REVENUE ALLOCATION

In pursuance to the provision of Section 149 (2) of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria which empowers the National Assembly to work out a formula for the distribution of public Revenue Standing to the Credit of the Federation Account, the Kaduna State House of Assembly Knowing fully the significance attached in the sharing of the National Cake had considered and passed a Resolution sincerely hoping it will be tabled before the National Assembly.

- 2. The decision is contained in the attached copies of the Votes and Proceedings No. 24 of Thursday, 13th November, 1980 in which the House requested that non-oil producing States should be compensated for Returns on Capital Investment used in the sustainment of Nigeria's Economy before and after Independence.
- 3. Much as we supported the Principle of Derivation, we believe that a new "Capitalization Principle" is necessary to provide Funds to those States that produces Groundnuts, Cotton, Ginger, Cocoa, Hides and Skin as well as Tin. The Agricultural Provision in these States had greatly affected the Land which is now unproductive due to excessive cultivation and consequent infertility soil erosion. It is a fact these Agricultural produce mainly from the Northern States provide the back bone of the National Economy upon which all major National Developments were carried out including the establishment of oil Refineries
- 4. In the interest of Unity and Peace of this great Nation, let wise counsel prevails so that an equitable formula for the Nation will be arrived at.

OVERSEAS VISIT BY MEMBERS OF NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

My officers and I feel very much gratified by some of the reports made about our Missions by members of the National Assembly undertaking visits abroad. These observations have helped towards the solution of some of the constraints under which Nigerian Missions abroad have been operating.

- 2. Our normal duty to assist and facilitate the visits of Honourable Members to foreign countries has now been stimulated to the level of interest that we feel we should draw your attention to certain factors which will enable us to maintain this standard. One of these is that, with the growing leading role Nigeria is playing in international affairs, foreign countries and their functionaries will increasingly wish to woo the Honourable Members of our National Assembly through invitations to visit their respective countries. In this Ministry, we have Departments which have expert knowledge of foreign countries and their political outlook, which we feel should be availed to the Honourable Members undertaking such trips, in their own interest and that of Nigeria. I would therefore, appreciate your cooperation in seeking the advice of my Ministry whenever such occasions arise. Such reference to us will further enable our Missions abroad to prepare adequately to receive the visitors and arrange activities for them in a befitting manner.
- 3. On the part of the receiving countries, we have of recent, received complaints through our Missions, of visiting Members not participating in programmes arranged for them, or even cancelling to visit certain cities in which programmes have been arranged for them, without due notice. Where the receiving countries had been enthusiastic to cultivate goodwill among Nigerians, such omissions have been most embarrassing to the host authorities and to our officers who work among them.
- 4. It is therefore my earnest desire that the foregoing would be seen in the spirit of cooperation which my Ministry is endeavouring to foster with the National Assembly. If these views are acceptable to you, I would be grateful if they can be brought to the attention of all the Honourable Members of the National Assembly.

Approach.—In order to effectively and successfully tackle the responsibility of catering for members' welfare and comfort (House Resolutions 207-211 of 23rd June, 1980 refers) your committee's first action was to examine all the issues affecting the welfare and comfort of members. These are grouped under five areas. These are:

- (1) Social Services, i.e. provision of essential services.
- (2) Security of members and their families.
- (3) Accommodation.
- (4) Health care for members and their families.
- (5) Education for members' children.

Activities.—Reports on your committee's activities are as follows:—

Social Services.—An inconclusive meeting has been held with the Hon. Minister of Housing and Environment on the issue of the allocation of the shopping spaces within the members' quarters. Another meeting is planned for next week to enable your committee conclude arrangements for the opening of the Supermarket and other services. It is agreed however that any decision arrived at will be perfectly in line with our House Resolution No. 209 of 23rd June, 1980.

(i) Essential Commodities:

We have concluded all arrangements with the suppliers of essential commodities. Members are now being invited to give indication as to their individual requirements. Members co-operation is very essential for prompt action.

(ii) Security:

- (a) General Security.—Your committee invited the Inspector-General of Police for an interview on 5th September, 1980 where general security provisions for the National Assembly premises and members' flats were examined and discussed. Arrangements are in full gear to implement recommendations for improved security of both premises.
- (b) Fire.—Your committee invited the Chief Federal Fire Officer for an interview on the 15th September, 1980, where fire security provisions for the National Assembly premises and members' quarters were discussed. His recommendation after the inspection of both premises included the establishment of a fire station within the members' quarters and the provision of a variety of fire-fighting equipment.

A fire station now operates a twenty-four hours service from flat E109. The immediate presence of the fire service saved life and property during the recent fire incident involving a member's flat.

Arrangements are underway to provide all the fire-fighting equipment recommended for members' flats soonest.

(iii) Accommodation :

Every member of this House is now fairly well accommodated and has received one of the new T V sets. Several inadequacies in the flats especially the poor quality on the furniture and furnishings, and the sub standard quality of several household utilities have been identified. Your committee, having identified these problems, resolved to place before you a resolution so that (i) members' flats will be furnished up to the required standard and (ii) all damaged and defective utilities shall be replaced while the essential ones not yet provided shall be purchased.

The problem of lack of accommodation for the drivers and servants of members continues to create problems for your committee. Arrangements will be made to contain these deficiencies as soon as the House approves.

(iv) Health:

You will agree that as at now the service provided by the Clinic at the members' quarters are not satisfactory and grossly inadequate. Our committee met on several occasions and as a result we are happy to announce the following:—

- (1) That an A.I.E. for the sum of N200,000 has been sent to the Director of Medical Research and Training for the purchase of drugs, equipment and vehicle including an ambulance—as recommended by the medical officer in charge of the Clinic to the House Committee.
- (2) At present the Clinic operates a 7 a.m.-7 p.m.—Monday-Friday service. This we consider quite inadequate. However we have been assured by the medical officer that a 24 hours service (including weekends) will be operated as soon as all arrangements for the accommodation of their staff are complete. We hasten to add that we have now allocated to them the number of flats we considered necessary for the efficient discharge of their duties.

