COLONIAL DEVELOPMENT PLANS GENERALLY APPROVED DURING 1948-49

British Guiana

The British Guiana Plan provides for a total expenditure of \$31,900,000 (£6,650,000). Of this sum, \$12,000,000 will be met from the territory's Colonial Development and Welfare allocation, \$3,212,000 from accumulated revenue surpluses, and the remaining \$734,000 from a 1945 loan. It is hoped to raise \$12,500,000 by new loans, leaving \$3,400,000 to be met from current and future revenue surpluses during the 10-year period covered by the Plan.

The emphasis of the Plan is on the development of economic services in the belief that improved social services must be built on a foundation of increased production and real wealth. Out of a total expenditure of \$31,900,000, \$8,700,000 are allotted to communications and \$14,200,000 to other projects of an economic character. Provision of \$8,000,000 is made for various welfare schemes.

The Plan is principally concerned with the development of the coastal belt where 95 per cent. of the population live. The Report of the British Guiana and British Honduras Settlement Commission (Cmd. 7533) deals mainly with the development of the sparsely inhabited interior of the Colony and its recommendations are under consideration.

St. Lucia

The St. Lucia Plan provides for a total expenditure of $\pounds 900,000$. It is proposed that $\pounds 405,000$ should be provided from Colonial Development and Welfare funds, $\pounds 160,000$ from local funds, leaving $\pounds 335,000$ to be raised by loan.

The emphasis of the plan is on economic rather than social development, the largest item of expenditure envisaged being communications, £230,000, followed by general economic development, £225,000. On the social side, expenditure of £110,000 is envisaged on education, £30,000 on health, £70,000 on housing and £90,000 on towns and villages generally.

Castries, the principal town and port, was largely destroyed by fire in June, 1948, and as much expenditure again as is postulated in the Plan will be required to rebuild it. Considerable sums have already been provided from the General Reserve under the Colonial Development and Welfare Vote, from the Colonial and Middle Eastern Services Vote, and from loan funds.

St. Lucia is already committed to expenditure of £567,000 under the Plan and further schemes which are obviously productive or ancillary to existing productive schemes will be given consideration, but a final decision on the use to be made of the remaining expenditure proposed has been postponed for three years until the Castries reconstruction programme is well under way and the financial position of the Colony can be more clearly assessed.

Grenada

The Grenada Plan provides for an overall expenditure of \$8,357,088 (£1,741,060).

The main objective of the Plan is to place the Colony on a sound economic footing by developing the principal source of economic prosperity, agriculture, on which it is proposed to spend a quarter of the funds available under the Plan. Expenditure on education and public health is to involve another quarter of the funds.

Of the capital expenditure required under the Plan it is proposed that 1,833,072 should be met from the Colonial Development and Welfare allocation, 2,400,000 from loan funds, 240,000 from surplus balance, and 3,840,000 from revenue, leaving a small deficit of 44,016 (£9,170) which should be met from the Colonial Development and Welfare reserve of £9,407.

North Borneo

The North Borneo Plan provides for a total expenditure of $\pounds 5,534,159$. As the country has suffered severe devastation by war the Plan has been framed with the primary object of restoring facilities to the pre-war level and thereafter to build up essential services to an extent necessary to open up the country for development. It is proposed to spend $\pounds 2,061,205$ on reconstruction and $\pounds 3,472,954$ on development.

It is contemplated that reconstruction expenditure should be met mainly by a grant-in-aid, apart from £450,000 which is to be met from the Colony's revenue for the years 1948-50.

It is proposed that of the development expenditure, £1,250,000 should be met from the Colony's Colonial Development and Welfare allocations, £1,300,000 by loans, and the remainder from the Colony's revenue which is expected to contribute at least £750,000 in the years 1951-55.

The largest item of expenditure in the plan is that on communications which amounts to £1,005,000 and accounts for nearly one third of the proposed development expenditure. £493,000 are to be devoted to Government housing and £593,000 to other government building and to town planning. This expenditure reflects at once the growing needs of a developing territory and the opportunity for replanning and improvement created by the almost total destruction of the principal towns during the war.

In regard to the social service, $\pounds 415,000$ is to be spent on public health, $\pounds 62,000$ on education and $\pounds 28,000$ on other social services.
