

The table also shows that budget scrutiny yielded moderate results, with occasional realignment of funding priorities. However, this did not translate into significant increases in agricultural budget allocations. As Uche & Ibrahim (2022) point out, Nigeria's agriculture sector remains underfunded, consistently falling short of the 10 percent Maputo Declaration benchmark. The Senate Committee's budgetary interventions, while visible, did not challenge or transform the underlying budget framework.

Finally, the table reveals a low score in terms of policy impact. Programmes such as the Cassava Inclusion Policy and post-harvest loss reduction strategies saw little implementation despite legislative attention. According to Ede & Oladipo (2022), Nigeria's legislative arm suffers from weak tracking systems, where there is no institutional mechanism to ensure that adopted motions are revisited or reviewed periodically for compliance.

4.4. The Challenges Faced by the Committee and Make Recommendations

4.4.1. Institutional and Legal Limitations

The institutional and legal framework within which the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development operates is one of the most prominent challenges facing the committee in enhancing food security. Although the Nigerian Constitution vests legislative oversight powers on the National Assembly, these powers are often weakened by procedural ambiguity, lack of enforcement mechanisms, and overlapping mandates with other agencies. A senior legislative aide at the Secretariat of the Senate Committee shared during an interview:

One of the most persistent constraints is the absence of statutory clarity on how far our recommendations can go. Even when our committee identifies issues during oversight or proposes policy reforms, there is often no clear legal backing to compel the executive agencies to act decisively or within specific timelines.

This aligns with findings by Okonkwo & Abubakar (2021), who noted that while legislative oversight is recognised constitutionally, it is frequently undermined by weak follow-up structures

and lack of cooperation from executive institutions. Beyond legal limitations, the institutional arrangement of food security governance in Nigeria is fragmented. Responsibilities are spread across several ministries and agencies, such as the Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development, Ministry of Water Resources, National Food Reserve Agency, and others. This fragmentation reduces coordination and limits the committee's effectiveness in monitoring and enforcing accountability across food security value chains.

4.4.2. Funding and Logistical Constraints

Limited funding and poor logistical support have continued to hamper the effective functioning of the committee. Though the legislature appropriates budgets, committees often struggle with securing adequate resources for effective oversight, public hearings, or field assessments.

According to a current member of the committee:

We are supposed to travel across the country for oversight—inspect silos, assess storage facilities, visit irrigation projects. But more than half the time, the release of funds for these activities is delayed or inadequate. You cannot legislate properly on what you cannot see or verify.

This observation is supported by Ayodele & Efem (2022), who established that underfunded committees are structurally handicapped, especially in sectors like agriculture that require field-based assessments and stakeholder consultations. In some instances, oversight visits are limited to Abuja or urban-based agencies due to cost constraints, leaving the performance of state-based agricultural projects under-examined.

4.4.3. Executive Dominance and Political Interference

The overbearing influence of the executive arm, particularly in policymaking and programme implementation also emerged as another core challenge identified by members of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development. The dominance of executive ministries and

agencies often results in selective implementation of legislative resolutions and weak response to committee recommendations. A former committee member offered this perspective:

We pass resolutions, approve funding, and provide oversight guidelines, yet many times the executive agencies do not respond unless it aligns with their political or administrative priorities. It is frustrating because the committee lacks enforcement powers. We cannot punish or compel them except through media or political pressure, which is not sustainable.

This problem reflects a broader systemic issue in Nigeria's governance structure, where separation of powers is often tilted in favour of the executive, reducing the influence of legislative interventions. As argued by Eze & Ogbonna (2021), political control over civil service structures by ministers and executive appointees dilutes legislative authority, especially in sectors where the legislature seeks to exert strategic developmental oversight.

Political interference also extends to budgetary decisions. Members of the committee shared experiences of executive actors modifying budgetary allocations for key food security programmes without consultation, despite legislative inputs through public hearings and committee recommendations. This undermines transparency, and as highlighted in the literature by Iroegbu (2020), it creates policy discontinuity and demoralises legislative actors who feel their roles are symbolic rather than functional.

4.4.4. Capacity Gaps and Research Deficiency

Another internal challenge facing the committee is the lack of sufficient technical capacity and research support required to evaluate complex food security issues and design effective legislative interventions. Committee staffs are often generalists, lacking deep knowledge in agricultural science, nutrition policy, rural development, or climate-smart agriculture. An official in the Secretariat of the committee remarked:

When we receive submissions or petitions involving technical issues—like irrigation science, genetically modified seeds, food storage technology—our

team struggles. We have brilliant lawyers and administrative staff, but food security is a specialised field, and we do not get enough training or expert support.