(v) Education:

Despite initial problems and constraints your committee is happy to report that the school within the Estate now runs as a full primary school (primary one to six). The inadequate accommodation of only eight classrooms have made it impossible for the school to accommodate more than it does at present. The inadequate classroom accommodation has also made it impossible for your committee to presently arrange a nursery school for the Kindergartens.

Arrangements are underway with the Federal Ministry of Housing to provide six more classrooms as soon as possible.

Your committee has been able to establish very cordial relations with the management and staff of the school.

(vi) Members Office | Staff Facilities:

Your committee has constantly received the problems faced by members as a result of inadequate or even non-existence of supporting staff and office facilities. After nearly twelve months of operation, and realising the magnitude of our duties and the onus placed on this essential arm of the Government by the public, your committee considers it hypocritical not to state the obvious.

We are stating unequivocably that each member must operate an office in his Constituency while adequate arrangement must be made as a matter of urgency by the Clerk of the National Assembly for necessary office accommodation and the supporting staff in Lagos.

Conclusion | Recommendations:

In order to be able to correct the inadequacies mentioned above and in order to provide the essential services and utilities required by Hon. Members, your committee recommends that the House resolves as follows:

- I. That immediate steps be taken to provide the various fire-fighting equipment recommended by the Federal Fire Service.
 - 2. That immediate steps be taken to replace the present furniture in Members' flats.

- 3. That immediate steps should be taken to provide for members' flats essential household utilities and such utilities should be marked property of the National Assembly.
- 4. That the security arrangements at both the National Assembly premises and the members' flats be tightened by the provision of all the necessary devices recommended by the Security Authorities.
- 5. That Hon. Members of the House of Representatives should be given a time limit of two weeks within which to organise and establish offices/staff in their respective Constituencies. That the Clerk of the National Assembly should be responsible for the Hon. Members' offices in Lagos and in the Constituencies.

ELECTRONIC VOTING SYSTEM FOR THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

The electronic voting system has been commissioned. The Engineer-in-charge has however advised that the system cannot be effectively used until the sitting arrangements for Members has been properly streamlined as follows:

- (a) For the system to operate effectively, every Member should be allocated a numbered seat on a permanent basis so that everytime there is a roll-call or division he will vote only from the number and seat allocated to him.





The Polisario Front attaches great importance to keep the Distinguished Representatives of the Great People of Nigeria informed about the nature and the latest developments of the war in Western Sahara. This disposition of both the Sahraoui State and the Polisario Front is two-fold:

- (1) The constant search for a peaceful solution to the conflict above-mentioned on the one hand (which cannot be achieved without the assistance of peace and justice loving forces who should have full knowledge of facts) and, on the other hand,
- (2) To avoid the internationalisation of the conflict, action should be geared towards a just and lasting solution within the African Family at a time when the aggressors are trying by all means to provoke the direct interference of extra-african forces.

It is our belief, therefore, that in order to restore peace and stability in the region, it would be useful if a delegation of the House of Representatives could pay a visit to our country, like the American, European and other Parliamentary delegations from all over the world, in order to assess the situation on-the-spot.

If this invitation can be honoured, we wish to suggest the date of 27th February, 1981 which coincides with festivities marking the 5th Anniversary of the Proclamation of the Sahraoui Arab Democratic Republic.

The Embassy of the Sahraoui Arab Democratic Republic accredited in Cotonou is confident that the Honourable Members of the House of Representatives cannot sit and watch an African conflict which challenges the fundamental principles of the Charter of the O.A.U. and threatens peace and security in our Continent, especially as Nigeria was unanimously mandated by the O.A.U. as member of the Ad-Hoc Committee on Western Sahara, and supports the right of self-determination of our people in accordance with the Resolutions of our Organisation and the United Nations.

The Sahraoui Embassy wishes to point out that steps have been taken to facilitate the visit of the delegation of the House of Representatives throughout Western Sahara, and especially in the liberated areas of the territory and the Refugee Camps.

I would like to avail myself of this opportunity to renew to you, Honourable Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, the assurances of my highest consideration.



Summary:

On this issue as it is,

The Committee members have unanimously endorsed it. Final analysis from page 397-415 has therefore been approved as below:—

The Committee deliberated on the Capital Estimates of the 1981 Budget Proposals and called on the Permanent Secretary to brief the Committee on the expenditure of the 1980 Budget.

1980 Budget (Expenditure): The Permanent Secretary informed the Committee that he was not in a position to give a detailed accounts of the 1980 Expenditure since the returns from the States and branches are not yet available. He however pointed out that Personnel Costs were not in a bad state but the Recurrent Estimates was not yet available. As regards Capital Estimates, he remarked that his Ministry is not a "spending ministry".

Asked how far the Estimate has tallied with the Budget and whether it is impossible to assess what is needed in the Personnel so as to know what to approve. The Head of Section, Chief Onabanjo explained that the Ministry gets supplementary returns through the Accountant-General. Personal Emoluments were a little higher than the Estimate in 1980 in spite of unfilled vacancies. In 1979-80 there was an excess of over \$\frac{N}{4}00,000\$ and one of \$\frac{N}{7}\$ million voted for this Head in 1980, the expenditure nearly exhausted the entire vote. In almost all the Heads of the Recurrent Estimate, the Ministry overspent its vote because the Estimate was neither generous, objective nor realistic.

Asked to elaborate on the alleged unrealistic nature of the Budget and whether this is why the Ministry has asked for more money in 1981, the Permanent Secretary explained that the hardship has been felt in most sections. For instance, he said, under Local Transport and Travelling in 1980 Budget, N296,000.00 was voted but the Ministry spent N600,000.00.

Asked whether the Ministry mentioned this last year, the Permanent Secretary answered in the negative, pointing out that the Ministry of Finance sometimes uses the rule of thumb to save the Ministry when it is in trouble.

Hon, members stressed the need for the Ministry to submit definite figures in its Recurrent Expenditure, noting that if the Ministry of Finance could supplement the Budget as indicated by the Permanent Secretary, it then means there is no planning.