This issue is not peculiar to Nigeria. As noted by Yakubu & Mohammed (2023), many African parliaments suffer from inadequate legislative research departments, which weaken evidence-based decision-making in technical policy areas like agriculture and food security. In some instances, public hearings lack the needed depth because technical witnesses are either unavailable or underutilised. As a result, laws and policies that emerge are often reactive rather than proactive, lacking the rigour required to address systemic food insecurity.

4.4.5. Weak Stakeholder Engagement and Public Participation

A recurrent theme in interviews was the limited engagement between the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development and relevant non-governmental stakeholders, such as farmers' associations, community-based organisations, and food policy think tanks. Respondents expressed concern that the committee's engagements were often limited to formal hearings and did not reflect regular grassroots consultations or collaborative planning. According to a representative of a civil society organisation focused on agricultural policy,

The committee only invites stakeholders during public hearings when a bill is already at an advanced stage. There is no consistent dialogue with farming communities, researchers, or NGOs during the drafting phase. This gap means that many policies do not reflect real on-the-ground realities, especially those affecting smallholder farmers.

This challenge has been observed in similar studies. Okorie (2021) maintains that inclusive policy development is central to addressing food insecurity in low-income economies, yet Nigeria's legislative frameworks still adopt a top-down approach. When food policy excludes the experiences of marginalised producers—such as women farmers, pastoralists, and displaced rural populations—the effectiveness of legislative interventions is severely diminished. Furthermore,

most engagements focus heavily on donor-driven projects or high-level stakeholders, excluding local knowledge holders. A former legislative staff member disclosed:

Sometimes we rely too much on donor input—World Bank, FAO, USAID—during committee briefings, while we neglect inputs from local extension agents or cooperatives who deal directly with production challenges.

This disconnect affects the relevance and sustainability of legislation. Active and continuous engagement with key stakeholders, including community leaders, private sector actors, and traditional institutions, would improve the inclusiveness and responsiveness of food security legislation.

4.4.6. Limited Financial Resources and Budget Tracking Mechanisms

A major structural limitation cited by interviewees is the inadequate funding allocated to support the committee's functions, including oversight visits, public hearings, stakeholder consultations, and monitoring of programme implementation. An official from the Federal Ministry of Agriculture who has engaged with the committee explained:

There are periods when committee members raise very important concerns or observations, but due to lack of funding, they cannot conduct field visits or verify projects. This means some agencies continue to operate without adequate scrutiny.

This problem is compounded by the lack of a centralised budget tracking system that allows the committee to monitor how food security-related funds are utilised across ministries, departments, and agencies. Accordingly, Oladipo & Hassan (2022) argue that weak budget tracking undermines food security outcomes in Nigeria, especially when agricultural capital expenditures are delayed or diverted without legislative redress. Without proper tracking mechanisms, corruption and inefficiencies go unchecked, reducing the impact of programmes meant to alleviate food insecurity.

In interviews, some committee members expressed frustration at their inability to verify the implementation of agricultural budget lines, especially in rural development and research institutions:

We approve allocations for agricultural extension services or seed improvement projects, but when we visit the states, we do not see results. Sometimes, these programmes exist only on paper, and yet the executive agencies keep getting funds every year.

4.4.7 Menace of Insecurity and Insurgency

The activities of boko haram insurgency, farmer's herder's conflict and kidnapping have continued to hinder effective oversight of the committee. Although the legislature is saddled with the responsibility of monitoring utilization of appropriated funds to the agencies under its jurisdiction, on the spot inspection of some institutions are not achievable. According to a serving committee member:

We are supposed to visit the agencies for firsthand information to ascertain adequate implementation of the annual appropriation act. But there is fear of kidnapping and attacks from insurgents. The committee relies only on paper work as submitted by the agencies in assessing utilization of budgeted monies.

This observation is supported by Yusuf & Adeyemi (2020) who identified incessant bandit attacks and kidnapping of farmers as a major cause of economic instability and food shortage in northern Nigeria. Mostly, oversight visits are limited to Abuja, Lagos and urban based agencies due to insecurity, leaving the performance of insurgency prone areas unexamined.

4.4.8. Recommendations for Strengthening the Role of the Committee

Based on the challenges identified above, the following recommendations are proposed to enhance the effectiveness of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development in

addressing food security in Nigeria. These recommendations are drawn from both the data analysed and stakeholder suggestions during interviews.

1) Capacity Development and Technical Assistance

Partner with research institutions, agricultural universities, and international agencies to train committee staff in relevant technical areas and provide expert consultancy. A senior official at the Secretariat of the Senate Committee commented:

We need a situation where each committee member understands the complexities of modern food systems—not just budget lines or bureaucratic procedures. Training should be a priority from the first day of assuming office.

2) Dedicated Committee Budget Line and Logistics Support

Ensure that annual appropriation acts include a clearly defined budget line for committee oversight activities, distinct from general legislative funding.

3) Strengthening Legislative-Executive Collaboration

Introduce a joint legislative-executive review mechanism for food security interventions to enhance synergy, especially during the budget formulation phase. Several interviewees criticized the disconnect between the committee and key government ministries. A former committee member noted:

We sometimes find ourselves working in silos. The Ministry of Agriculture and the National Food Security Council rarely engage with the committee beyond formal presentations. A more collaborative approach is required.

To address this, a formal coordination platform should be established between the committee and food-related executive bodies to align policies, identify implementation gaps, and strengthen joint oversight missions.

4) Institutionalizing Stakeholder Engagement

Establish a quarterly Stakeholders' Consultation Forum on Agriculture and Rural Development, involving CSOs, farmer associations, traditional leaders, and academic experts. This would not only increase transparency but also improve the contextual relevance of proposed laws. As one CSO respondent put it:

We have rural communities that are on the frontlines of food insecurity. Yet their voices are not included in legislative discussions. We need more inclusive lawmaking that reflects local realities.

The committee could work with the National Orientation Agency (NOA) and community radio platforms to disseminate legislative plans and receive feedback from farmers and local leaders.

5) Legislative Reform and Legal Mandate Clarification

Amend relevant legislative instruments to define timelines for executive compliance with Senate resolutions and to establish sanction mechanisms for non-compliance. An agricultural policy advisor noted:

We need fewer ceremonial bills and more strategic ones. Issues like land tenure for women farmers or climate-resilient crop systems deserve urgent attention. The committee must drive bills that address real food insecurity triggers.

Strategic legislation should be developed in consultation with experts from the Nigerian Institute of Soil Science (NISS), the National Food Reserve Agency (NFRA), and international research centres to reflect evidence-based solutions.

6) Development of a Digital Budget and Project Tracking System

Collaborate with the National Assembly Budget and Research Office (NABRO) to deploy an integrated monitoring and evaluation platform to track agricultural programme performance in real time.

7) Establishment of Modern Ranches in Collaboration with Security Agencies

Facilitate bills aimed at making provision for constructing modern ranches to eradicate the archaic nomadic rearing of animals as such promote livestock production. Also, public hearings should be organized in collaboration with the security agencies to develop a new security blueprint on practical solutions to end insecurity through suggestions gathered from individuals living in insurgency dominated areas

4.5. Discussion of Findings

The findings of the study underscore the strengths and gaps in Nigeria’s legislative approach to food security between 2019 and 2023, with evidence from parliamentary proceedings and stakeholder interviews. The legislative framework in Nigeria provides a strong foundation for food security, especially through a series of bills and motions considered by the Senate. One such example is the Food Security (Establishment, etc.) Bill, which sought to institutionalize food security structures in Nigeria. Through these legislative tools, the Senate attempted to create agencies and policies to tackle the issues of agricultural production, food storage, and rural development. This proactive lawmaking approach reflected the country’s commitment to the Maputo Declaration of allocating at least 10% of national budgets to agriculture and ensuring policy coherence with regional and global food security commitments. Yet, as of 2023, allocations still fall short of the Maputo benchmark, with the agricultural budget comprising just a fraction of total federal expenditure, revealing a significant policy-implementation gap.

The performance of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development was marked by a high level of legislative activity. The committee facilitated the passage of over 20 bills during the 9th Senate, including those establishing agricultural colleges and research centres

across different states. The committee's legislative interventions addressed key areas such as livestock development, food processing, extension services, and food safety. For example, the establishment of the National Rice Development Council and the National Food Reserve Agency aimed to tackle perennial issues around food storage and price stabilisation. These legislative actions provided institutional solutions to food insecurity, particularly by focusing on staple crops and strategic reserves.