Personnel Costs: To arrive at a good draft Estimates, the Ministry uses a simple formula of multiplying the 4th point of the level by the number of people in the section.

Foreign Trade: The Committee regretted that Nigerians Trade Attaches abroad face a lot of untold hardships and are very much understaffed. Last year, the Ministry promised to improve the conditions and uplift the country's trade image abroad. The Committee sought to know why nothing has been done about this in 1981 Budget Proposals.

In his answer, the Permanent Secretary explained that the Ministry is to create a Department of Foreign Trade headed by a level 16 officer.

There would also be created, an information Section to furnish the Trade missions abroad with happenings in the country. He further explained that these would be included in the Supplementary Appropriation Budget.

On the issue of Diplomatic Immunity for the Trade Attache's, the Permanent Secretary said he could not give a definite answer as this is the duty of the Ministry of External Affairs. It was suggested that the Ministry of Commerce if necessary, should send a Bill to the National Assembly on this issue. Asked whether the approval for the reorganisation enumerated above affects commercial Attache's abroad and at home, the Permanent Secretary answered in the affirmative but remarked that the Ministry only has Trade officers now but is planning to train these officers to become Commercial Attache's.

Price Intelligence Division: Referring the Permanent Secretary to this Subhead, the Committee wondered if this is not same as the Price Control Board but only differs in name. The Permanent Secretary explained that this unit does not prosecute but only reports price situations in the markets to the Ministry.

Since this unit covers buying and selling, the Committee sought to know if there were plans to improve prices from firms like Peugeot Automobile Nigeria Limited. The Permanent Secretary explained that this unit is under Domestic Trade and is not sufficiently equipped to stand alone. With Peugeot Automobile Nigeria Limited, there is a formular for prices and the Ministry is getting cautions as prices are becoming political issues.

Nigeria Hotels and Catering Schools: Questioned on the increase in the Estimate, the Permanent Secretary explained that Private Catering Schools were becoming most expensive and unpopular. Consequently, the Ministry wants to expand the existing schools and build new ones if possible.

Trade Fair: Asked why there has been no Trade Exhibitions since 1977, the Permanent Secertary explained that the complex is not lying waste and anybody who wishes to make use of the complex is free to do so on the payment of a certain sum. He stressed that traders ought to initiate the exhibitions while the government supports them. The government cannot afford to finance a Trade Fair like it did in 1977.

The Ministry officials were also questioned on the need to spend a huge sum of money to purchase spraying equipment which ought properly belong to the Ministry of Agriculture. It was explained that Decree No. 30 of 1975 imposes a duty on the Ministry to fumigate all in-coming and out-going produce.

On the proposed International Youth Tourism Centre in Jos, it was explained that the centre would serve as a holiday resort, a base for recruitments, conferences, and to discourage the youth from trooping out of the country during summer. The Committee commended the Ministry on its initiative and advised that this centre should came for both young and old. The Committee also advised the Ministry to bring such projects to the notice of the Committee assuring the officials that the Committee is not hostile to such ideas.

On the 26th January, 1980, the Committee again convened a meeting to enable Hon. members take a decision on the Budget Proposals for 1981, having considered the points raised at the last meeting with officials from the Federal Ministry of Commerce. Sixteen members of the Committee were in attendance.

The Committee unanimously endorsed the 1981 Budget Proposals.

PERSONS ELIGIBLE TO HOLD DIPLOMATIC PASSPORTS

As you may already be aware, Mr President has exercised his prerogative in approving that diplomatic passports should be issued to the following members of the National Assembly subject to the National Assembly signifying agreement that the issuance of diplomatic passports should be so limited:

- (i) Political Party Leaders in the National Assembly;
- (ii) Chairmen of Committees of the National Assembly; and
- (iii) all members of the Foreign Relations Committee of the National Assembly.
- 2. Accordingly, it is expected that 37 Senators and 58 members of the House of Representatives would be eligible to have diplomatic passports. But when a member of the National Assembly ceases to function in the capacity which made him eligible to be granted a diplomatic passport, the passport is automatically withdrawn.
- 3. I should appreciate if you would forward the applications of the Senators and Members concerned on prescribed forms for processing and issue of diplomatic passports to them.
 - 4. A copy of this letter is being sent to the Hon. Minister of Internal Affairs.

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SUPPLEMENT 'B' TO THESE VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS HOUSE COMMITTEE—HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES A REPORT

In pursuance of the House Resolution of 29th January, 1981 (Vide Votes and Proceedings No. 44) your committee met on Tuesday, 7th April, 1981 and it was resolved as follows:—

- I. Quarterly Release of Salaries of Legislative Staff: That for administrative ease and convenience the National Assembly should with effect from April 1981 release funds for salaries of Members' Legislative Staff on quarterly basis in advance.
 - 2. Payment Voucher:
- (a) That each Member shall forward to the National Assembly through the House Committee evidence of proper disbursement of public funds released to him. Booklets of a fool proof salary Payment Voucher designed for the use of all Members are now available for distribution. Members should call at the House Committee Office to sign for and collect their copies.
- (b) That the original and duplicate copies of the Payment Voucher for one month must reach the Chairman, House Committee on or before the 14th day of the following month, e.g. the Payment Voucher for the month of March must reach the Controller of Finance on or before the 14th day of April. Members are reminded of the House Resolution to the effect that "Any subsequent release of funds to each Member shall be made only on the condition that adequate returns have been made in respect of previous releases."
- 3. Tax payable by Members' Legislative Staff: That pending the proper assessment of tax payable by Members' Legislative Staff by the local tax authorities, each Member shall deduct tax payable by Staff and pay over to the tax authority in Member's constituency at the following rates:—
 - (i) 5% for Staff on a Salary below №2,000.00
 - (ii) 10% for Staff on a Salary above №2,000.00

In effect all Legislative Staff shall sign for and obtain net salary representing gross salary less tax.

- 4. Office Equipment in Constituency Other Office Expenses: That the balance of funds meant for office equipment in constituency and other office expenses (vide Votes and Proceedings No. 44 of January 29th, 1981) shall be paid in one instalment for administrative convenince to only Members who have made adequate returns of previous releases.
- 5. Constituency Sub-Offices: That Members may be obliged to open Sub-offices in order to meet with the demands of considerable large constituencies. Such Sub-offices shall not attract extra funds from the National Assembly for their maintenance. Members shall accommodate the needs of such Sub-offices from their present votes.
- 6. Staff Changes: That Members are entitled to staff changes as and when the needs arise. Such changes must be communicated to the Controller of Finance through the Chairman, House Committee before the 14th day of the month when such changes shall take effect.
- 7. Signboards: That for easy identification of the Constituency Offices each Member shall display a signboard showing:
 - (i) The National Crest
 - (ii) The name of the Constituency and
 - (iii) The name of the Member in green block letters on white background.



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SUPPLEMENT No. 1 TO THE VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS HOUSE SERVICES COMMITTEE, HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES A REPORT—MEDICAL FACILITIES FOR MEMBERS

Your Committee met on May 13th 1981 to discuss the above and Recommends as follows:—
1. MEDICAL TREATMENT IN GOVERNMENT HOSPITALS

That a member and members of his family shall be entitled to Free Medical Treatment at any Government Hospital, Government Nursing Home or University Teaching Hospital.

2. REIMBURSEMENT OF MEDICAL EXPENSES INCURRED LOCALLY IN PRIVATELY OWNED HOSPITALS

That a member shall be reimbursed the cost of Treatment for himself or members of his family at privately owned hospitals on the production of a receipt for bills paid. The total sum of such reimbursements in one year shall not exceed 10 per cent of the member's annual salary.

3. MEDICAL CHECK-UP LOCALLY

- (a) That a member shall be entitled to a Medical Check-Up Locally. (It is also recommended that if further Medical Consultation and/or treatment need to be Undertaken/Given Abroad, permission to do so may be granted by the Speaker of the House of Representatives).
- (b) That a Local Medical Check-Up may only be conducted either in a Government Hospital, a Government Nursing Home, or at a University Teaching Hospital.

4. MEDICAL CHECK-UP/TREATMENT ABROAD

- (a) That a member on official business overseas may take his Once-a-Year Medical Check-Up Abroad, provided that he obtains prior permission from the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and provided also that the medical practitioner to be consulted is registered to practise in the Country concerned, and approved by the Nigerian Mission located in or nearest to the particular Country concerned.
- (b) That the duration of a Medical Check-Up Abroad shall not exceed ten days and the cost shall be borne by the National Assembly.
- (c) If as a result of the Medical Check-Up in (b) above, it becomes imperative for a member to undergo a course of Treatment, the bill for such treatment shall be settled by the Nigerian Missions Abroad in the first place while bilateral arrangements for reimbursement shall be arranged between the Ministry of External Affairs and the National Assembly.

5. MEDICAL TREATMENT ABROAD IN THE EVENT OF INADEQUATE TREATMENT LOCALLY

(a) That where a Member is unable to obtain adequate treatment locally he will be entitled to free medical treatment abroad on the recommendation of the medical officer in charge of the National Assembly Medical Centre and the approval of the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The duration of such treatment shall be determined by the Medical Officer-in-Charge of the National Assembly Medical Centre,

TRAVELLING EXPENSES AND MEDICAL BILLS ARISING FROM TREATMENT ABROAD

(b) That the National Assembly shall bear the cost of passage for a Member travelling abroad for medical treatment, and Bills for such treatment shall be settled by the Nigerian Missions abroad in the first instance, subject to reimbursement as is the case in Clause 4 (c) above.

(c) ESTACODE ALLOWANCE

That a Member travelling abroad for medical treatment shall be paid Estacode Allowance for the duration of the treatment as recommended by the Medical Officer-in-Charge of the National Assembly Medical Centre and approved by the Speaker in Clause 5 (a) above.

(d) Position of Spouse/Close Relation in Respect of "Life and Death" Matter

That permission shall be granted for a member's spouse/close relation to accompany him/her at the expense of the National Assembly where the condition of the ailing member has become a matter of "life and death", in consequence of which immediate medical treatment or hospitalization abroad becomes imperative.

In such an event estacode allowance at the rate of N100.00 (One hundred Naira) per diem as well as cost of passage shall be paid to such spouse/close relation. But so that this privilege shall not be regarded as an automatic thing, specific approval by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, is a sine-qua-non, and must be obtained prior to the journey abroad of such spouse or close relation.

(e) DEATH ARISING ABROAD

That where a member dies while undertaking acourse of treatment abroad the National Assembly shall bear the cost of the return of the remains to this country. All arrangements for this shall be made by the Nigerian Missions in accordance with the Provision of Clause 4 (c) above.

- 1. That in view of the high cost that would be involved in procuring weapons for Youth Corps Members and in view of the more pertinent fact that not all Youth Corps Members are temperamentally suited for weapon training, only the less dangerous aspects of military training, for example, lectures from officers of our Armoured Corps about what the Armoured Corps does and what a tank looks like—should be introduced into the NYSC scheme to supplement the basic military training already existing in the scheme; and that Officers of the St. John's Ambulance Brigade in various parts of the country should be invited to acquaint Youth Corps Member with different First Aid techniques;
- That rather than broadening the Youthful base of the NYSC scheme, an "In-School Programme" should be introduced whereby leadership and endurance training would be given to school children in their schools;
- 3. That Officers who have been sent on In-Service training by their Ministries and who have to return to the Ministries to work be exempted from the scheme;
- 4. That in view of the fact that many married women are in the scheme; married women should not be exempted;
- 5. That in order to give them a sense of belonging and self-actualisation desired by every freeman, the disabled participants should continue to be part of the scheme provided that:—

 - (ii) they are posted to places of their own choice;



SUPPLEMENT TO THE VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

1. Summary of the Performance of the House of Representatives during the 2nd Session:

The 2nd Session of the 1st National Assembly commenced on 9th October, 1980 on a much happier note. Backed with one year's legislative experience under the new form of government, Hon. Members have developed such expertise in the various fields of governmental activities that by their individual and general performance both in the Committees and on the floor of the House, they have demonstrated that they can no longer be called green-horns who merely sit in the House to pass virtually ineffective Resolutions; Members have now firmly settled down to their Main Task of making important and far-reaching laws in the interest of our great country. That is not to say that Resolutions are not needed or are essentially meant to "pass the buck" to the Executive. Resolutions are now only passed to serve their primary purpose, namely, to give expression to the collective will of the Legislature itself—whether in its internal affairs, or on matters of national concern, or in giving the necessary legislative backing to the Executive to enable it to achieve a specified objective.