However, the implementation of these bills, as well as their effectiveness, depended heavily on follow-through by the executive. While the committee succeeded in legislative advocacy, oversight and enforcement were more difficult to sustain. Interview data revealed gaps in enforcement capacity, as stated by a Secretariat staff member:

We have seen these bills pass, but implementation is out of our hands. Sometimes, agencies simply lack the resources or political will to execute the mandates. Our job ends at passage; the rest is in the hands of others.

Oversight by the committee was critical in ensuring that the executive arm was held accountable for agricultural policies and programmes. Field visits, motion debates, and public hearings played a role in checking the activities of the Ministry of Agriculture and its agencies. An example is the committee's oversight on the Anchor Borrowers Programme. Although the Central Bank initiated the programme, the Senate Committee followed up to ensure transparency, especially regarding its reach in various states. Another real-world example is the committee's inquiry into the large-scale importation of maize despite existing bans and foreign exchange restrictions. This investigation highlighted contradictions in Nigeria's food policy regime and the challenge of smuggling.

Despite these efforts, the oversight function faced constraints. Interview data from a former member of the Senate Committee noted:

When we raised motions on food importation or smuggling, often our resolutions would be delayed or ignored by agencies. Oversight becomes frustrating when there is no mechanism to enforce compliance or follow up with sanctions.

Challenges encountered by the committee included bureaucratic delays, political interference, lack of coordination between agencies, and limited access to real-time agricultural data. These were compounded by poor infrastructure in rural areas, weak research institutions, and budgetary shortfalls. For instance, although the Senate recommended increased funding for research institutes like the Cocoa Research Institute of Nigeria, only limited budgetary improvements were made. This underfunding undermines agricultural research and development, which is essential for food production and sustainability.

One of the more significant challenges was the political nature of agricultural project siting. Interview responses from legislative staff highlighted regional lobbying pressures that sometimes skewed priorities away from national planning:

Every zone wants a college or institute, even when it is not needed in that area. We spend time balancing interests instead of focusing on strategy. This slows down real reform.

Despite these constraints, the committee demonstrated innovation by engaging in seminars and international collaborations. The action plan signed with Belarus to establish tractor assembly plants in Nigeria shows efforts to improve mechanisation. While this represents a positive shift towards strategic partnerships, its success depends on government follow-up and domestic policy alignment.

CHAPTER FIVE

SUMMARY, RECOMMENDATIONS AND CONCLUSION

This chapter presents the summary of key findings, the conclusion drawn from the study, and practical recommendations. It reflects on the role of the Senate in enhancing food security in Nigeria and addresses the research objectives by highlighting critical legislative activities, oversight performance, institutional challenges, and proposed strategies for improvement.

5.1. Summary of Findings

The study confirms that the Nigerian Senate played an active legislative role in advancing food security between 2019 and 2023, particularly through the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development. A significant number of food-related bills and motions were sponsored and debated, reflecting a clear intention by lawmakers to strengthen the policy and institutional foundations of Nigeria's food security architecture. Key bills such as the Food Security (Establishment, etc.) Bill and the National Food Reserve Agency Bill were aimed at addressing food storage, agricultural research, and market stabilisation.

Despite this robust legislative output, national budget allocations to agriculture remained below the 10% target agreed under the Maputo Declaration. This gap between legislative intent and actual funding shows that Nigeria's food policy is undermined by weak implementation. The committee's success in legislative drafting was not matched by consistent follow-through, as the execution of bills and motions often stalled within the executive arm. Stakeholder interviews confirmed that many agencies either lacked the capacity or political will to carry out legislative mandates, leaving approved laws unimplemented.

Oversight efforts by the committee were targeted and relevant. Field inspections, motion debates, and inquiries were used to monitor key agricultural programmes, including the Anchor Borrowers

Programme and the regulation of food imports. These activities brought attention to problems such as smuggling and irregularities in food trade policy. However, committee resolutions were frequently disregarded by government agencies, due in part to the absence of enforceable mechanisms and weak inter-agency coordination.

The committee also faced challenges in budget oversight, policy enforcement, and research funding. Cases like the underfunding of the Cocoa Research Institute of Nigeria illustrate how legislative recommendations are often overlooked in the appropriation process. Political interference in project siting and pressure from regional lobbyists diverted attention from strategic national planning. These constraints reduced the impact of the committee's efforts and contributed to the underperformance of key agricultural institutions.