2. Resolutions:

During the period under review, i.e., from October 1980 to June 1981, fewer Resolutions were passed by the House than over the same period last session. A total of 62 Resolutions were passed by the House, and most of these dealt with fundamental issues. Some of the most important of these Resolutions are meant for the promotion of the efficient working of the National Assembly and for the provision of adequate security for Members.

The House has laid down very high standards of behaviour for Members and has not hesitated to take appropriate disciplinary action against any Member whose behaviour, particularly on the floor of the House or within the precincts of the Natinal Assembly fell short of those standards. The suspension of an Hon. Member for period of six months is a case in point. Some of the major Resolutions adopted by the House concerned major incidents or issues of national importance such as the Resolution on :—

- (a) Religious violence in Kano-January, 1981;
- (b) Investigation into the frequent causes of power failure—December, 1980;
- (c) Cold-blooded murder of Nigerian soldiers by Cameroonians Gendarmes—May, 1981.

3. Bill :

With regard to Bills which have so far resulted in Acts of the National Assembly, we can mention such Acts as the Allocation of Revenue Act passed in January 1981; the Appropriation Bill 1981, the National Assembly Service Commission Bill recently passed and awaiting the President's assent, and the National Minimum Wage Bill which is also awaiting the assent of Mr President. Another very important Bill just recently passed by the House is the Open University Bill. Some other Bills sent from the Executive are now with the various Committees of the House for detailed examination.

4. The days when the House was obliged by force of circumstances to consider mainly Bills submitted by the Executive are now behind us. Now it is pertinent to place on record here that, unlike in the 1st Session Members themselves have sponsored, singly or jointly a number of important Bills which are right now with the appropriate Committees. These Bills include the Nigerian Television Authority (Transfer of Ownership) (Amendment) Bill, 1981, the Nigerian Institute of Handicapped Research Bill, 1981, the Nigerian Sugar Research Institute Bill, 1981; the Creation of States and Boundary Adjustment Bill, 1981; and the Pilgrims Board (Amendment) Bill, 1981.

This achievement has been made possible by the establishment during the period under review of a Legal Drafting Department which has started functioning with a skeleton staff and by the initiative shown by Members. We don't want to blow our own trumpets but it is pertinent to point out that two of the most important Bills presented to the National Assembly emanated from this House. They are the Bill on the Creation of New States and that on the National Minimum Wage.

5. Spillovers from the 1st Session:

You all know that in our present system a Bill does not die if it is not passed within the 1st, 2nd, or 3rd Session. In fact, it is kept alive until the end of the 4th Session. But if by this time it is not already law, then it lapses with the dissolution of the Assembly. A new Assembly cannot resuscitate it. If the need for that law still arises, legislative process has to start all over again. On this important legislative principle, therefore, we have some Bills which are spillovers from the 1st Session. The Bills are virtually all in conferences now and are in the process of being reported back to each of the Houses by their conferees. They include the Nigerian Council for Management Development Bill, the National Electric Power Authority (Amendment) Bill, Nigerian Coal Corporation (Amendment) Bill, 1980, Nigerian Mining Corporation (Amendment) Bill, 1980, River Basins Development Authorities (Amendment) Bill, 1980, Membership of the Nigerian Export Promotion Council Bill, 1980 and Membership of the Nigerian Tourist Board Bill, 1980.

6. It may be mentioned, in passing, in order to correct the inaccurate information that had been published by the Press, that the Legislature has not been responsible for the delay in the Electoral Bill, 1981. It is regrettable that occasionally, the Executive indulges itself in 'passing the buck'. The Electoral Bill was submitted to the National Assembly only a few weeks ago, but we discovered that the provisions of the rules had not been fulfilled, in that the Executive, contrary to rule, had not first published the Bill in the Gazette for public information. Hence the House was forced to do the work expected of the Executive, and therefore took the initiative of directing that the Bill be published in the Gazette in accordance with the laid down procedure. As soon as this is done the Bill will be presented on the floor of this House. This Bill is one of the measures that would be given priority attention after the Recess.

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7. When we come back from our Recess late in August this year we shall have only a few weeks more before the end of the Session. So, I wish to appeal to all members that as soon as we are back; we should work hard, as usual, to clear all the backlog of the Bills which are with the Committees.

8. Bills from the Judiciary:

- As Members are aware, there are two Bills or so proposed by the Judiciary and forwarded only to the Senate. We do not want to cross swords with the Judiciary since that institution should be treated with the greatest deference and respect. But they made an important omission in their submission of one of the Bills by submitting the Bill only to the Senate, and not to both Houses which is the correct procedure. As it is provided in the Constitution a Bill submitted to the National Assembly can start its legislative journey in either of the two Houses. When I observed this slip I addressed a letter to the Chief Justice of the Federation inviting his attention to the error, and urging him to ensure that the correct procedure was always followed in such matters in future in order to avoid any possible misunderstanding or embarrassment.
- 9. I would like to end these remarks by expressing my sincere thanks to all of you for the co-operation I have received. There have been problems from time to time, but it is noteworthy and most impressive that we have been able to overcome the problems and soldier on. I would venture to say that the unwritten accord—informal but strong—which seems to bind Members of this Honourable House is still working perhaps because most of us have a sense of history and have the interest of this country uppermost in our minds. I wish you all happy vacation while looking forward to your coming back full of vigour and determination.

COMMONWEALTH PARLIAMENTARY VISIT TO LONDON 6th- 23rd MAY, 1981 REPORT ON MY VISIT TO U.K.

On the 13th February, 1981, Mr Peter Cobb, Secretary, Commonwealth Parliamentary Association, United Kingdom Branch, in his letter of that date addressed to Mr Ben Olinmah on behalf of the Executive Committee of the United Kingdom Branch, extended an invitation to our Branch here in Nigeria to send one member to attend their Parliamentary Visit in May this year. Mr Speaker directed that I should participate in the Visit.

I left Nigeria for the United Kingdom on the 5th of May, 1981 arriving London on the same day. Arrangement was made for all the delegates to be accommodated at St. Ermin's Hotel, London.

Delegates came from all the commonwealth countries except Sierra-Leone. The Commonwealth countries that sent delegates are :—

The Commonwealth Parliamentary Visit to Britain means exactly what it says. We had full programme every day beginning from the 6th of May to mid-day 23rd May, 1981 when the visit ended. Apart from visits to various places of interest in London, we also visited Oxford (2 days), Cardiff in South Wales (3 days), and Jersey (4 days).

In London there were several visits to the House of Commons and House of Lords. We had the opportunity of watching the debates in both Houses and in addition to the debates and proceedings of the House of Lords we also watched the proceedings in the Appelate Division of the House of Lords. There was opportunity also to attend various Committee Meetings of the House of Commons. Committees are a new and recent introduction into parliamentary system of Westminister. It is similar in every respect to our own Committee System. Still in the British Parliament we were welcomed by the Chairman, Deputy Chairman and other members of the Executive Committee of the United Kingdom Branch of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association. We were well entertained and look after satisfactorily.

During our visit to the British Parliament there was discussion on "The Political Scene at Westminster" by Mr John Biggs-Davison, MP, and Miss Betty Boothroyd, MP. After the discussion by these MPs delegates were allowed to ask questions.

There was also a second discussion entitled "Recent Major Developments in the Westminster Parliament with particular reference to Committees" by Mr Michael Ryle, Clerk of the Overseas Office, and Dr David Menhennet, D. Phil. (Librarian to the House of Commons) who spoke on "Libraries for MPs", and delegates were given the opportunity to ask question. The third discussion was "Commonwealth and World Affairs" between Sir Anthony Kershaw, MC, MP, and Mr Edward Rowlands MP. As in the past, delegates had opportunity to ask lots of questions. The last discussion was on "Parliamentary System in My country", and on this discussion which was for the delegates I spoke on the Parliamentary System in my Country. Nigeria" After that I answer question from delegates. I attaach hereby a copy of my address to the delegates.

In London, the delegates visited the Commonwealth Institute at Kensington. There each delegate had the opportunity to see various displays of their country. I, of course, was at Nigerian corner throughout and I observed with dismay that nearly everything displayed there was completely out of date. For example, they still talk about Federal *Military* Government, and there was very little to impress anybody about our development. I was told by the Curator that to bring Nigerian section up-to-date they have been asking for only N40-50,000 but have not been able to get this. This looks a very small amount. I felt very disappointed with

our own corner, and I do hope that Mr Speaker will, as a result of this report, take this matter up with the Ministry of Culture, Youth and Sports, and urge them to make this little amount available so that every Nigerian visiting the Commonwealth Institute can feel proud of our country.

Also in London, places of historical and contemporary interest were shown to the delegates.

VISIT TO OXFORD

We were in Oxford from the 10th of May. At Oxford, being the University town, we were conducted round many ancient colleges of Oxford. We had lunch at Queen Elizabeth House, Institute of Commonwealth Studies. There was a discussion on the University. Tuesday, 12th May, 1981 we left for South Wales. On our way to South Wales we had the opportunity to visit Wilfowl Trust Sanctuary, Slimbridge, Gloucestershire, and also Stonor Estate. STONOR is an ancient catholic family who have remained catholic in spite of persecutions all the years. Stonor occupies a vast area of land with ancient buildings and ancient pictures still preserved there. We also had a visit to the farm at Gwent on the way to South Wales. We visited Cardiff Castle, as well as the Welsh Office which is autonomous, i.e. like a State in our country. We visited St. Donat's Castle, and Ford Motor Company, Bridgend. We had a musical evening with Dowlais Male Voice Choir. At Welsh Office there was discussion on "Welsh Economy, Administration and Environment" by the Permanent Secretary of Welsh Office.

On Thursday, 14th May we left South Wales for Jersey. At Jersey we visited the State Chamber and there was an address by the Bailiff Sir Frank Ereaut on "History and Constitution of Jersey". Another address was entitled "Jersey Solution" by Senator R. Vivet, OBE, and on "Political Organisation in Jersey". The two gentlemen answered questions from delegates. The delegates were well received at a Reception and Dinner by Jersey Branch of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association.

We were conducted round the small Island of 75,000 people and visited places of interest.

The delegates returned to London on the 17th May and continued their visits to London till the end of the Parliamentary Visit on mid-day 23rd May, 1981. I returned home on 30th May, having written to the Speaker earlier that I would be able to come back the following week.

Finally, I should like to put on record my impression of the visit and Commonwealth Parliamentary Visit and Commonwealth Parliamentary Association itself. The visit was well worth it, it afforded delegates an opportunity to meet and make friends and above all to exchange views about our common interests.

I recommend greater participation and interest in Commonwealth Parliamentary Association and its activities.

PARLIAMENTARY SYSTEM IN MY COUNTRY—NIGERIA

In Nigeria, the development of Parliamentary system of government today is inextricably intertwined with the evolution of Nigeria as a political entity under the British colonial system and Protectorate. Like the evolution of Nigeria itself the process was sporadic and by fits and starts. Nigeria, it should be recalled, was a motley of nation states with various systems of government, cultures and stages of development and civilizations. The British shaped and nurtured Parliamentary system until independence on 1st October, 1960 leaving a legacy of Westminster type of Parliamentary Cabinet system.