Despite these barriers, the committee made efforts to explore strategic partnerships and build technical knowledge. The engagement with Belarus to establish tractor assembly plants shows a willingness to pursue mechanisation and modernisation of agriculture through international collaboration. While promising, such initiatives require strong follow-up and integration into broader agricultural policy frameworks to deliver real outcomes.

Overall, the Senate demonstrated legislative commitment to food security, but poor implementation, weak enforcement capacity, and political constraints limited the full realisation of its efforts. Stronger alignment between legislative action and executive implementation is necessary to ensure that laws passed by the National Assembly translate into improved food systems and outcomes for Nigerians.

5.2. Recommendations

1) Strengthen Legislative Policy Alignment: It is recommended that all food security legislation be harmonised with national development plans and regional frameworks like the

Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Programme (CAADP), to avoid duplication, ensure coherence, and enhance policy effectiveness.

2) Institutionalise Performance Benchmarks: The Senate Committee on Agriculture should adopt a structured monitoring framework with defined performance benchmarks for evaluating legislative outcomes, ensuring that passed bills translate into measurable improvements in agricultural productivity and food systems.

3) Enforce Oversight Compliance Mechanisms: There is a need to empower the Senate with binding enforcement tools to ensure executive compliance with oversight resolutions, including mandatory response timelines and penalties for non-implementation of legislative recommendations.

4) Address Institutional and Political Bottlenecks: To overcome implementation challenges, capacity-building initiatives should be introduced for committee members and staff, while reforming project allocation processes to prioritise national food security needs over political influence or regional lobbying.

5) Establish Ranches:

As a matter of urgency, the Senate should facilitate and pass a bill for an Act to establish ranches in the six geopolitical zones, to ensure safety of livestock, farmlands and relocation of displaced persons back to their ancestral lands.

5.3. Conclusion

The study concludes that the Senate played a pivotal role in addressing food security challenges in Nigeria between 2019 and 2023 through legislative and oversight interventions. The Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development was particularly active, sponsoring and facilitating the passage of over 20 bills aimed at strengthening the agricultural sector. These

included the establishment of critical institutions such as the National Food Reserve Agency and the National Rice Development Council. Such efforts reflect a legislative commitment to addressing food insecurity through institutional and policy frameworks.

Despite these achievements, the study confirms a wide gap between legislative intent and execution. Many of the bills passed remain poorly implemented due to weak executive follow-through, insufficient funding, and lack of enforcement mechanisms. The committee's oversight activities, while significant, were often constrained by delays, political interference, and poor coordination among implementing agencies. These systemic challenges undermine the effectiveness of legislative efforts.

The findings also highlight that food security interventions are often influenced by regional political interests rather than national priorities. This has weakened strategic planning and delayed the full implementation of food security programmes. While the committee showed promise by exploring partnerships such as the tractor assembly agreement with Belarus, these initiatives require robust institutional support to yield tangible results.

Indeed, the Senate demonstrated commitment to improving food security through legislative measures and oversight, but operational challenges continue to hinder impact. Addressing these gaps requires stronger institutional collaboration, improved budgetary support, and clear accountability mechanisms. For Nigeria to achieve sustainable food security, legislative actions must be matched by strategic execution, guided by national interests and evidence-based planning. The role of the legislature remains vital, but it must be supported by a more coordinated and accountable governance structure. To strengthen the Senate authority over executive agencies where necessary, it is imperative to prioritize the implementation of legislative reform policies and review the constitution to empower the legislature in achieving a food secured Nigeria.

5.4. Contribution to Knowledge

This study contributes to knowledge by establishing the link between legislative engagement and food security policy outcomes in Nigeria. It provides empirical evidence on the role, performance, and challenges of the Senate Committee on Agriculture, highlighting gaps in implementation, oversight, and coordination. By bridging legislative activities with practical food security outcomes, the study offers a policy-focused framework for enhancing parliamentary accountability in agricultural governance. This study also differs from previous literature on role of legislatures by analysing the combination of empirical legislative data and stakeholder perspectives.

However, further research directions, such as comparative legislative studies across African countries or subnational legislative roles in food security are recommended to boost food production and achieve 2030 zero hunger mandate of the SDGs.