British political involvement in the nation building of Nigeria and system of government dates back to 1849 when Beecroft was appointed British Consul for the Bights of Benin and Biafra primarily to protect British Commercial interests on the Guinea Coast.

In 1861 King Dosumu ceded the port and island of Lagos with all rights, profits and revenue to Queen Victoria of Great Britain, thereby making Lagos a Colony. From Lagos, as a base, the British pushed Northwards, Eastwards and in all directions by conquest and treaties to all that today constitute Nigeria. Legislative and Executive Councils were established for the Colony of Lagos in 1862. In 1900 with the creation of the Protectorates of Southern and Northern Nigeria, each under a High Commissioner responsible directly to the British Secretary of State for the Colonies and administered separately from the Colony and Protectorate of Lagos which was under a Governor, Nigeria as a country was now on the map. The Colony and Protectorate of Lagos merged with the Protectorate of Southern Nigeria in 1906 as the Colony and Protectorate of Southern Nigeria under a Governor. 1914 is the landmark in the evolution of Nigeria. In this year, Lord Lugard (as he afterwards was) amalgamated the Colony and Protectorate of Southern Nigeria as the Colony and Protectorate of Northern Nigeria as the Colony and Protectorate of Northern Nigeria, with Lugard as

elective.

Hugh Clifford, in 1922 introduced a new constitution. A Legislative Council for Southern Nigeria was established with powers to legislate only for Southern Nigeria. The franchise was introduced in Nigeria for the first time. Four members of the Legislative Council were elected—three for Lagos municipality and one for Calabar municipality.

Under this constitution the Governor alone legislates for Northern Nigeria. The Clifford constitution pioneered the election of Representatives into Parliament in Nigeria and the emergence of party.

In 1946, Arthur Richards (later Lord Milverton) introduced the Richards Constitution which divided Southern Nigeria into two regions—East and West. With Northern Nigeria, there were three regions and the Colony of Lagos. The significance of this Constitution was that one Legislative Council was established for the whole country for the first time. Africans for the first time were made unofficial members of the Executive Council. Regional Councils were established. Each Region had a House of Assembly while in addition the West and North had each a House of Chiefs. Even with this advance, Parliamentary system was still in its embryo in Nigeria. This Constitution sparked off a sustained political agitation by Nigerians under the leadership, first, of Herbert Macaulay and then Dr Nnamdi Azikiwe for a truly representative Parliamentary Constitution and for political independence from Britain. As a result, consultation and participation by Nigerians in subsequent constitutional developments became the rule rather than the exception.

With the accepted norm that Nigerians henceforth must participate in deciding their constitutional and political destiny there emerged first the Macpherson Constitution in 1951 which ushered in the Council of Ministers from each Regional House of Assembly. In addition, there was a House of Representatives for Nigeria. Elections into the House of Representatives was direct for Lagos and Calabar, and indirect for the rest of the country. Then followed the Lyttleton Constitution of 1954 whereby Nigeria became a Federation made up of Eastern, Western and Northern Regions, Lagos and Southern Cameroons.

Constitutional Conferences both in Nigeria and London preceded the Independence Constitution of 1960 when Nigeria became independent on 1st October. The Legislatures in the Regions and in the centre were bicameral—Houses of Assembly and of Chiefs in the Regions and a House of Representatives and a Senate for the whole country. Electoral colleges were abolished and Regional and Federal Governments were responsible to Parliament with a Cabinet system on Westminster model. There was a Governor-General as a Head of State as the Queen of Britain and a Prime Minister as Head of Government. In the Regions there were Premiers and Governors. In the centre as well as in the Regions there were Councils of Ministers appointed from the floor of the House by the Prime Minister (in the centre) and by each Premier in each Region. The Prime Minister, Premiers and Ministers were members of Parliament. The life of a Parliament was five years. In 1963 Nigeria became a Republic and the office of Governor-General was abolished while the office of a President as Head of State was created with Dr Nnamdi Azikiwe as the first President. This first Parliamentary experience came to an end by a coup by the army on 15th January, 1966.

From 16th January, 1966 to 30th September, 1979 the Military ruled Nigeria without Parliament. This period of Military rule witnessed two coup d'etats, namely, in July 1966 and July 1975 and an abortive coup of 13th February, 1976. There was a Civil War from 6th July, 1967 to 12th January, 1970.

In 1975, a Constitution Drafting Committee was appointed to prepare a new constitution for a return to civilian democratic rule. The committee prepared a draft constitution in 1976 with an introduction of Executive President as Head of State and Head of Government on the American model. The draft was submitted to a Constituent Assembly in 1977. The Assembly approved the recommendation of Executive President. In 1978, the Draft Constitution approved by the Assembly (with some amendment by the Supreme Military Council) became a legal document by virtue of the Constitution of the Federal Republic of Nigeria (Enactment) Decree No.25 of 1978 under the title of "THE CONSTITUTION OF THE FEDERAL REPUBLIC OF NIGERIA, 1979.

The Constitution provide for a bicameral National Assembly, viz: a Senate and a House of Representatives with powers to make laws for the Federation. During the Military Regime, the Regions were abolished and States established. Under the 1979 Constitution the States (now nineteen) has each a legislative house, namely, House of Assembly. Each State has an Executive Governor.

There is a universal adult suffrage with the age of voting reduced to eighteen years. Elections to the Houses are direct. Each State constitutes a constituency for the election of a Governor for the State, while for the Presidency the country is a single constituency.

Provision is made for Local Government system and the Federal Government has to make direct revenue allocation to the Local Governments.

Legislative power is shared between the National Assembly and the States. The National Assembly has the exclusive legislative authority to make laws on all matters in the Exclusive Legislative List, and concurrent power on matters on the concurrent list. The State Houses of Assembly can make laws on matters on the concurrent legislative list.

Unlike the Westminster model which came to an end in 1966, the present Presidential system has a life of four years. Unlike the Westminster Cabinet system, ministers including the President as the Chief Executive who are not and must not be members of Parliament are not, *stricti sensu* responsible to Parliament. Unlike the Parliamentary Cabinet system, in the Executive Presidential system of 1979 Constitution, Governments, cannot be made and brought down in Parliament.

Since independence, therefore, Nigeria has had two systems of Parliamentary democracy. The first experiment was the Westminster type of collective responsibility of the Executive to Parliament whereby governments could be made and unmade on the floor of the national legislature or state legislature as the case may be. The second experiment since 1979 is the Executive Presidential system based on the United States of America's model. In this type, apart from impeachment, with all its cumbersome procedure, the legislature cannot sack the Executive.

Without going into the merits and demerits of the two types, however, one or two observations could be made. The Presidential Executive appears to have one significant advantage, that is, stability of government. On the other hand, it would appear that under this system party discipline cannot be strictly enforced. It is arguable that the position of party whips is stronger under the Westminster Parliamentary system than under the Executive Presidential type. Here in Nigeria, it would be premature at this stage to draw any definite conclusions on the new experiment. It is still an experiment.

Your Committee met on Monday, 31st August to discuss the above and recommends as follows:—

1. Car Basic Allowance:

When considering the 1981 draft estimates the Appropriation Committee decided against the vote of ₹955,800.00 for the payment of the above allowance i.e ₹150.00 (One hundred and fifty Naira) per member per month during 1981 as recommended by your Committee on the grounds that it was not justifiable for the National Assembly to approve the payment of the above allowance for its members when at that time the issue of car loans and basic allowances for the Civil Servants was still under negotiation. Your Committee regrets that the payment of ₹60 (Sixty Naira) as per House Resolution vide Votes and Proceedings No. 142 of 22nd July, 1981 cannot be made as there are no funds for this purpose in the approved estimates for the National Assembly for 1981. Your Committee will strive to ensure that adequate funds will be made available for this purpose for 1982. It may be possible for members to claim the arrears in respect of the above allowance with effect from 1st August, 1981.

2. Engagement of Personal Secretary and Motor Driver by Members.—While examining the 1981 Draft Estimates your Committee ensured that adequate funds were made available for the various categories of staff as recommended by the Joint Remunerations Committee, namely.

 - 1. That DC-10 aircraft is sound aircraft, and Nigeria Airways limited should continue to use the two DC-10 aircraft still among its fleet of aircraft; That if funds are available, two more DC-10 aircraft should be purchased to augment the fleet.
 - 2. That the Department of Civil Aviation should be re-organised to make provision for a Director-General of Civil Aviation who will be equal in status to a Permanent Secretary.
 - 3. That the Department of Meteorology should continue to enjoy its autonomy but should be headed by a Director who will be responsible to the Director-General of Civil Aviation.
 - 4. That a Nigerian Civil Aviation Authority should be created which would be removed from the direct control of the Ministry, but would have its own Board and Management structure which should be tailored and run as a strictly commercial enterprise, or a profit oriented economic venture.
 - 5. That all existing contractual agreements with the international Aeradio Limited (IAL) should be reviewed so as to make room for the development of expertise in the indigenous staff who have had their initial training or who are currently being trained at the Nigerian Civil Aviation Training Centre (NCATC) Zaria or somewhere else.
 - 6. That all airports in the country most especially the major ones, should, as a matter of urgency, be equipped with necessary navigational aids and other facilities to enable aircraft to operate under all conditions of weather.
 - 7. That the Nigerian Airports Authority should keep its present structure and independence but should be completely self-generating in terms of finance as soon as possible, so as to avoid further government grants to the Authority.
 - 8. That the Nigerian Civil Aviation Training Centre, Zaria should be modernised in line with similar Civil Aviation Training Centres in other countries in order to maintain its position as the best Civil Aviation Training Centre on the Continent of Africa.

- 9. That three private airlines should be approved to compete on the domestic routes with the national airline. The three recommended private airline companies should each be 100% private, and should be structured as 'Public liability companies'.
- 10. That more charter companies should be allowed to operate in the country for passenger, cargo, and mail services, domestically and internationally in order to explore the full economic potential of air transportation in the country.
- 11. Corrupt Practices: (i) That Security officials in plain clothes should monitor the activities of Airways staff at all locations;
- (ii) That drastic disciplinary actions should be taken against officials guilty of corruption. Such disciplinary action should not preclude on-the-spot dismissal depending on the degree of guilt;
 - (iii) That an OK tag should be defaced as soon as a 'Boarding Pass' is issued to a passenger;
- (iv) That tighter security measure should be introduced to protect customers' cargo. Confirmed cases of luggage theft or under-weighing of luggages for monetary gain should lead to summary dismissal;
- (v) That Public complaint notices should be displayed at strategic places for use by the general public for complaints against erring staff of the Airline.
- 12. Organisational Deficiency: (i) That the Public be informed of delayed and cancelled flights and such information should be supplied promptly and honestly;
- (ii) That delayed passengers or stranded passengers should be properly taken care of and served with refreshments; and where necessary full lunch and dinner should be provided at airline's expense;
- (iii) That flight bookings should be computerized and competent operators should be appointed to process the bookings where possible; seat numbers should be allocated to passengers during the checking in;
- (iv) That the Operations Department should be re-organised and proper leadership should be injected for effective management of the section. The Technical Services Department should also be re-vitalized so as to make it less dependent on overseas support with regard to personnel and equipment for aircraft maintenance;
- (v) That planes should be regularly serviced and accessory spare parts should be made available through well established ordering and stocking procedure. Debts for payment of spare parts to suppliers should not be allowed to accumulate against the airline. Outstanding debts should be settled promptly to give the airline creditability and credit worthiness with suppliers. Delays and cancellations should be reduced to the barest minimum by the provision of more aircraft and the training of personnel.
- 13. Management Deficiency: (i) That management structure should be re-organised in line with modern management concepts. The Board of the Nigeria Airways should draw up an appropriate organisational chart showing proper seniority and levels of authority;
